

Pilot Missing After Attempt To Tame Gale

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Gordon Clauser, 40-year-old Norman, Okla., man missing since his plane was reported going down off Miami Saturday night, may have been the victim of a hurricane he tried to tame with a secret formula.

His wife told the Miami Herald that Clauser had come here to fly into the storm so he could scatter his pellets in the turbulent skies. She said he was confident he could end the hurricane.

Clauser operated a hail prevention company the past two years and believed he stopped a tornado near Plainview, Tex., last year, Mrs. Clauser said.

The amateur hurricane hunter flew to Miami in his single-engine metal Luscombe last week when he read reports of the hurricane forming near Swan Island in the Caribbean Sea.

"He was there on his own," his wife told the Herald from her home in Oklahoma. "I have no doubt that he was in front of the hurricane, seeding the clouds."

"He didn't want anyone to know what he was doing, because he wanted to test his theory. He had a theory that he could stop it."

Clauser took off from Miami International Airport at 3:45 p.m. Saturday, telling the control tower he was going to West Palm Beach.

Mrs. Clauser said the plane could carry enough fuel for about five and a half hours flying.

It was 9:28 p.m.—five hours and 43 minutes after his takeoff—that the Civil Aeronautics Administration received a faint radio message from him. He said he was lost "over water" and thought he was south southeast of Miami.

The second and final message from the plane said "I am running out of gas and descending. Give my love to my wife."

Both Demo, GOP Leaders See Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—A prediction that Dwight D. Eisenhower would be elected president by taking between 310 and 395 electoral votes was made Sunday by Walter Williams, national chairman of the citizens for Eisenhower-Nixon organization.

Williams said his forecast was based on a state-by-state survey conducted by his organization. To be elected president, a candidate needs 266 electoral votes.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Frank E. McKinney, former Democratic National Chairman, predicted Sunday that his party will win the presidency with at least 294 electoral votes — 28 more than the minimum needed.

McKinney is an Indianapolis banker who retired as party chairman after the nomination of Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois for president.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr., the Republican leader in the House, predicted Sunday a GOP election victory and said Gov. Dwight D. Eisenhower may carry 30 to 35 states, including several in the South.

In the House race, Martin said, "my reports indicate that the Republicans will have a minimum of 230 seats," which would be a gain of about 30. "If a landslide is in the making," he added, "the figure could go as high as 250 or higher."

"By the very nature of this election," he went on, "the contest for the Senate is close, but once more maximum organizational effort can give Gen. Eisenhower a workable majority in the Senate."

Injured Marines in 'Good' Condition

Two Marines injured when their auto failed to negotiate a turn late Saturday night were said by Salem Memorial Hospital authorities to be in a "good" condition Sunday.

The two, Cpl. Raymond Taylor Rose, Salem, and Pfc. Edward Berning, Adrian, Minn., were taken unconscious to the hospital following the accident, but recovered sometime Sunday.

State police reported the car, driven by Rose, failed to make a turn just west of Aumsville on the Turner Road and struck a fence at the Donker Brothers farm. The auto went out of control and overturned between two fence posts. Police report the car to be a total loss. No citation was made.

Arvey Doubts Adlai Would Keep Acheson

NEW YORK (AP)—Jacob Arvey, Democratic national committee man from Illinois, said Sunday night he doubted that Gov. Adlai Stevenson would keep Secretary of State Dean Acheson in the Cabinet if he is elected president.

Arvey, who helped push Stevenson for the Democratic presidential nomination, said on the NBC television program, "Meet the Press":

"In my opinion, I don't think he'll keep him (Acheson). I don't think there's a man that he'll reappoint just because he's there."

Earlier, Arvey had attempted to parry the question, saying: "Only one man can answer that question—Governor Stevenson."

"He has not discussed the cabinet with me."

Then, he added: "In my opinion, Governor Stevenson will attempt to do in Washington what he did in Illinois and what he did in this campaign and that is to pick a new team."

Pressed for elaboration, he said he thought Acheson would go.

Arvey said his attention first was called to Gov. Stevenson by Gov. James Byrne of South Carolina who now is opposing the Democratic presidential candidate. Byrne formerly was secretary of state.

Arvey said Byrne had told him and others that "we had in Illinois a man who was a gold nugget; that when a job needed to be done in this country, or in another country that needed a man of character and ability" Governor Stevenson was the man to handle it.

"I feel that I have done something for my country when I, a son of immigrants, have brought a man like this into public life," Arvey said.

Duck Hunter's Body Found

PORTLAND (AP)—The body of a duck hunter, missing in the Columbia River near Bridal Veil, was found Sunday night.

He was James Herbert Coates, 49, Boring. Still missing is his son, James Jr., 24.

The two were believed to have drowned Saturday when their boat overturned as they were en route to Sand Island to a duck hunting blind.

Buffalo Police Deny Ike's Aides Beaten

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—Police Commissioner Michael C. Noeppel, a Republican, denied Sunday night an allegation that three members of the entourage of Dwight D. Eisenhower were beaten by Buffalo policemen Thursday.

Noeppel further denied the truth of an assertion that he telephoned an apology to the men in Detroit. Marty Snyder, 40, said in New York Saturday night that the alleged beating took place outside the auditorium where the Republican presidential candidate spoke that night.

Snyder, who was Eisenhower's mess sergeant in World War II, and his companions were arrested on charges of creating a disturbance, resisting arrest and abusing an officer.

