

State Voter Signup -New High; Absentee Ballot Limit Today

Today is the final day for either voting or mailing absentee ballots in Marion and all other Oregon counties, Marion County Clerk Henry C. Mattson reported.

Registered voters, who will not be in the county of the registration on Nov. 4 election day may come to county clerk's offices for the last time today and vote.

Marion County clerk's office will close at 5 p. m. in the past week approximately 50 voters per day have cast absentee ballots, Mattson said. Another 150 ballots have been mailed out each day to residents now out of the county, who have requested them.

Clerk's office helpers estimated the number of absentee ballots cast in person at the clerk's office for the coming election to be at an all-time high. Lines of voters piled up in front of the clerk's counters all day Thursday.

Demo Leader Says Mahoney 'Embarrasses'

PORTLAND (AP)—The state Democratic chairman disavowed State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland Democrat, Thursday, and touched off a party wrangle.

Chairman Howard Morgan, Monmouth, called for a law that did not require party officials to sign candidates' statements in the official Voters' Pamphlet.

Morgan disavowed Mahoney in a statement that said Mahoney was "a leading source of embarrassment, first to the Republican and later to the Democratic parties." Morgan accused Mahoney of making inaccuracies in the Voters' Pamphlet statement, Mahoney is running for re-election.

Mahoney retorted the law would be all right with him, for "I was embarrassed at having their names there."

Volney Martin, a candidate for state senator in the Portland district and secretary of the state Democratic party, joined Morgan in the disavowal.

William H. Way, chairman of Multnomah County Democrats, then took up Mahoney's side.

U. S. Heiress Weds Scottish Lord Ogilvy

LONDON (AP)—A pretty heiress to American millions, Virginia Fortune Ryan, was married to dashing Scottish nobleman, Lord Ogilvy in a glittering society show that thrilled austerity-weary Londoners Thursday.

Princess Margaret was there with a smile and a handshake for the 28-year-old bridegroom—a former boy friend—and his radiant American bride, 19, shimmering in white satin.

Two of Margaret's other boy friends were there too—Polio-playing Billy Wallace, who is still "eligible," and the Earl of Dalkeith, who is engaged to a pretty commoner, June McNell.

A thousand guests, including Queen Mother Elizabeth and four other members of royalty packed fashionable St. Margaret's Church in Parliament Square for the 45-minute ceremony.

The wedding united one of the wealthiest families of the United States with one of Scotland's oldest and most aristocratic clans.

The bride's industrialist father, John Barry Ryan of New York and Newport, R. I., is the grandson of Thomas Fortune Ryan, American financier who died a multimillionaire in 1928. The bride's maternal grandfather was the late Otto Kahn, millionaire banker.

Ogilvy is heir to the 11th Earl of Airlie. His family's nobility dates back to the 17th century.

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Linn Telephone Firm Sold to Power Company

LEBANON — Purchase of a controlling interest in the Linn County Telephone Co., by Mountain States Power Co., was announced Thursday by the two firms.

Sale of all 900 shares of common stock in the telephone company for \$303,000 was disclosed by presidents of both companies. Application to acquire stock was filed with the Public Utilities Commission by Mountain States Power Co. The stock has a par value of \$100 per share.

A. W. Trimble, Albany, president of the power company, said Linn County Telephone Co. will retain its present name and there will be little change in personnel. He said dial service for Lebanon and Sweet Home is proposed.

The Linn County Telephone Co. serves Lebanon, Sweet Home and Brownsville. Mountain States Power Co. serves most of the area with power and Lebanon with water, also. It has provided telephone service for 10 Montana communities for 30 years.

Mrs. Ethel A. Bauman, president of the Linn County Telephone Co., said preferred stock was not involved in the transaction.

Jury Indicts Grunewald for Query Silence

WASHINGTON (AP)—Henry W. Grunewald, Washington, mystery man and wirepuller, was indicted by a federal grand jury Thursday on 22 counts of contempt of Congress.

If convicted, he would be liable to a maximum sentence of 22 years in prison or a \$22,000 fine or both. However, such maximum penalties are rarely imposed.

Grunewald is known as "The Dutchman."

He was accused of "willful and deliberate" refusal to tell a tax investigating committee about his relations with high officials of the Internal Revenue Bureau.

The House ways and means committee tried five times to get Grunewald to tell them about his Washington activities, his friendship with those in high places and his interest in five and six-figure tax cases.

Rep. King (D-Calif.), chairman of the inquiry group said Grunewald made no claim of privilege against self-incrimination, but just clammed up.

In 1950 he refused to answer some questions by a Senate committee which was digging into alleged wire-tapping in Washington. The committee recommended that the Senate cite him for contempt, but the Senate never acted on the recommendation.

Records show that Grunewald is a native of South Africa and became an American citizen in 1909. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War I. After working as a prohibition agent he became a private investigator here.

NY to Chicago 'Kidnaping' Just a Prank

NEW YORK (AP)—Collegian Gordon Butler can go along with a gag—all the way to Chicago, even.

The 20-year-old Columbia University freshman was "kidnaped" by sophomores Wednesday, bound up with gauze like a mummy, and shipped by plane to Chicago.

"It is all in the tradition and I go along with it wholeheartedly," he said as he got back to New York Thursday.

Sophomores passed the hat to pay his \$51 plane fare back.

Butler, son of an East Providence, R. I., auto dealer, set a record for Columbia's annual sophomore-freshman "fun week." The farthest a freshman ever was spirited before was to Jones Beach on Long Island.

The sophomores took Butler to La Guardia field and carried him kicking and struggling aboard a Chicago-bound plane.

When the bewitched Butler kicked up a fuss, the sophomores just told everyone to pay no attention, that it was just a college gag.

On the plane, someone untied Butler. In Chicago he asked the aid of police who notified Columbia authorities.

A university spokesman said nobody minds these prankish kidnappings during fun week. There have been plenty of them in other years. But the victims never ended up in Chicago before.

"I'd never been west of Connecticut," commented Butler.

Kenya's Chief's Killers Hunted

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP)—The slaughter of a senior Kikuyu chief who tried to break up a secret ceremony of anti-white Mau Mau terrorists sparked a gigantic man-hunt Thursday.

Chief Nderi, 70, was hacked to death Wednesday night by the knives of frenzied tribesmen. One policeman of his three-man bodyguard was butchered with him.

The other two are missing.

Twenty-one persons, mainly old men and women, were rounded up swiftly by British troops and police who launched only Tuesday a colony-wide campaign to crush the Mau Mau.

Waksman Wins Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Dr. Selman A. Waksman, a Russian-born American scientist, was awarded the 1952 Nobel prize in medicine Thursday night for unlocking the earth mold the wonder drug streptomycin as the first effective antibiotic against tuberculosis.

Dr. Waksman, 64, is director of the Institute of Microbiology at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N. J. He is the co-discoverer of the drug which was made known to the medical world in 1943.

King Gustaf Adolf of Sweden will award the prize to Dr. Waksman at the traditionally colorful Nobel ceremonies in Stockholm Dec. 10. The Nobel winners in literature, physics and chemistry will be announced Nov. 6. There is no Nobel peace prize this year—the second time since World War II it has been skipped.

Dee Farrar Dies in Salem; Rites Today
