

Trio Involved In Accident Held for Police

Two young Salem men and a Woodburn youth, involved in a motorcycle accident Oct. 1 while eluding arrest, face grand larceny charges in Portland, it was revealed Wednesday.

One of the lads, Melvin Lee Dunafon, 23, lies unconscious at Salem General Hospital in the same critical condition he was after the accident. He was brought to the hospital after the motorcycle on which he and Robert L. Krebs, 19, Woodburn, and Svend Toycon, 18, Salem, were riding, shot off the Salem-Silverton highway and into heavy gravel on the night of Oct. 1. The trio were pursued by a Salem officer as they sped through town and out the Silverton Road. Krebs, it was reported by his doctor Wednesday, was transferred Tuesday from Salem General Hospital to the Oregon State Hospital as a result of a severe concussion received in the wreck. His condition was described as a post-concussion psychosis.

Least injured in the wreck, when the motorcycle went out of control, was Toycon who was taken to Portland to answer the Multnomah County grand larceny charge involving theft of a \$165 doorknob. The coat was listed by Multnomah County as stolen sometime immediately prior to the three men's accident.

Reds Advance In Indochina

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — The Black River town of Van Yen fell Wednesday before a Vietnamese offensive straining French Union lifelines in the "Little Korea" of Northwest Indochina.

The Communist-led, black-uniformed rebels swarmed in by the thousands from the sector of Nghia Lo, which they captured Saturday, to put traffic on the upper Black River under their guns.

Outnumbered French Union infantrymen and parachute troops fought doggedly in the rugged mountains near the caramel-colored waterway in an effort to stem the offensive.

The Vietnamese advanced steadily between Van Yen, a coal mining town 80 miles west of Hanoi, and the area of Quinh Nhai, a Black River port only about 50 miles south of Communist China's frontier.

Fire at Remote Nevada Village Claims Pair

BURNS (AP) — A man and his wife died in a cabin fire at the remote village of Denio on the Nevada border early Monday, Sheriff Eldon Stibb has been advised.

Neighbors drove 90 miles to report the fire that claimed the lives of Charles R. Mehret, 75, and his wife, Bertha, 54, since the area has no phone service.

Germ Warfare 'Confessions' Due to Torture

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force Association said Wednesday the Communists tortured the two U. S. Air Force fliers into making false confessions that they took part in germ warfare.

The fliers are Lt. John S. Quinn, 30, Altadena, Calif., and Lt. Kenneth L. Enoch, 27, Youngstown, Ohio.

They have been prisoners of the Communists since their B-26 bomber failed to return from a night mission in North Korea last Jan. 13.

An article in Air Force magazine, published by the association—an organization of Air Force members and veterans—said Quinn and Enoch are "innocent victims of one of history's most infamous hoaxes."

Its author, Air Force Col. John J. Driscoll, said information he gathered in Hong Kong, Indochina, India and elsewhere in the Far East pointed to the use by the Communists of the same type of "brainwashing" as was employed against Cardinal Mindszenty, American businessman Robert Vogel and many others to obtain dramatic "confessions."

U. N. Approves Korea Debate

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The powerful U. N. Political Committee Wednesday night approved top billing for an immediate debate on Korea. The vote was 51 in favor, five (Soviet bloc) opposed and four countries abstaining.

The committee also voted to give the number two spot on its work list to the Tunisian case and the third place to the dispute over Morocco.

A strong Soviet bloc drive to put ahead of all other business an omnibus Polish resolution on Korea and other subjects was beaten down overwhelmingly, 44 to 5. The United States, Britain and France put up a solid front for immediate debate on Korea.

Heart Attack Blamed for Albany Woman's Death

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Mrs. Sarah Hannah Austin, 82, died of a heart attack and not in a traffic accident, an autopsy showed Tuesday. Police first believed Mrs. Austin had been a traffic victim when she was found dead on the street.

Hurricane Aims At Gale-Battered Florida Sector

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The sixth hurricane of the season spawned in the Caribbean Sea Wednesday 800 miles south of Miami while Florida still was being battered by the worst northeast storm in years.

A Navy hurricane-hunting plane reported savage 85 mile per hour winds on the east side of the storm's poorly defined center.

The Weather Bureau immediately named it Fox for F, the sixth letter in the alphabet. Fox was expected to move slowly northward toward Cuba and Florida and intensify some during the next 24 hours. It's estimated speed was six to eight miles per hour.

U. N. Employee Suspended For Silence

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie Wednesday fired one American U. N. employee who refused to answer questions of the McCarran Committee, suspended another and put 10 on special leave pending further investigation.

Lie announced he fired Stanley Graze of the Technical Assistance Administration for refusing to tell a congressional committee hearing whether he is "presently engaged in espionage activities against the United States."

Joel Gordon of the Department of Economic Affairs was suspended pending a complete investigation for refusing to tell whether he was "now engaged in any subversive activities against the United States government."

Dolls Have Fashion Show

NEW YORK (AP)—A fashion show for dolls was held at the Hotel Pierre recently in which the dolls were presented in frocks created especially for them by many of America's leading designers.

The show was a benefit for the Spanish-Chapin Adoption School and part of the admission fee was the donation of a doll of any size, shape or value to be sold at a later benefit.

The dolls had hairdos arranged by the designers' favorite hairdressers and they were carried by manikins similarly dressed.

Steve Anderson Invited to Talk In Midwest for Gov. Stevenson

Salem Attorney Steve Anderson returned to Salem Wednesday from the East with an invitation from the national Volunteers for Stevenson to take the stump in the Midwest for the Democratic Presidential candidate.

Anderson said the invitation was extended to him Tuesday night in Chicago, where he talked with Gov. Adlai Stevenson and other Democratic leaders shortly before the presidential candidate made a nationwide television address.

Anderson visited Chicago on his way back to Salem from New York City, where Monday he was named president of the National Republicans for Stevenson. Anderson, former national vice chairman of Federation of Young Republican Clubs, recently announced he was resigning his position in order to support the candidacy for Stevenson.

He said the organization which he now heads will seek to encourage other similarly dissatisfied Republicans into organizing to support Stevenson. Most of the actual work, Anderson said, will be done from the New York headquarters.

The young Salem attorney said he has not decided yet whether he will be asked to accept the speaking invitation, "though I would like to very much," he added. He said it would take him away for almost a week from his law practice.

During his Eastern trip, Anderson had a short visit with Sen. Wayne Morse. He said Morse also had been asked by Stevenson.

8 Candidates For Woodburn Council Posts

WOODBURN—Eight candidates Wednesday appeared to be in the running for Woodburn's four City Council posts. Friday is the deadline for filing for the Nov. 4 election.

For mayor, petitions were being circulated for Mayor Elmer Mattson and there was speculation that another candidate would file. Mattson is completing his third two-year term.

James J. (Jeff) Anderson and Dr. James R. Deagan have filed for the two westside council posts, and a petition was circulating for Charles Cornwell. The incumbents, Howard Leighty and T. L. Workman have not filed.

For the two eastside posts, William C. Bee, Arthur Burt and Layman Baird have filed and petitions were out for the incumbents, Jess Fiken and Howard Quigley. Fiken has served for six years. Quigley was appointed to the council 18 months ago.

City Recorder Mark Thompson and City Treasurer Glen Goulet have filed for re-election without opposition to date. All of the municipal terms are for two years.
