

City Considers TV Antenna Regulation

Legislation to regulate installation of television antennas was introduced by the city administration Monday night before the City Council.

The bill was given first reading and earmarked for possible disposition at the Oct. 27 Council meeting. At present Salem has no television installation law.

City Engineer J. H. Davis said after the session that the bill represents the city's study of many other television codes and is designed for safety. It also includes a system of licensing persons handling installations.

Principal features of the bill: Proposed Television Licensing and Regulating Ordinance

1. All installers of exterior television equipment to pay fee of \$25.00 per year.
2. Each licensee shall maintain, if within the City of Salem, a place of business with a sign designating the same, the sign to be not less than three square feet in area.
3. Permits shall be required for all exterior antenna installations.
4. Fees for unsupported length exceeding guy wires: 20 feet or less, \$1.00; 20 feet to 40 feet, \$2.00; Over 40 feet, \$2.50; Over 50 feet, \$3.00.
5. The mast shall be guyed every ten feet and shall be grounded with not less than No. 14 copper or No. 12 aluminum wire.
6. The ground shall be attached to a cold water pipe with an approved ground clamp or a 1/2-inch by 8-foot approved ground rod may be used.
7. Antennas shall not be attached to or supported by parapet walls, chimneys or vent pipes.
8. Screw eyes shall be not less than 3/4"x4" and shall be completely set in a structural member of the building.
9. All guy wire is to be 1/4" stranded steel cable or larger.
10. Not less than three guy anchors shall be used to guy mast and if three only are used they shall be spaced at 120° apart.
11. On flat roofed, commercial buildings, steel or iron frames shall be used for guy anchors to provide a vertical clearance between a roof and any portion of guy wire of not less than 6' 6".
12. No television antenna shall be installed in any location where the overturn of the same will come closer than two feet from any electrical energy transmission line.
13. No guy wire shall project over or across any portion of any street, alley or public way unless permission has been obtained from the City Council.
14. All portions of all installations shall be structurally sound, shall meet all state and local safety code requirements and shall be of all metal construction.
15. For any installation in excess of forty feet, two complete sets of detailed plans together

Sec. Acheson Confers With U.N. Delegates

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson conferred Monday with the full U. S. delegation on what United Nations delegates expect will be a strong demand for the Communists to agree to an armistice in Korea on U. N. terms.

The secretary, striving to gain and hold the initiative in the seventh U. N. Assembly convening Tuesday, is scheduled to outline the U. S. proposals on Korea to the delegates on Wednesday.

Acheson outsmarted the Russians again this year and listed his name on the speaker's roll ahead of Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinsky, who arrived Monday to head the strongest delegation the Soviet Union has yet sent to the Assembly.

Vishinsky has not indicated his stand on the major issues but delegates expect he will support to the fullest the Communist Korean truce terms laid down at Panmunjom.

He will get little support from the majority. While the delegates are not inclined to endorse the unified command position fully without a long and detailed explanation, there is no sign that the Communists have picked up any support from the Sixth General Assembly, held last year in Paris.

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John L. Lewis To Campaign For Stevenson

CINCINNATI (AP)—John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers Union head came out formally Monday for election of Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson as the nation's president.

Disclosing plans to take the campaign stump for the Democrats in West Virginia, Lewis praised Gov. Stevenson as a "humanitarian" and urged workers everywhere to vote for him.

The 72-year-old veteran labor leader, at the same time, pictured the Republican presidential nominee, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, as a "professional soldier," unskilled in statesmanship and trained to obey orders from "his masters."

"I think that if the American people will march to the polls in November, Stevenson will march to the White House in January," Lewis said.

Supreme Court Refuses to Hear A-Spy Cases

WASHINGTON (AP)—Death in Sing Sing's electric chair moved a step nearer Monday for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, husband and wife convicted as atomic spies for Russia.

The Supreme Court, by an 8 to 1 vote, turned down their plea for a review of their conviction and death sentence.

The Rosenbergs have 15 days in which to petition the high court to reconsider its action—a step the court rarely takes. Their only other chance of escaping the electric chair rests with President Truman. He could reduce their sentences.

A brief formal order rejecting the plea for a review noted that Justice Black felt the court should hear the case.

Talk Stresses Oil's Import in U.S. Defenses

Oil is the U. S. industry most important to national defense, it was declared in Salem Monday by E. B. Connell, Signal Oil Co. executive from Portland.

Connell represented the industry in speaking before Salem Chamber of Commerce at a Senator Hotel luncheon program devoted to an Oil Progress Week observance.

Connell said 60 per cent of all World War II shipping to all battle areas was of oil products. And the U. S. merchant marine is one-fifth oil tankers, he said.

Oil reserves are being kept at high level even though civilian consumption is one-third greater than in 1945, said the speaker. Not all of oil products are fuel, he reminded by noting that 50 billion pounds of "petro-chemicals" are being produced by the industry, including drugs, nylon, lipstick and other substances.

Connell was introduced by Tom Kelly, Standard Oil Co. Salem district manager. Harold Robertson, Chamber board secretary, presided at the luncheon.

Automobiles Looted, Owners Tell Police

Two automobiles were looted sometime Sunday night while the cars were parked in front of residences, police reports indicated Monday.

Council Delays Action on Zone Change Request

Salem City Council Monday night deferred action on a highly controversial zone change request which would extend business zoning from the present strip along South 12th Street to the west 32 feet of property on which Howser Bros. equipment and tool business has located at 12th and Cross Streets.

Aldermen called on the Planning and Zoning Commission to outline its objections. The zoners recommended against the change. At the Council meeting last night in City Hall several persons were heard on both sides of the issue. Neighbors in residential property are opposing the change.

