JEFFERSON — Walton Jesse Looney, 76, grandson of pioneers who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1843, died unexpectedly Friday.

The son of Jesse W. and Mary Gonsauls Looney, he was born May 23, 1876, on the home farm southeast of Jefferson.

Looney was the last principal at Jefferson Institute and spent most of his life farming in this community.

Surviving besides his widow and son are a daughter, Mrs. Ruby Wynd, and one granddaughter, both of Jefferson.

Ranch Ramblings

By LILLIE L. MADSEN Farm Editor, The Statesman. Mushroom growers from this area plan to attend a lecture on the subject Saturday night at Elliott Hall, Reed College, by Dr. A. H. Smith. The talk will start at 7:30.

Dr. Smith, professor of botany at University of Michigan, has been collecting mushrooms on Mt. Rainier and in various Oregon localities for the past month. He is appearing Saturday at the invitation of the Oregon Mycological Society.

Mid-Willamette Valley Holstein breeders and other dairy folk plan to attend the Oct. 27-28 auction at Sauvie Island where some 190 head of Holstein cattle will be sold in one of the largest dairy dispersal sales on record in Oregon.

Omar C. Spencer Jr. reports he is disposing of his dairy herd to go into beef cattle exclusively, "because there is less work involved." The Holsteins, Spencer said, will be replaced with 350 head of Hereford Stocker steers and heifers.

Known as Morgan's Landing Farm for many years, the Spencer place has been a dairy farm since 1940.

Bob Stanley, Paramount, Calif., is the auctioneer, and Tony Abst, Hillsboro, who clerked last Saturday's Guernsey sale at Salem, will also clerk this.

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition went out of business Thursday in its present location, when the Air Force leased the show's big 11-acre plant here for a warehouse at an annual rental approximating \$140,000.

Continuation of the 42-year-old exposition, which had made Portland the center of the purebred livestock industry in the Northwest, hinges on a proposal for construction by the city of Portland of a new memorial community center and park on the former Vanport site.

T. B. Wilcox, president of the P-I, said that an attempt would be made to preserve the continuity of the exposition, by holding a junior livestock show somewhere next year, but no full-scale exposition could be held until a new plant has been built.

The Portland City Council, acting as a committee under the chairmanship of Commissioner Ormand R. Bean, has under study a proposal that the city take over the P-I plant and the George White Servicemen's Center and use the revenues to help finance a new community and sports center.

A Clark County (Washington) herd of 250 swine, infected with the swine disease, vesicular exanthema, has been condemned by federal and state officials.

The animals owned by Phil Krupicka, Sifton, nine miles east of Vancouver, were being slaughtered Friday.

The outbreak of the disease was the first in southwestern Washington and brought a quarantine against movement of hogs from Clark, Lewis and Cowlitz Counties.

An earlier quarantine in Washington state was removed Oct. 9. This is the first outbreak in the Pacific Northwest since that of mid-summer which brought quarantines to Marion and Multnomah counties, which were subsequently removed when danger was over.

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Fluoridation Loses, Albany

ALBANY — A proposal to add fluorides to Albany's water supply was vetoed this week by the City Council.

The Council followed the recommendation of a nonpartisan committee of fluoridation. A letter from E. J. Kingsley, chairman, said the committee recommended against fluoridation "until experiments now in progress prove beyond a reasonable doubt that there will not be harmful physical effects; and until the constitutional aspects of the addition of fluorides to public water for preventing dental cavities have been more adequately determined.
