

Civil Defense Fire Fighters To Get Money

Seven fire-fighting organizations in Marion County are participating in the 1952-53 civil defense equipment match money program to acquire equipment at what amounts to a 75 per cent discount. If approved by state and federal authorities this will provide additional fire fighting facilities worth \$35,265 at a total local cost of \$8,816, according to Wallace S. Wharton, county director of civil defense.

Five of the seven are applying for mobile radio transmitter-receiver sets to mount in their rigs which would increase the operational efficiency of the Marion County Firefighters Association and its mutual-aid program by greater utilization of the Salem police-fire radio net.

With approval of the new program 15 of the 22 fire departments in the association would have radio communication facilities on the net.

Fire departments participating in the match-money program and the total amount each is applying for are:

Four Corners Rural Fire protection District, \$1344.50; Keizer Rural Fire Protection District, \$1089; Salem fire department, \$15,000 (for a pump); Scotts Mills Rural Fire Protection District, \$544.50; Sublimity fire department, \$1600.50; Turner fire department, \$1599; and Silverton fire department, \$14,000.

Hop Growers Set Straw Vote

Hop growers will be polled during the week of Nov. 10 on whether they favor retention or termination of the Hop Marketing Agreement, Eugene McCarthy and Herman Goschie, Silverton, directors of the Oregon Hop Growers Association announced.

The mail ballot is a result of action taken recently in San Francisco by the directors of the U. S. Hop Growers Association. The ballot will be sent to all Pacific Coast hop growers.

Navy Vet Gets 100,000th Bonus Check

Louie Yazzolino, ex-Navy Seabee living in Portland, has received the 100,000th Oregon World War II veterans bonus check. His check was for \$390, the bonus division reported Friday.

Bonus check No. 100,001, went to Vice-Admiral Thomas L. Gatch, retired, Portland. His check was in the maximum amount of \$600.

Both checks were mailed Thursday by the State Veterans Affairs Commission just short of a year from the day it started to process bonus applications.

Yazzolino said he had no immediate plans to spend his bonus but might purchase a television set later. Gatch said his bonus would be used to pay taxes.

The veterans department warned that the deadline for filing bonus applications is December 1.

Gatch was born in Salem. In 1942 was named Captain of the USS South Dakota, the famed "battle-ship X" of the Guadalcanal and Santa Cruz campaigns. He retired in 1947.

Bonus payments now aggregate \$40,049,725, including \$38,673,525 to living veterans and \$1,376,200 to unmarried widows, children and parents of deceased Oregon veterans.

H. C. Saffeld, bonus supervisor, said that despite the 100,000 payments, there remain about 15,200 applications in suspense.

"We are bringing these claims up to date as rapidly as possible," Saffeld said.

In suspense are 4,400 awaiting verification of foreign or sea duty from military department records and 10,800 awaiting receipt of further information from the applicant or from former employers, county registration officials or selective service records, in order to clarify questions of residence.

A total of 117,500 applications have been filed, leaving an estimated 22,500 potentially eligible veterans who have only until Dec. 1 to file their application.

The veterans department believes many survivors, especially parents of deceased Oregon veterans are not aware of their entitlement to the bonus.

Parents need not be dependent to receive the bonus and are entitled if the veteran left no unmarried widow or children, Saffeld said.

Market Quiet On Recess Eve

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market did very little Friday on the eve of a three-day recess. All security and commodity markets will be closed Monday for Columbus Day.

Volume was light, price movements were narrowly irregular, and price changes were so narrow that a stock going up or down a point stood out in bold relief.

On the week the market was higher by a very modest amount, but volume was so restricted that the rise carried little significance. Volume came to 1,070,000 shares as compared with 1,090,000 shares traded Thursday.

Fire Danger To Keep State Forests Closed

No Western Oregon forests will be reopened this weekend, Forester George Spaur announced Friday as the Weather Bureau warned that the fire danger all over the state was getting worse.

Spaur who had considered lifting the ban on logging—and consequently hunting—in coastal areas, said there would be no removal of the ban before Sunday and probably not by then.

Higher humidities and lower temperatures relieved the fire hazard somewhat earlier in the week. Associated Press reported some areas, including Eugene, had showers.

