LOS ANGELES (AP)—Dynamic Dave Beck, old Daniel Tobin's "boy" moved up to head of the AFL-International Brotherhood of Teamsters Friday.

County to Get \$759,216 in School Funds

Marion County will receive \$759,216 as its share of the first half of the 1952-53 basic school support fund, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry announced Friday.

Marion county's allotment is the third highest in the state, out of a total of \$10,979,186 which will be distributed to 1,003 school districts in the state.

Multnomah County will get the largest share, \$3,131,214, followed by Lane County with \$1,276,733. Other allotments include: Linn, \$626,853; Polk, \$221,817 and Yamhill, \$337,094.

Ulbricht Slain, West German Report Claims

BONN, Germany (AP)—West German government officials said Friday night they are investigating rumors that Walter Ulbricht, East German Red leader, was killed by Polish anti-Communists aboard the Warsaw-Moscow Blue Express train.

Ulbricht is deputy premier of Soviet-occupied East Germany and boss of the ruling Communist Socialist Unity Party.

The independent Bremen newspaper Westkurier reported from Bonn that according to its information Ulbricht was riding the Blue Express when Polish anti-Red underground partisans derailed it.

It said all passengers not killed in the derailment were slain by partisans.

Oregon State Studies New Auto Engine

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A new automatically controlled-compression automobile engine that will give the same gasoline efficiency for driving in town as it does on the open road has been under study in the Oregon State College automotive engineering laboratory.

Controlled-compression is obtained by changing the compression ratio. A high ratio produces greater power and economy in automotive engines, according to W. H. Paul, OSC automotive engineering professor.

First tried on a one-cylinder engine, the idea was developed until it finally was used on a six-cylinder 1949 Oldsmobile. This car has traveled more than 45,000 miles, over all types of terrain, from near sea level to the top of 14,000-foot Pikes Peak.

Gasoline consumption at the various altitudes and seasonal temperature variations has remained nearly 30 per cent lower than the original Olds without the conversion. Under conditions, the test car obtained 26 miles a gallon as compared to 18 miles a gallon for an average auto.

Paul and I. B. Humphreys, Denver, Colo., inventor, achieved this controlled compression principle by installing a set of smaller cylinders and pistons above the regular cylinders.

This extra-cylinder set is used to open the gap between the top of the power cylinders and the head of the engine when the maximum fuel-knocking mixture is in the cylinder and while the car is operated at lower speeds. Oil pressure from the regular lubricating system is used to operate the auxiliary cylinders, Paul said.

When the car is at wide open throttle with the engine turning over about 4,000 revolutions a minute, the extra cylinders boost the compression ratio to 12 to 1. An ordinary auto has a 7-1 fixed compression ratio.

The horsepower is increased from 15 to 20 per cent above that of conventional engines at that speed—and without knock or ping. The first public announcement of the engine was made at the annual meeting of the Society of Automotive Engineers in Chicago last October.

Junction City Man Charged With Thefts

Thomas E. Culver, 25, of Junction City, was bound over to the grand jury Friday on charges of burglarizing two stores in Turner and Aumsville last Sunday night.

Culver waived preliminary examination in Marion County District Court. He was being held in jail in lieu of \$7,000 bail. He is charged with burglary not in a dwelling, involving entry of Keel and Del's Grill and Meyer's IGA Store, both in Turner.

These were two of five firms entered the same night in the two towns. James Findley and Albert Sturtevant also are charged in the case, but have not yet appeared in court. They and Culver are serving 10-day vagrancy sentences in Salem city jail.

Philippines Lawyer in Salem to Study Types of State Financing

Part of a six-month study in finance and budgeting in the United States being made in Oregon by Dominador R. Aytona, of the Philippine Islands, who arrived Thursday for a two weeks stay in Salem.

Aytona, making this study under an international exchange program created by the 80th Congress, is one of many representatives of under-privileged countries studying the United States means of finance.

"Studying Oregon, an agriculture state, is very similar to my country," Aytona expressed in perfect, smooth flowing English. Already he has studied state governments in Washington, New York, Michigan, Arizona, New Mexico and California. After leaving Oregon he will spend some time in Illinois, Wisconsin, Kentucky, Indiana, the Virginias, Georgia, Massachusetts and then to Washington, D.C. before returning to the Philippines.

The good looking, nattily dressed young man from the Philippines, eager to speak of his country and how much he wants to help his people, is something of a government figure in his own country. Having spent most of his life in Manila, Aytona was educated there and went on to the University of Manila, later receiving a degree of law from that school. As well as being financial adviser to the Philippine Senate, he has his own law practice in Manila and teaches at the University nights.

