

Oregon Paint Contractors Here Today

What's new in paint, and in paint contracting, will be the talk all around today at a Salem convention of the Oregon Council of Painting and Decorating Contractors of America.

About 250 are expected for the three-day annual state meeting in the Marion Hotel, according to E. T. Armstrong, Salem contractor and convention chairman. First meeting is at 10 a.m. today.

Many paint manufacturers' and dealers' displays in the hotel will make a colorful backdrop for the convention.

New materials in the paint and decorating lines, selling techniques, apprenticeship standards and labor-management affairs are due for discussion.

A banquet meeting Friday evening will feature Dave Hoos, Salem radioman, as master of ceremonies, and C. H. Armstrong, state superintendent of parks, as speaker.

Most of the convention speakers and leaders, however, will be in the paint business. Fish Commission Engineers Need Not Be Registered

Employees of the engineering department of the state fish commission are not required to be registered professional engineers under the engineers' registration law, Attorney General George Neuner held Wednesday.

Neuner said the engineering department of the fish commission was restricted largely to designing and supervision of structures and mechanical devices used in connection with the "construction, maintenance and equipment of fish hatcheries and in the promotion of fish culture."

Drivers Draw Heavy Blame For Accidents

Despite the fact that police don't blame Salem's four 1952 traffic fatalities on drivers, there are plenty of other accidents—potentially fatal—for which they hold motorists responsible.

Those four deaths in nine months make this year already as bad as any since 1948. But in those four years the accidents within the city have climbed by 22 per cent and injuries by 47 per cent, while deaths have ranged from two to five per year.

Three of this year's fatalities were of children, running or riding into vehicles. Two-year-old Darrell Luke ran into Market Street on the night of May 21; 14-year-old Delene Schlottbauer rode her bicycle alongside a logging truck and under its wheels on State Street on Aug. 11, and 6-year-old Joseph Crockett ran in front of a car on Cross Street on Sept. 27.

The fourth victim listed is Mrs. Florence Reeves, who died Jan. 18. She was riding in a car involved in a minor collision on South Commercial Street on Jan. 6, and was not considered seriously enough injured to be kept in the hospital. Some officials question attributing this to traffic, because of Mrs. Reeves' previous heart condition.

However, the total accident picture is full of driver violations—some illegal, some merely discourteous or thoughtless. Statistics are not complete for this year, but 1951's 3,902 accidents reported in the city had 3,321 drivers in some type of violation. Only 98 accidents were without violation.

Topping violations were lack of right-of-way, improper start from parking and following too closely, but also included were such things as passing at intersection, failure to signal, wide turns, disregarding stop signs and lights, straddling traffic lanes.

The mishaps resulted in injury to 416 persons, compared with only 281 in 1948.

Sears Roebuck Warehouse Sold

Sale of the new Sears Roebuck Company warehouse in Salem, to be leased for Sears' use, was disclosed Wednesday.

The building and property, between Woodrow and Hall Streets east of Fairgrounds Roads, were sold to Kansas City Life Insurance Co. Consideration was indicated at \$162,000 by revenue stamps on the deed filed in Marion County recorder's office.

The property was held locally by Pioneer Trust Co., acting for the store firm. The transaction is typical of those employed by many large firms, in erecting buildings, then selling them to investment firms and leasing them back.

Many Scouts Eye Jamboree In California

Plans to send 156 Boy Scouts from the Cascade Area Scout Council to the scouts' national jamboree in California next summer, were revealed at the annual council planning conference Tuesday night in the Senator Hotel.

Cost per boy will be \$195. The scouts will leave by special train July 11 for the jamboree to be held near Santa Ana. They will be gone two weeks.

Council leaders also revealed a membership program designed to add 1,000 new boy members and 25 new scout units to council rolls during the next scout year. The council now has approximately 3,500 boys and 146 units.

In other business the 50 scout leaders present reelected the entire council officer staff. This included F. L. Thompson of Albany, president; E. P. Oppinger of Independence, W. W. McKinney of Salem and Ed Cardwell of Sweet Home, all vice presidents; William Phillips of Salem, treasurer, and William Baldwin of Lebanon, commissioner.

New district chairman appointed by Thompson include Charles Cammack of Albany, Calapooia, and North Marion districts; Kenneth Brown of Silverton, Silver Falls; Frank Hedges of Independence, Polk; and Marvin Clatterbuck of Salem, Cherry City.