But the Weather Bureau said Friday that an east wind would reduce humidities again by Saturday and temperatures would be higher.

The Game Commission decided Friday to close the mule deer refuge in Lake and Klamath counties to all hunting Oct. 18, 19 and 20.

A special season for deer of both sexes was scheduled to open on those dates. But the commission said closure of Western Oregon woods to hunting had resulted in a concentration of hunters in the Lake and Klamath areas.

The commission said it would meet Monday to consider extending the deer season in Western Oregon until the forest ban is lifted.

A flock of minor fires were reported in Southern Oregon, but the forestry department said they all were under control. Jackson county had one lightning fire near Ashland, which was quelled after a heavy drenching by rain. In the Klamath area six fires were set by lightning Wednesday.

McKay Forms State Parole Advisory Unit

Creation of a 27-person Oregon Parole and Probation Survey Advisory Committee under chairmanship of Chief Justice James T. Brand of the State Supreme Court was announced by Gov. Douglas McKay Friday.

The advisory committee will conduct an independent examination of the status and operation of the State Board of Parole and Probation. This examination, Governor McKay said, is prompted by the fact that the Board of Parole and Probation has been operating under its current system since 1939.

Gov. McKay pointed out that the volume of work of the board has increased materially due to the rise in population at the penitentiary. He believed the proposed survey might result in suggestions enabling the board to better serve the needs of the state.

John Schapps, western director of the National Probation and Parole Association, will conduct the first phase of the project. A subsequent evaluation of the Parole and Probation Department, as proposed by H. M. Randall, is scheduled for 1953.

Fire Threatens Five Old Garages

Five abandoned garages along the Willamette River bank were threatened by a grass fire Friday afternoon at the foot of Division Street.

City firemen quelled the blaze, and said one of the buildings was scorched on one wall. Three of the five garages were being used by Hunt Bros. Cannery. The other two were vacant. Firemen said they could not learn to whom the garages belonged, although they are on city property.

