West Oregon Counties Get O&C Revenue

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interior Department announced Monday that a record \$6,053,458 will go to 18 Western Oregon counties this week. The money represents 75 per cent of the receipts from timber sales on re-vested Oregon and California grant lands.

The amount is almost double last year's total.

The O&C lands, acquired by the government when Congress ordered the former railroad grant to be returned to public ownership in 1916, total more than 2 1/2 million acres. The Bureau of Land Management administers the lands.

New Queen of the Cows

Independence Jersey Sets World's Record

INDEPENDENCE—It was a big day Monday for the John Lindow family here and, especially, its 3-year-old Jersey cow who had just established a world butterfat production record.

Probably no Jersey family is more closely associated with their cows than the Lindows. Their operation is strictly a family affair except for one hired man, who does not work with the cattle.

John Lindow, a native of Vancouver, Wash., has Jersey-farmed at the 80-acre farm south of Independence for the past 12 years. Mrs. Lindow, known to the Oregon dairy world since childhood as "Norma," the daughter of the widely-known one-time Jersey breeders, the L. A. Hulburts, gives credit for Fantasy's high production largely to her husband. John has not missed a single milking of Fantasy since she calved.

Then, too, there are June 15, a sophomore in the Independence High School, and Danny, 9, both of whom have Jersey cows of their own, and both of whom were, excused from school Monday to attend the big event at their parents' farm.

During the recently completed lactation, Fantasy was fed from 18 to 20 pounds of home-mixed grain containing about 15 per cent protein, and all the top quality hay she could consume. This latter consisted mostly of Eastern alfalfa, red clover, ladino, vetch and oat hay produced on the Lindow farm. She ran with the other cows on fescue and subterranean clover pasture until July and then on Sudan grass until the completion of her record.

Breeding Fine Environment
 The old battle of breeding versus environment was fought out at the Lindow Jersey Farm, showing that the two go hand in hand. Back of the excellent feeding and personal attention given Fantasy by the Lindows was a well-thought breeding program.

Her sire, June Volunteer Buddy, has almost every rating possible to give him a royal breeding superiority. He is an Excellent, a Senior Superior Sire with Medal of Merit, Gold and Silver Metal awards. His 74 tested daughters averaged 16,100 pounds of milk with 554 pounds of butterfat on a twice-daily milking. 305-day mature equivalent basis. His 60 classified daughters average 82.32 per cent on type.

Buddy was bred by L. A. Hulburt, Mrs. Lindow's father, and came to the Lindow farm in 1944 via the Oregon herds of John H. Fick, Silverton, and Catherine Fick and H. B. Colman, Woodburn. He died Oct. 13, only a few days before his daughter captured her illustrious title.

Fantasy's dam is Sybil Golden Marcia, the first registered cow owned by the Lindows. They bought her for \$75 from Robert Clearwater of Albany on Dec. 7, 1940. She gave birth to Fantasy on the Lindow farm on June 19, 1946.

The Lindows sell their milk to Curley's Dairy in Salem, where it goes into the bottle for local consumption. They estimate that the milk Fantasy has produced during the past four years has brought approximately \$5,430. One of her daughters, Sybil Lucky Iris, sold in

Gray Ladies Corps To Make Use of Cosmetic Therapy

Captured Con Said Improving In Hospital

GRANTS PASS (AP)—Slow improvement was seen Monday in the condition of Gerald Macomber, 28, escaped convict who was wounded in his capture by police Saturday.

Doctors said his condition still was too precarious, however, to permit an operation to remove a bullet from his body.

Macomber was shot twice by police in the capture in the Skid-you Mountains of Oregon, near the California line. One bullet passed through the fleshy part of his forearm. The other hit his back and ranged upwards, narrowly missing the heart. That is the bullet doctors will remove when Macomber's condition permits.

Macomber, who had escaped from the state prison at Salem Sept. 25, said at the hospital he had not eaten a hot meal in 40 days of hiding out in the woods. Doctors said his condition was remarkably good, considering that.

Cattle Breeders Protest Club Stand On Milk Control

Thirty breeders of purebred Jersey cattle from six counties met in Salem Monday and publicly protested action of the Oregon Jersey Cattle Club in advocating repeal of the state's present milk marketing act. Most of the protesting group belong to the state club.

The action was taken after statements issued to newspapers and the radio throughout Oregon indicated that the club membership at large favored abolishment of the milk control law.

The protesting Jersey breeders elected Frank Finnicum of Dayton as chairman and Mrs. Anton Malar Jr., Sandy, secretary.

MILK PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ACT BILL—Purpose: Authorizes governor to appoint milk control administrator, an instrumentality of state, with annual salary of \$7200, vested with power to investigate and regulate the production of milk for human consumption within the state. Act requires bacterial labeling of milk and licensing of milk dealers. Appropriates license fees for expense of administration. Authorizes administrator to designate marketing areas, require uniform records and accounts to be kept by producers and dealers, fix minimum milk production prices after public hearing, and require bonds of milk dealers. Appeals are provided for and penalties for violations; all existing milk control laws are repealed.