Other new committee chairmen appointed include Douglas Parkes of Salem, council organization and extension committee; Lou Amort of Salem, camping and activities, and Ferris White of Albany, advancement.

GOP Candidate Target of Suit

TACOMA (AP)—A civil suit charging that Don Eastvold, Republican candidate for state attorney general, collected a state veteran's bonus of \$245 by false representation was filed in superior court Wednesday.

The suit was filed by a representative of Smith Troy, the Democratic attorney general who is Eastvold's political opponent in the Nov. 4 general election. It seeks to recover with interest the bonus paid Eastvold for his World War II service in the United States and Alaska with the Air Force.

Investigations, acting on a tip from a source not disclosed, found that Eastvold, in applying for a bonus in July, 1950, said he had been a resident of the state for one year and three months in 1942 and 1943 before entering the Air Corps.

It is alleged, however, that Eastvold actually lived in Washington only three months before going on active duty, Oct. 26, 1943. State law requires veterans to have been residents of Washington for one year before entering the service to be eligible for a bonus.

Atomic Energy, Helicopters on ORC Program

Helicopter and atomic energy trends will be explained to Army Reservists of the Salem area to night by officers from 6th Army headquarters at San Francisco.

National Guard and ROTC men may join with the reservists in the meeting at 8 p.m. in the Army Reserve Armory on Airport Road, according to Salem unit instructor, Maj. Wilfred H. Schaplow.

The speakers are to be Capt. John I. Farris and Lt. Ralph E. Houck. They comprise one of several instruction teams which make periodic tours to meet with reservists throughout the 6th Army area.

McCullough Appointed Deputy Attorney General

Appointment of J. R. McCullough, Salem, as assistant attorney general with assignment to the public utilities commission was announced by Attorney General George Neuner here Wednesday.

McCullough previously was employed in the state highway commission.

International Jitters Sends Stocks Down

NEW YORK (AP)—A bad case of international jitters sent the stock market rushing down Wednesday in the widest break of the year.

Volumes built up to one of the biggest totals this year, and the list broadened out to the widest in nearly two years.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped \$1.60, the heaviest fall this year. It is the greatest fall in the average since May 18, 1951, when it was off \$1.80. The average now stands at \$104.40. That is the lowest point in the current reaction from the peak of the year reached last Aug. 7.

The industrial component fell \$2.00, railroads fell \$1.50, and utilities were off 80 cents.

Volumes built up rapidly as the market declined. The total for the day was 1,730,000 shares, highest since April 14 when it was 1,730,000 shares.

The list broadened out fast to include 1,228 individual issues, the greatest number since Jan. 17, 1951, when 1,239 issues were traded.

There were 915 losers and only 120 gainers in the list, while 7 issues managed to reach new highs and 141 touched new lows for the year.

Three Firms Planning Area TV Service

WASHINGTON (AP)—Television service extending approximately 75 miles in all directions from Portland, Ore., is proposed by three companies who began Wednesday to present their case for a television channel assignment.

The companies, all seeking channel 12 in Portland, are Oregon Television Inc., Columbia Empire Telecasters Inc. and Northwest Television and Broadcasting Co.

All propose to use the maximum effective radiated power—316 kilowatts—permitted by the Communications Commission, and to locate antennas on heights.

Exhibits by engineers show the proposed service would include Salem, Ore., on the south and Kelso, Wash., on the north in the Grade A—best reception—area. The grade B—less reliable reception—area would extend south to Albany, Ore., north to Rydewood and Toledo, Wash., and west to the ocean, and east to Mosier, Ore.

Two of the applicants—Oregon Television and Northwest—propose to locate their transmitter tower and antenna on Healey Heights within the Portland city limits.

Columbia Empire proposes to set its antenna atop a tower now utilized by radio station KPOJ for its FM operation. KPOJ, a stockholder in Columbia Empire, is located on Mt. Scott in Clackamas County.

A brush fire at Roberts burned an estimated 20 acres of logged off land on the Glenn Powers farm, seven miles south of Salem on South River Road. The fire broke out Tuesday and a state forestry crew controlled it Wednesday by bulldozing a trail around it.

A fire breaking out on the Leonard Lee farm near Aumsville burned around 60 acres of grass land and brush before being controlled. At one time the turkey farm belonging to Oscar Mikkleson was threatened by the blaze. Departments from Aumsville, Turner and Sublimity answered the call for assistance.
