

Secretary of State Candidate Ex-Salem Woman; Raps Newbry

"The Secretary of State should be in a position to fight graft, corruption and inefficiency," Democratic candidate for the office, Edith S. Green, told members of both parties Wednesday evening. Mrs. Green addressed some 100 persons in the West Salem City Hall Wednesday.

"The Board of Control is one group in the state which should set the tone of government," Mrs. Green told her audience Wednesday. She told her audience she didn't feel the position of Secretary of State allowed "relatives to act as go-betweens in business affiliations." She referred to a statement made Tuesday by incumbent Earl T. Newbry that his son had managed affairs in the sale of pears sold to fellow pear growers who had in turn sold them to the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Mrs. Green, the former Edith Starrett, was valedictorian in her 1927 graduating class at Salem High School. She later taught at Richmond School and Leslie Junior High School as well as schools in Portland. She fulfilled her graduate work at Stanford University as well as two years at Willamette and received her bachelor of arts degree from the University of Oregon.

Candidate Green, now residing with her husband in Portland, has one son attending the University of Oregon and another 10-year-old at home.

Salem Youths Held in Albany

Two 17-year-old youths were arrested Wednesday evening in Albany by state police on a charge of assault and robbery of Arthur Holbrook, 1535 Trade St., early Monday morning.

The two were picked up as they purchased train tickets for California from an Albany ticket agent.

A witness, who told police he saw the boys the night Holbrook was robbed, spotted the boys in Albany and led police to make the arrest.

Legal Controls Suggested for Cloud-Seeding

MEDFORD (AP)—A suggestion that cloud seeding and other efforts to change the weather be subjected to legal controls came out of the closing session of the 40th annual Oregon Reclamation Congress here Wednesday.

It followed a report by R. A. Work, in charge of snow surveys for the west, that "unoff increased tremendously after cloud seeding experiments last winter."

The resolution asked the state legislature to set up a statute which would determine the qualifications of operators and control the activities of cloud seeders and other weather control operations.

Harold J. Eidemiller, Madras, was elected president of the congress. The executive committee was instructed to select a site for next year's meeting. The only invitation for it came from Baker.

Other officers: R. M. Kent, "silent, vice president; Kenneth W. Sawyer, Portland, re-elected secretary; J. and Roy McNeil, Hermiston, re-elected treasurer. Laselle Coles, Prineville, was elected a director of the National Reclamation Association.

At the annual banquet Tuesday night, Sen. Guy Cordon suggested that a law be passed to spell out the philosophy of reclamation and solve some of the problems that hamper it.

'Get Out the Vote' Campaign

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Chili and politics were blamed for a hot argument Wednesday.

Ruth Hotelling, operator of a Mason Street coffee shop, brought about this complaint to police: Hart ordered chili. He complained she hadn't given him enough. That started the argument.

Eastvold-Troy Dispute Brings Resignation

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—The student who invited Smith Troy to speak at Pacific Lutheran College here withdrew Tuesday because of what he called pressure.

John McBride said he was a "hot potato" and "fellow students didn't want to associate with him for fear of putting their education in jeopardy."

The 25-year-old student from Spokane, a World War II veteran, said one professor had denounced him in the classroom.

McBride was president of the Young Democratic Club at PLC. That group invited Troy to address them Oct. 21.

Troy's speech was halted by Dr. C. S. Eastvold, president of PLC and father of Don Eastvold, Troy's opponent for state attorney general.

Eastvold said at that time that the meeting was not called in accordance with regulations. He said a ruling against political speakers had gone into effect some time before the meeting.

McBride said he felt he was being Dr. Eastvold to the punch by withdrawing. Disiplinary action against McBride was being held in abeyance, Dr. Eastvold said after he broke up the meeting.

Dr. Eastvold is in Montana, and could not be reached for comment. Other Pacific Lutheran College officials were also unavailable.

Meanwhile in Olympia, a move was underway Tuesday for a conference between attorneys for Donald W. Eastvold and Troy in an effort to bring the Eastvold bonus case to trial before next Tuesday's election.

Eastvold is charged by the state with obtaining a \$245 veteran's bonus by misrepresentation of his residence. The civil action was filed in Pierce County Superior Court by one of Troy's assistants. Troy offered last Friday to stipulate the facts in an effort to bring the case to trial this week.

His assistant, Lyle Iversen, drew up a proposed stipulation which was presented to Eastvold's attorney with the suggestion that they try and get together on the facts.

William Goodwin, Eastvold's law partner, replied in a letter received here Tuesday. He said: "We are not in accord with a number of the statements contained in your stipulation and therefore could not agree to a trial of the case under these circumstances."

"However, as per your suggestion in your letter of Oct. 24, we will meet with any representative of your office immediately in an effort to agree on the facts, and if we can agree, we would be more than pleased to have the matter presented to the Superior Court forthwith."

SLASH BURNING DELAYED

Morse Claims Authorization To Tell Secrets

DETROIT (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse said Wednesday he would not have referred publicly to a Defense Department 1947 document on Korea "if I had not been authorized."

The Oregon senator, who recently came out against election of Gen. Eisenhower, commented with reference to his Minnesota speech.

At Washington, the Defense Department said Wednesday it retains a "top secret" label on the document which deals with Korea's strategic importance. The document has come into the political campaign.

Morse dictated a brief statement to a reporter in an automobile while he was racing to keep an engagement at the CIO United Auto Workers headquarters here.

The senator's statement said: "I would not have referred to the report of the joint chiefs of staff of Sept. 26, 1947, if I had not been authorized to refer to it."

Truman Says Ike Poses as 'Superman'

CHICAGO (AP)—President Truman accused Dwight D. Eisenhower in effect Wednesday night of posing as a superman — of promising quick, easy solutions to Korean and other problems that actually are too big for him.

And, scoring the general as a victim of the military "habit of command," the President declared:

"Anybody who poses and talks like a superman is a fraud."

Truman was heckled noisily by bands of teen-agers — although the cheers were louder than the "we like Ike" chants — and twice eggs were thrown in the direction of his party as the presidential special moved into the home state of Illinois Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson.

STAYTON — Three Stayton teen-agers were apprehended Wednesday on Marion County warrants charging them with furnishing alcoholic liquor to a person under the age of 21 years.

Arrested by county deputies were James Haines, 19; Charles Hastings, 20, and Jack Johnson, 19. They were held in the Stayton jail Wednesday evening pending bond.

Russia Seeks New Korean Truce Panel

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Andrei Y. Vishinsky called on the U. N. Assembly Wednesday night to create a commission, on which Russia would serve, to settle peacefully the Korean question and supervise the unification of Korea.

The Soviet foreign minister angrily lashed at Secretary of State Dean Acheson in a three hour and 39 minute speech to the U. N. Political Committee.

At one point he said sarcastically he was glad the U. S. was having its elections because the campaign made Acheson come to the committee.

Vishinsky insisted repeatedly that prisoners of war in Korea must be repatriated forthwith upon cessation of hostilities. He ridiculed Acheson's stand that prisoners who did not want to go home should not be forced to do so.

PORTLAND (AP)—Federal Judge Solomon banned a 19-year-old boy from Eugene Wednesday.

The youth, Roger Kalkoven, was placed on probation for five years for forging a draft card. Among conditions of the probation are stipulations that he is not to visit Eugene or communicate with any boy or girl there.

The judge said Kalkoven had been accused numerous times of petty theft and twice escaped from the state training school for boys. The son of a Eugene policeman, now dead, young Kalkoven was put under guardianship of a brother in Portland.
