CAP Squadron Plans Classes, Radio Station

Expansion of the Salem Civil Air Patrol squadron is to include night classes at Willamette University beginning Tuesday and a radio station, Lt. W. D. Carrett, commander of the unit explained Saturday. Classes will be held from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. each Tuesday in room 204 at the Willamette Law School building where all elements of flight will be explained throughout the year. Classes will be held for two hours every Tuesday evening. At the end of the year, the CAP offers a six-weeks stay in Europe for the six students in the state who total the highest score in these classes and have the best comparative high school grades as well.

A radio station, to be located in the CAP headquarters at McNary Field, is in the process of construction and radio amateurs and others interested in radio are invited to take part in its formation. When the radio station is completed it will join the 6,000 such stations in the CAP network. The construction is under the supervision of Warrant Officer Delmar Aleslire.

Most recently the CAP is taking part in the search for parts of the wings of the B-29 which crashed in the Wilsonville area last Wednesday. Some sections of the ill-fated plane are yet to be found.

The CAP program is open to boys and girls between the ages of 15 to 18 (for the cadet program) and from 18 years on for the senior program. Availability is made for both cadets and senior members to fly in the unit's plane, an L-4 observation plane, located at McNary Field.

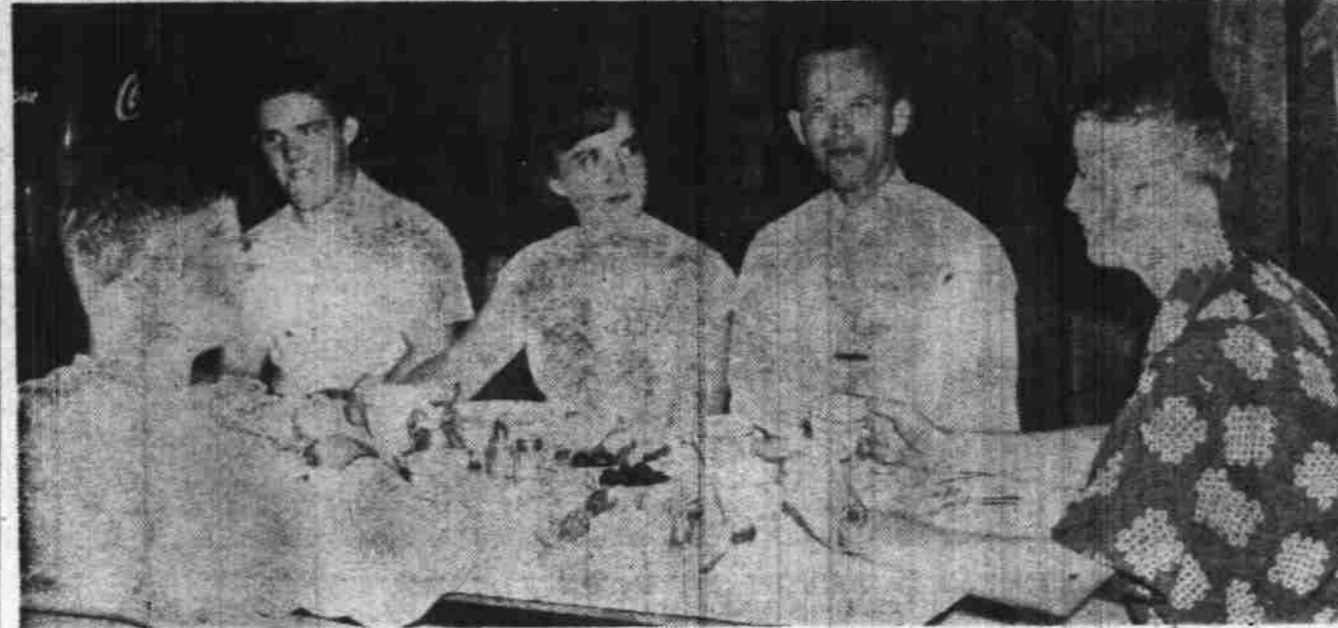

Detroit Dam Fourth Link in Valley Chain

Completion of the Detroit Dam project will mark the fourth contribution in a system of planned Willamette valley irrigation, Ivan Oakes, executive secretary of the Willamette River Basin Commission, explained.

The other three units are Dorens, Fern Ridge and Cottage Grove reservoirs, all near Eugene.

The completed proposal for a system of irrigation in the Willamette basin would be able to serve a total of 650,000 acres and would involve 21 projects in the valley, investigators explain. A study of these proposals is being made by members of the Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation to see if such projects are workable and if the farmers involved want them.

Farmers living in areas near a river or where water is available from a well have no need for the irrigation plan, commission investigators report. However, when the need for water is intense in an

area the affected farmers may band together and appeal to the Commission for a stored water system. In order to have the plan approved, 51 per cent of these farmers must vote it in.

"We find it difficult to meet the needs of irrigation in the basin with what water we have available during the summer," Oakes said. "At the beginning of the summer we must depend on stored water totalling about 150,000 acre-feet (one acre of water one foot deep). We can only use about 60,000 acre-feet of this for irrigation purposes," he said. Completion of the Detroit project will provide about another 130,000 acre-feet, thus doubling the present stored water supply. This is still enough to fill the needs in a drought emergency, the Commission reports.

Three such proposals being studied by the Commission and the Corps of Engineers are the Little Canby project, which would pump water out of the Molalla River for irrigation distribution; the East Long Tom Project which would distribute waters from the Fern Ridge reservoir, and the Salem project which would distribute water for irrigation from the Santiam River.
