Buying for Your Home Rich Silks, Art Works are Imported From Siam, Many on Market Today

By Sue Gardner Some of the most beautiful hand woven silks on the market today come from the native looms in Siam. The interest in these silks for American homes dates back to 1945 when James Thompson, visiting that country on a diplomatic mission, saw such beautiful fabrics made in native cottages that he stayed there to help build up the Siamese weaving craft.

Typical of the native work are the two-color iridescent dross weaves in draperies and in heavier upholstery fabrics imported for America. The one-color fabrics range from deep rich browns and blues to pale tones. There are also fine plaids and block designs for colorful

accent pieces in the home. You'll be seeing other examples of Siamese art in the near future, judging from a recent press showing of the silks with ancient Siamese art in stone, bronze, brass, wood, silver and caribou parchment. Wall decorations at first looked like fine embroidery, but turned out to be punched caribou hide, in brilliant colors, representing religious figures of the country.

Most Siamese art has some religious background. There are temple bells and large cast hands from large temple figures. Hand beaten silver bowls and small dishes, as well as brass with silver or gold wash coverings, are shown with designs typical of the country. Early bronze temple figures were decorated with lacquer and black, later ones were gilded. Many of these will provide designs for home accessories in this country and will go well with the native Siamese fabrics.
