Two Hurt, Fog Blamed as Car, Bus Collide

WOODBURN—Fog was blamed Wednesday for a Woodburn traffic accident in which two Portland women were seriously injured.

Police said they were riding in a car which collided with the rear of a bus loaded with 29 field workers at the intersection of 99-E and Silverton Highways. The workers from the Hillsboro area, were headed for a farm near Mt. Angel. They continued following investigation of the accident.

Hospitalized at Salem Memorial with serious scalp injuries were Mrs. C. J. Zilkoski, and her mother, Mrs. Isabella Erickson, 71. Zilkoski, the driver, incurred minor face and chest injuries but was not hospitalized.

Police said both vehicles were traveling south in heavy fog and the bus was preparing to turn left onto the Silverton highway. The bus driver was listed as Carl F. Sullivan, Hillsboro.

J. C. Donaldson Rites Today at Independence

INDEPENDENCE—Final rites for John C. Donaldson, 76, Independence resident for 39 years, will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at Independence Presbyterian Church.

Donaldson died at his home Sunday following a prolonged illness. A native of Illinois (Jan. 15, 1876) he came to Juena Vista in 1910 and moved to Independence three years later. He married Ella Robinson here in 1918.

Deceased worked at the A. L. Thomas hardware store for 24 years, retiring in 1938. He was a member of Lyon Lodge 29, A.F. & AM; Valley Lodge 42 IOOF; and Adah Chapter 34 OES.

Surviving besides the widow are two sisters, Frances Kester, Kings Valley, and Alice Battin, Redmond. Interment will be at Hilltop Cemetery under direction of the Walter L. Smith Mortuary.

Slash Fires Keep Canyon Crews Busy

DETROIT—A slash fire in the Cedar Creek area gave forest-fire service and logging crews trouble when it swept out of bounds into green timber during the past week.

The damage was confined to five acres after firefighters spent 48 hours on the job attempting to control the blaze.

Logging slash on the Box Canyon sale was successfully burned after the light rain made it safe to touch off the four-year-old debris. It was one of the most difficult slash burning jobs attempted in this area, reported S. T. Moore, Detroit District ranger.

A fire discovered on Russell Lake in the Jefferson Park primitive area has been extinguished after apparently burning for several weeks.

Forest service personnel who fought the fire reported that it had obviously spread slowly in thick duff from a careless camper's fire, and before it was discovered had surrounded and killed several giant old-growth Hemlock trees.

Motorist Killed Near Hermiston

PENDLETON (P)—Francis K. Hendrickson, 22, Adams, was killed early Sunday as his automobile overturned and rolled 250 feet off highway U.S. 30, four miles south of Hermiston.

He was thrown 45 feet beyond the car, apparently killed instantly. A tire blow-out was believed to have caused the crash.

MILK PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ACT BILL—Purpose: Authorizes governor to appoint milk control administrator, an instrumentalist of state, with annual salary of \$7200, vested with power to investigate and regulate the production of milk for human consumption within the state. Act requires butterfat labeling of milk and licensing of milk dealers. Appropriates license fees for expense of administration. Authorizes administrator to designate marketing areas, require uniform records and accounts to be kept by producers and dealers, fix minimum milk production prices after public hearing, and require bonds of milk dealers. Appeals are provided for and penalties for violations; all existing milk control laws are repealed.
