

Silverton-Mt. Angel Crucial Next

WV Loop Title Seen, Winner

Top Football Battle Slated Friday Night

The 1952 Willamette Valley League and District 4 A-2 football championships are the crux of the Silverton-Foxes and Mt. Angel Preps will be shooting for next Friday night in their eight o'clock clash on Silverton's McGinnis Field, the feature of this week's round in WV play.

Coach Muri Anderson's Silver Foxes, aiming for their first league title, have won five straight WVL victories and another outside the league for an unblemished season to date. Gene Barrett's Preps aren't much worse off in league play with four wins and a tie. And since both teams have second-division opponents to play in their final games next week, all the more emphasis is placed on the biggie of Friday at Silverton.

Canby plays at Mt. Angel next week and Silverton goes to Sandy for finals.

Other Games Listed

While Silverton and Mt. Angel are battling for what should be the title Friday night, other WVL games have Molalla at Canby, Estacada at Dallas and Sandy at Woodburn, all starting at eight o'clock.

In last week's round Silverton downed Molalla 19-12. Mt. Angel beat Woodburn 19-7. Dallas and Sandy scrapped to a 12-12 tie and Canby blaster Estacada 33-12.

The Silverton-Mt. Angel mix could well be an offensive spectacle. The Foxes have solid scoring potential in Captain Dean Stiles and Jack Todd, who lug the leather from Anderson's single wing system. On the other hand the Preps, also a single wing team, have big Wes Lightfoot as their chief threat and Larry Ebner, Fran Traeger and Loren Tree to back him up impressively.

Krupicka Leads Scorers

Molalla's George Krupicka continues to lead the individual scoring race after five games with 48 points. Lightfoot isn't far behind at 42 points and Still has 41. Those three are far ahead of the field.

In comparative scoring against common foes this season, Mt. Angel downed Dallas 25-7 while Silverton did it only by a 14-13 count. The Preps beat Woodburn 19-7. Silverton accomplished it 14-0. Silverton beat Molalla 19-12, but Mt. Angel was tied by the Indians 13-13. Silverton beat Estacada 38-0. Mt. Angel did it 28-0.

Spartans No Soft Touch For Viks in Next Clash

For their first three games this season the Corvallis Spartans appeared to be one of the weaker Class A-1 football teams in the state. They lost to Newberg 14-7 and to Bend 34-6 before getting by a so-so Lebanon eleven 18-6.

But since then Coach Dick Twenge's crew has shown a steady improvement. Which is bad tidings for the Salem Vikings since they play the Sparts next Friday at Corvallis.

After their poor start the Spartans have dumped Gresham 19-13, lost to powerful Eugene only 12-6 and knocked over a right rugged Springfield outfit. Salem tied Gresham 13-13 here last Friday night, and looked good in the process.

Coach Dick Twenge's Corvallis team, led by 155-pound Fullback Wendell Scott who scored three touchdowns himself, did a man-sized job in beating Springfield last weekend, for the Millers are roundly considered as one of the tougher prep elevens in Oregon. The Millers came within a whisker of topping No. 1 ranked Marshfield recently.

Consequently the Salmons have their work cut out for them Friday night, and with this in mind

Oklahoma, tied by Colorado in the first game of the season but victor over Pitt, Texas and Kansas on successive Saturdays, was liked enough to rate 23 first place votes and 913 points.

California, which received 21 No. 1 votes a week ago, dropped to nine this week and others tapered off from there.

The Golden Bears continued unbeaten by thrashing Santa Clara 27-7. Georgia Tech won its fifth of the season by downing Auburn, 38-0. Duke belted North Carolina State, 57-0.

Southern California and UCLA, reflecting the upsurge of power on the Pacific Coast, maintained all-winning records.

Southern Cal won over Oregon State, 28-6, while UCLA triumphed Stanford, 24-14.

The top ten is in for a reshuffling this week with three games involving members of the select group. California plays Southern Cal at Los Angeles. Duke meets Virginia at Charlottesville, Va. UCLA travels to Wisconsin.

Michigan State is host to unbeaten but once tied Penn State, Maryland faces LSU, Oklahoma vies with Kansas State and Georgia Tech meets Vanderbilt.

Trojan Chief Hopeful, Cal's Waldorf Glum

LOS ANGELES (U) — Coach Jess Hill of Southern California voiced respect and defiance for the California football team Monday, declaring "we believe the Bears are the No. 1 team in the nation and we'll be out to whip them" in the game here Saturday.

Coach Red Sanders, obviously pleased with the improved offense of his UCLA team and its win over Stanford, told the weekly football writers luncheon he hopes the Bruins will not suffer a let-down against Wisconsin of the Big Ten at Madison this week.

Between Big Ones

Sanders referred to the fact that the Wisconsin non-conference game comes between the important battles with Stanford and California.

Hill praised the California offense which leads the nation and said the Trojans will have to score at least three touchdowns to beat the Bears.

He intimated he'll use a variety of backfield combinations, possibly with Halfbacks Jimmy Sears and Al Carmichael in the same group.

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf, coach of the undefeated California Bears, said Saturday his team must show 100 per cent improvement to have a chance with similarly unbeaten Southern California in the coast's football "game of the week" Saturday at Los Angeles.

The bulky mentor painted a somewhat gloomy picture in his talk before the football writers.

Asked directly as to California's chances, he replied: "We have a chance to win but everything has to break right for us. If we are to be in the game we must improve 100 per cent. We will have to move against their defense. We can't fumble against them. And we can't afford to make any mistakes in our kicking."

Waldorf said his scouts report that USC is the best defensive team on the coast, if not in the country.

"They tell me that George Timberlake is a better linebacker than Pat Cannamela was last season. He is more mobile and an excellent pass defender."

The California coach pointed out that USC had intercepted 14 passes and ran back four for touchdowns this season.

Waldorf said his team played its poorest offensive game in winning from Santa Clara 27-1 last Saturday.

UCLA's stock rose with its 24-14 win over Stanford. In fact, the less impressive record of the Bruins could be deceiving. The caliber of UCLA's opposition Oregon, TCU, Washington and Rice the others might be a shade stronger than that faced by Cal or SC.

The Bruins, like SC, have shown themselves a resourceful bunch, quick to convert breaks into touchdowns.

But unless Paul Cameron is able to operate, the UCLA offense is not exactly smashing.

Ailing Cameron, who pitched three first half touchdowns against Stanford, is again a doubtful quantity for the Wisconsin test.
