Looney, 76, grandson of pioneers who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1843, died unexpectedly Fri-Scotland, and the United States. day. He collapsed while working in the fruit dryer on his farm at the south city limits of Jefferson. He had been in good health and cause of his death was not determined immediately.

The son of Jesse W, and Mary Clark. Gunsaules Looney, he was born May 23, 1876, on the home farm southeast of Jefferson. His grandparents, Jesse and Ruby Bond Looney homesteaded in the community north of here which bears their name.

The deceased attended the old Jefferson Institute, one of Oregon's earliest schools, and graduin 1897. There he met Martha Jefferson Area ated from Drain Normal School Bridges whom he married on April 26, 1899, at Lebanon. They Folk Hospitalized observed their Golden Wedding in 1949.

Looney was the last principal at Jefferson Institute 'and spent most of his life farming in this community. He was a member of Jefferson Christian Church and the Albany Elks Lodge, had served on the Jefferson schoolboard and City Council, and was the father of Gilbert Looney, present mayor.

Surviving besides his widow and son are a daughter, Mrs. Ruby Wynd, and one granddaughter, both of Jefferson. Services will be held at 2:30