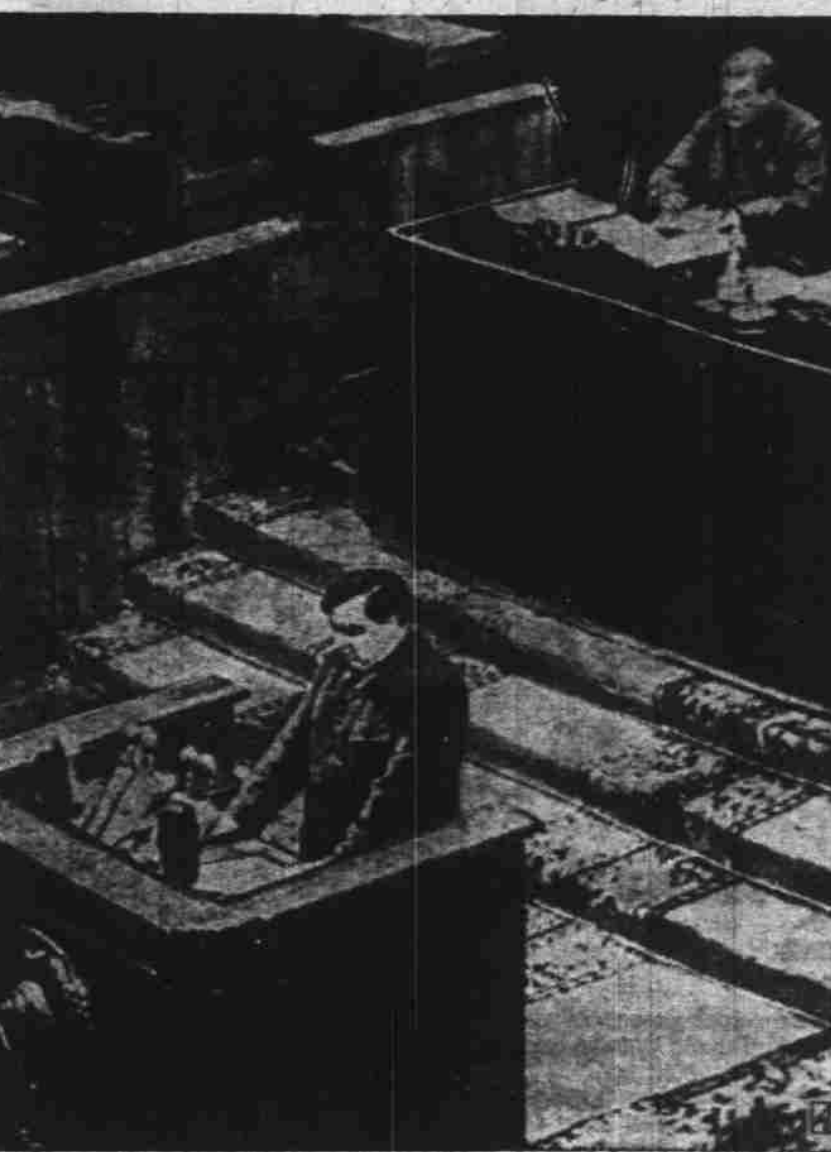

650 Absentee Ballots Issued

More than 650 absentee ballots had been issued Friday by Marion County clerk's office, with two weeks remaining before the deadline.

The figure is considerably higher than in 1950, but about 50 per cent of the ballots mailed out have gone to servicemen, mostly overseas.

County Clerk Henry C. Mattson reminded that Oct. 24 is the last day on which absentee ballots can be issued. They are for persons who will be out of the county on election day.

All meetings are open to the public.

Sunday the Unitarian Fellowship will sponsor a talk by Chandy concerning the Gandhian movement in India, with which he has been affiliated. Miss Mayr will speak at the Amity Methodist Church.

Chandy will make the closing address to the conference at 8:30 p.m. He will talk on "Church and War" at a city-wide meeting at the First Presbyterian Church, which is sponsored by the Inter-Faith Council of Willamette University.

Joseph Hopkins Trial Recessed Until Monday

After four days of testimony, the trial of Joseph H. Hopkins of Salem on a charge of embezzling \$10,446 was recessed Friday until Monday.

The hearing before Circuit Judge George R. Duncan of Marion County is expected to take another day or more before it goes to the jury, according to Miss Hattie Bratzel, attorney for Hopkins.

Hopkins is being tried on a charge of embezzling funds from Salem veterans housing colony, where he was manager until late in 1951. He also was indicted on another count of embezzling \$365, on which he is awaiting trial. Hopkins was one of four defense witnesses who testified Friday, and he is to continue Monday.

District Attorney E. O. Stadter Jr., who is attorney for the prosecution, said this makes the longest trial handled by his office during his nearly four years there. The longest previously was the recent Albert Karnes murder trial, which lasted nearly four days.

Pinner Home From Service

Seaman Kenneth R. Pinner, USN, son of Mrs. Gladys Pinner, 265 S. 18th St., is home on a 30-day leave prior to assignment at the U. S. Naval Class "A" Storekeeper's school in San Diego, Calif.

Pinner arrived home Thursday after having served 18 months on Guam attached to a U. S. Naval ship repair facility there. While on Guam he was a storekeeper apprentice. A graduate of Salem High School prior to his enlistment, he will visit in Salem with his mother and sister, JoAnne Pinner.

Only Woman Escapee Back At Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA (AP)—The only woman who ever escaped over the Washington State Penitentiary wall returned voluntarily today—in tears.

The former Maxine Guerson, who scaled the wall with a bedsheet as a rope four years ago, returned by taxi at dawn. She brought the explanation that she wanted to clear the record for the sake of two children born to her in her years of freedom as a Seattle housewife.

She now is Mrs. Joseph Valela. The return of the 33-year-old woman came after a Seattle newspaper had published her picture with an appeal from the FBI for information about her. The FBI had described her as possibly dangerous.

Prison officials said she sobbed out this story: "My husband didn't know of my prison record until two days ago. I wanted to tell him when the first baby was born and again when the second came, but I didn't."

"Two days ago a Seattle newspaper published my picture and a story that I was still at large. The only thing to do then was to show it to my husband and tell him the story."

"We discussed the affair and he said, 'Let's face it.' He said he would always love me and I should go back."