"I am a Republican myself and I want to see Eisenhower elected," Noeppel said. "But I'm not going to sit back and let the Buffalo police department be ridiculed in the national press by anyone without just cause."

"I don't believe the Buffalo police department has anything for which to apologize. The policemen were just doing their duty."

Noeppel further denied that either of the arresting officers were wearing Stevenson buttons, as Snyder claimed in New York last night. "That would be a violation of departmental regulations," Noeppel said.

Snyder and his two companions were released on \$400 bail pending a hearing in city court Nov. 7. Noeppel said they lacked a permit for a loud speaker on a jeep they were operating.

Death Claims Mrs. Hopper

Mrs. Sara Adeline Hopper died at a local hospital following an illness of about one year. She had resided in Salem for the past five years.

Mrs. Hopper was born Feb. 15, 1871, in North Powder, Ore. She married Benjamin Hopper in Weller, Ida., in 1892 and he died five years ago.

Survivors include one son, Roland Hopper, Salem. She was a member of the Baptist Church and the Neighbors of Woodcraft in Baker. Shipment is to be made to Baker for services and interment by the Howell-Edwards Company.

Fog Delays UAL Flights

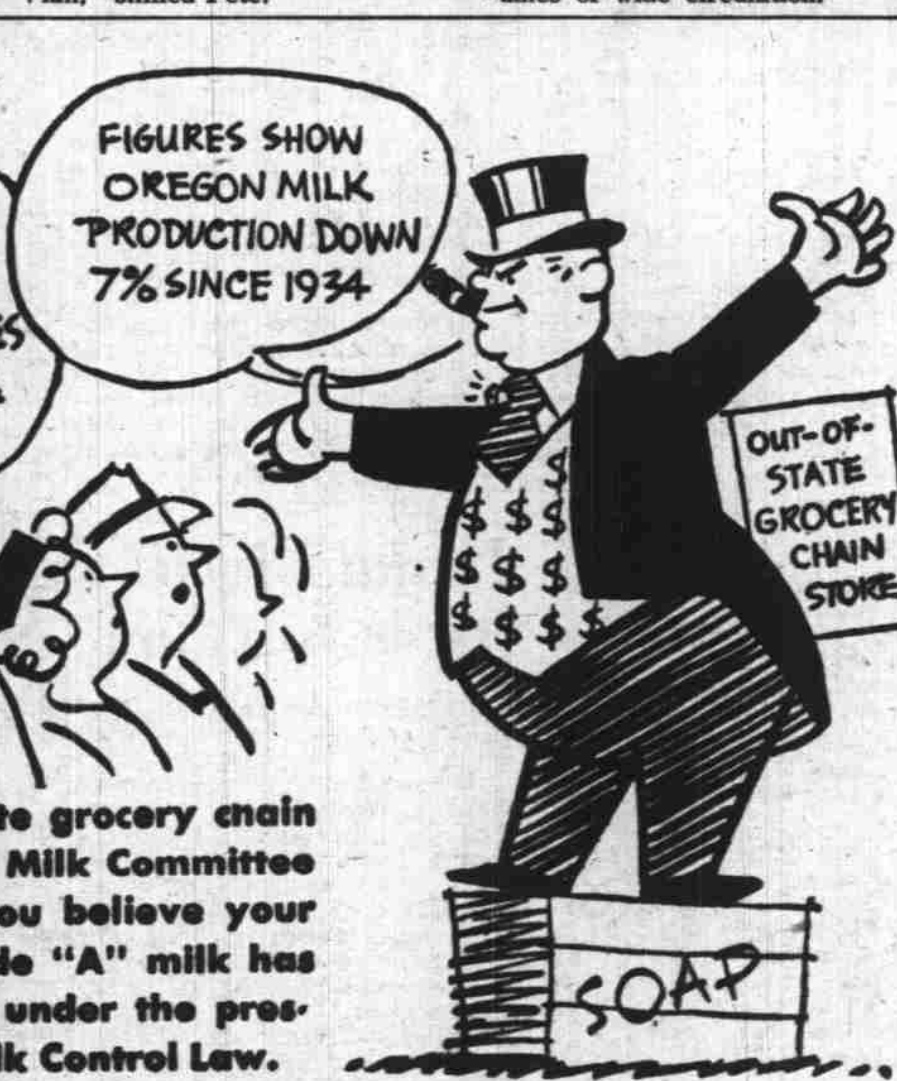
One southbound United Airlines flight leaving Salem had to taxi back off the runway Sunday evening and unload passengers bound for Eugene after fog closed that airport.

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Truman Ready To Resume Speechmaking

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman was ready Sunday night for his final campaign speechmaking tour.

He boarded his special train at 10 p.m. (EST) for a swing through seven Midwestern states with forty speeches scheduled for the coming week.

The President prepared to spend the night in his special car, although his train was not due to leave until 4:30 a.m., on his final whistle-stop campaign tour.

On his four previous whistle-stopping tours, Truman has made 168 speeches in which he has lambasted the Republicans and urged the voters to support the Democratic presidential nominee, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois.

This final campaign swing will take the President through Ohio, Indiana, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois and Michigan, then back across Ohio, Indiana and Illinois into Missouri.

He will climax the tour with a Saturday night speech in St. Louis. Then he will go home to Independence, Mo., to vote. His return schedule to Washington has not yet been worked out.
