

Ike's Aides Discussing 'High Level Approach'

DENVER (AP)—A strategy of a "high level approach," avoiding personalities and partisan retorts, was under study Saturday by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's political high command for the final weeks of the presidential campaign.

The decision, an informant said, will be based on examination of reports coming in now from all parts of the country.

They deal, not only with Eisenhower's own sweep through the West, but more especially with reactions to President Truman's "give-him-hell" train trip. At some points, the general was only a few hundred miles behind the President, speaking in the cities a few days later.

On the basis of latest information, Eisenhower's top lieutenants are trying to determine the answers to two interlocking questions:

1. Has the President helped or hurt the Democrats by his attack on Eisenhower?

2. Has the moment come for Eisenhower to emphasize the crusading nature of his campaign, leaving off any direct replies to

Truman and Gov. Adlai Stevenson, while stressing his declaration, "I'm not a politician?" Eisenhower scheduled a week-end rest. He went out to play golf Saturday with Palmer Hoyt, editor and publisher of the Denver Post, John Culbreth of Denver and Cliff Roberts of New York, all personal friends.

He will attend church services Sunday. His aides said he has made no appointments for either day but plans to devote himself to a study of reports from the campaign to date.

Monday, Eisenhower resumes his hard-driving campaign, moving through Wyoming and then into Oklahoma and Louisiana.

De-6s Diverted To Salem Airport

Fog at Portland and Seattle airports diverted another big DC-6 United Airliner to Salem's McNary Field Sunday as weather continued to molest flight schedules.

The DC-6, on the last legs of a New York to Seattle trip, set down at the airport at 8 a.m. Portland-bound passengers were bussed to Portland. Seattle passengers continued their trip when weather cleared shortly before noon.

Another flight, coastwise, was delayed approximately two hours on the southbound schedule because of fog at the Seattle field. Originally scheduled for 10:10 a.m., it left Salem about 2 p.m.

There was no further indication Saturday when Eisenhower would make a promised public statement about his financial position.

Monroe Sweetland, national committeeman, said James Roosevelt, Los Angeles, would speak at Coos Bay Tuesday.

Roosevelt and Phil Kaiser, assistant labor secretary, will speak here at noon Wednesday. That night Kaiser will speak in Astoria and appear in Bend Thursday.

Sen. Lister Hill of Alabama will speak at Bend Oct. 21 at noon and that night at Eugene.

Sparkman will speak at noon at the University of Oregon Oct. 28, and that night at Portland at 6 p.m.

'Boys Meet Girls' Club Finds Favor in Salem

Only one thing can be said with assurance in advance of Salem Co-Rec Club meetings—the members will have supper together Friday night.

Otherwise, it's all spontaneous—including its growth from an idea to more than 40 regular members in five months.

Co-Rec is the frank answer of Salem YMCA and YWCA to the

problem of no place for a young, single, employed man, living in a boarding house, to meet a girl in a similar situation but a different boarding house.

It's not designed as a marriage bureau, and attendance as "couples" is not encouraged, but one engagement has occurred within the club already.

From a start of eight women and two men last May (plus over-head of six advisers), Co-Rec has attained an almost even break. Only once has it tipped in favor of the females (more men, that is).

One fellow who evidently didn't need the group to get acquainted brought five girls to one meeting. Another attended once,

came back the next time with a friend he'd told, "I know where there are 15 girls!"

YW Headquarters
The YWCA is the headquarters for this activity, which is launched every Friday at 6:30 with a home-cooked dinner. From there, the program is on the collective imagination of foresters, teachers, beauticians, fire alarm installers, seed analysts, telephone operators, stenographers, nurses and others.

They've had picnics, scavenger hunts, folk dancing, dance instruction, skating, swimming, softball, water-skiing and week-end beach trips. Future plans include films

of the Olympic Games and a demonstration of hypnotism.