Aytona began his two-week stay in Salem with interviews and assistance in his study from the State Office of Finance and Administration. With this, his first, stay in the United States almost half over, he expressed eagerness to take his findings back to the Philippines. "My people suffered greatly during the invasion and now we are looking for assistance in the means for getting back on our feet," he said. "I would say that my country is about 60 per cent recovered from the recent war, but there is much to be done."

His visit to the United States is part of the Congressional act under the directorship of the Department of State's International Exchange of Persons, Washington, D.C.

Launched Saturday's attack at 5:30 a.m., the Americans moved toward their objective under a screen of mortar and artillery fire. They were opposed by heavy Chinese mortar and artillery but only light small arms fire.

The Reds kept banging away with mortars and artillery in covering their withdrawal, to nearby Papa-San Mountain.

Friday night at 11:05, a Chinese Red battalion—between 500 and 750 men—had attacked from Pike's Peak. They got within grenade-throwing range before the Americans drove them back at 1 a.m.

"Our flares showed one group of 100 Chinese moving back to Pike's Peak carrying 100 more killed or wounded," Farneti said.

About 90 guns of five U. S. battalions Friday night fired a time-on-target barrage on a Communist command post and staging area north of Triangle Hill. A time-on-target barrage is one in which the guns fire so that their shells all land on the target at the same moment.

On nearby Sniper Ridge, South Korean troops Friday night and early Saturday turned back three big Communist assaults.

New Global Money Issued

PARIS (AP)—The world got a new international "currency" Friday, the "unum" issued at part with the dollar.

The unum was issued as a sort of mutual aid bond by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to facilitate transfer of educational and scientific works from one country to another. The bond can be used only by the institution to which it is issued.

UNESCO explained it took the title "unum" from the Latin word for one. It did not say whether the plural should be unums or una.

U. S. Protests Soviet Attack On Superfort

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States charged Russia Friday with wanton destruction of an unarmed B-29 American bomber near Japan and warned Moscow of possible grave consequences from such "reckless" attacks.

A protest note couched in some of the strongest terms the United States has used in relations with the Soviets demanded compensation for the plane and any of its crew of eight men who may have perished.

It disappeared Oct. 7 and Moscow contended it violated Soviet frontiers by flying in the area of the Russian-occupied Yuriland.

Denying this, the U. S. accused Moscow of "calculated misrepresentation of the facts."

It urged the Soviet government "seriously to consider the grave consequences which can flow from its reckless practice, if persisted in, of attacking without provocation the aircraft of other states."

The protest was delivered to the foreign office in Moscow by Embassy Counselor Elim O'Shaughnessy and immediately made public by the State Department.

The Far East episode was the fourth in which Soviet fighters have destroyed or forced down American planes. It almost coincided with the Oct. 8 attack by two Soviet fighter planes on an American hospital aircraft near Berlin. This plane landed safely.

Grains Move Ahead Smartly

CHICAGO (AP)—Grains moved ahead smartly at the board of trade Friday on some new flour business and prospects of exports in wheat, new export business in corn, and additional reports of poor progress by the winter wheat crop.

Wheat was influenced primarily by reports from the southwest. The five day weather forecast indicated little or no rain, and a Kansas authority described conditions in that state as the poorest in 30 to 40 years.

Peron Says Eva's Estate to Be Used For Social Work

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Eva Peron's estate will be used for social work and her jewels as collateral for bank loans for poor people to build homes, President Peron announced Friday.

The size of the estate left by the president's late wife has never been disclosed publicly. Peron said the Eva Foundation would be established to manage the "many million pesos" produced in royalties by Mrs. Peron's book, "The Reason for My Life." The peso, at the free exchange rate, is worth about 7 1/4 U. S. cents.

A government spokesman read a chapter from a posthumous book by Mrs. Peron, "My Message," expected to bring in additional royalties when published.

Gas Income Up; Dividend Declared

Directors of Portland Gas & Coke company Thursday declared a dividend of 20 cents per share on common stock, it was announced by J. A. H. Dodd, Salem district manager. The dividend is payable Nov. 15, to stockholders of record at the close of business Nov. 5.

Net income for the 12-month

period ended Sept. 30 amounted to \$1,006,514, up \$103,315, an increase of 11.4 per cent. Current net income was equivalent to \$1.84 per share as compared with \$1.65 per share for the preceding 12 months. Gas sales were up 4 per cent, accounting for an increase of \$468,200 in gas revenues. By-products reached new highs for both gross sales and net revenues, according to Dodd.