The Council passed a two-measures changing its procedure in conduct of city business. One authorizes the city manager and safety commission to take action directly in crosswalks, bus and loading zones or no-parking areas, with any action subject to change by the Council. The other authorizes the Council to appoint pro tem officers to carry on during absence of key elected or appointed officials. This was amended to make it mandatory that any pro tem mayor be appointed from the Council.

A memorial resolution was passed to express the Council's sympathy to the family of the late Betty Cooper, long time sanitary inspector for the city.

Public hearings were set Nov. 24 on vacation of streets in area to be occupied by new South Salem High School, but a resolution declared the Council's intention of vacating the streets, so that the school board may proceed with construction. Bids on the \$4 million project are to be opened Thursday.

Mayor Alfred Loucks who has been ill and absent the past two meetings, was again in the mayor's chair at last night's meeting.

A bid of Monnell & Sherrill for 1,000 feet of 2 1/2-inch fire hose at \$1.83 was accepted by the Council. Fire Chief E. L. Smith and City Manager J. L. Franzen also recommended a new pump truck be bought from Seagraves Co. at \$18,724. But this purchase was deferred pending study by a Council committee.

Public hearing was set for Nov. 24 also on proposal from Portland General Electric for vacation of an alley in its property north of Division Street.

Request from Salem General Hospital for exemption from paying normal building permit fee was approved, over the objection of Alderman Chester Chase who said the action meant the city would be contributing several thousand dollars, in effect, to a private building fund.

New legislation was introduced to call a Dec. 9 annexation election in a small area east of Eastmoreland Addition, to set a television antenna code, to renew a Southern Pacific spur track franchise on Howard Street.

Final action was taken to alter setback lines for residential properties on West Washington Street west of John Street and on the southeast corner of Shelton and 21st Street, and to accept a strip of property to complete a public street in newly developed area east of Parkway Drive and south of Orchard Heights Road.

2-Car, Truck Wreck Leaves 3 in Hospital

A two-car and truck "freak" accident in a fog bank early Monday morning about seven miles south of Salem on Highway 98E put three Salem men in Salem Memorial Hospital.

Injured were passengers, William L. Neimeyer, 32, 3320 Duncan Ave.; Jerry Calaba, 2405 Mountain View Dr.; and Joseph Griffin, 1925 Fir St. who received head lacerations.

The three were riding in a car driven by James William McCutchen, 1847 S. 12th St. when a car was struck from behind by an auto driven by David Glen Cobb, Portland. Neither Cobb nor his passenger, C. W. Amos, Portland, were injured in the crash.

Actual injury to the three men was believed by state police to have occurred when a pickup driven by Walter Wayne Buroker, Woodburn, and carrying a load of half-inch cement reinforcement steel skidded and overturned near the crash. The impact of the truck against the car caused the steel to fly through the air toward where the three men were standing.

Buroker was uninjured though his truck skidded off the highway and partly overturned in a ditch.

The three were taken to Salem Memorial Hospital where two were released after treatment and Neimeyer was awaiting x-rays for possible skull fracture Monday evening. Cobb was cited by police for following too close.

Central Howell Wreck Injures Salem Woman

CENTRAL HOWELL—An automobile-truck accident here Monday evening resulted in critical injury to a Salem woman and minor injury and arrest of the driver of the auto.

Lucille Anna Cook, 1970 Highway Ave., was taken from the demolished auto and placed in Silverton Hospital where her condition Monday night was said to be critical. Miss Cook was a passenger in an auto driven by Charles Robert Cochrane, 695 S. 18th St. He received lacerations about the face. Another passenger, Jerry S. Graham, 25, 1398 N. Liberty St., was cut about the face.

Both men were treated at Salem General Hospital and Cochrane was later lodged in city jail in lieu of \$250 bail on a charge of failing to stop for a posted stop sign.

Driver of the truck, Vernon J. Gingerich and his passenger, Vernon L. Ratloff, both of Hubbard, were uninjured. The truck, belonging to the Needy Brick and Tile Company at Hubbard, was enroute north on the Franklin-North Howell Road. The Cochrane auto was westbound toward Salem from Silverton.

Dianna Spencer, 3, Succumbs to Unknown Causes

A three-year-old girl, Dianna L. Spencer, was taken to a Salem hospital Monday evening and pronounced dead on arrival by Marjory County Deputy Coroner Charles C. Edwards.

The little girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Spencer, 5035 Auburn Rd., died from unknown causes and a post-mortem examination was slated for today. Her parents reported she had been suffering from a cold recently but there was no indication that she was in a critical condition, Edwards explained.

Copco Asks Permit to Build Umpqua Dams

WASHINGTON (AP)—The California Oregon Power Co., Medford, Ore., Monday asked the Power Commission for permission to build two additional hydro-electric projects on the North Umpqua River in Oregon at a cost of \$19,916,700.

The company wants to amend the license it was granted Jan. 30, 1947, for its Takatee project so as to authorize the Lemolo No. 1 and Lemolo No. 2 projects in Douglas County.

Lemolo No. 1 would include a diversion dam about a mile downstream from the mouth of Lake Creek with an overall crest length of 885 feet and a maximum height of 120 feet. The reservoir would have an area of 415 acres. The power house would contain a 40,000-horsepower turbine connected to a 29,000-kilowatt outdoor-type generator.

Lemolo No. 2 would include a diversion dam 195 feet long and 25 feet high about 500 feet downstream from the mouth of Warm Springs Creek and Lemolo No. 1 powerhouse. The powerhouse would contain a 46,000-horsepower turbine connected to a 33,000-kilowatt outdoor-type generator.
