

Oregon Women Rescued From Damaged Boat

SAN FRANCISCO (P)—Two Oregon women—skipper and crew of the fishing boat Josephine—were rescued Thursday by the Coast Guard cutter Ewing after a 24-hour search.

The Ewing found the Josephine drifting helplessly 75 miles southwest of the Farallone Islands. The Farallones are approximately 16 miles west of the Golden Gate to San Francisco Bay.

The Coast Guard identified the two women as Violet Hoeschell, 43, Coos Bay, Ore., skipper of the Josephine, and Carol Edwards, 43, Newport, Ore.

Until the Josephine was sighted and taken under tow, the Coast Guard thought it was searching for a two-man crew. The Josephine left San Francisco's Fishermen's Wharf Tuesday morning.

Later that day, Skipper Hoeschell said, "Our rudder went out and we sat out Tuesday night, drifting around and hoping a storm didn't come up."

Repairs to the Josephine are expected to be completed by the end of the week.

Nov. 11 Log Haul Allowed

Log haulers will be allowed to operate on Armistice Day this year, the State Highway Commission announced Thursday in suspending a regulation in effect for several years.

The regulation was suspended, the commission said, because of the long dry spell which has prevented most log haulers from operating. This has brought on a substantial financial loss to both the operators and their employees, the commission said.

Clark Silent On Van Fleet

TOKYO (P)—Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters said Friday it had no word on a report published in the U. S. that Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Eighth Army commander in Korea, is being relieved.

The U. N. commander's headquarters said also that Clark had no comment on a letter attributed to Van Fleet relative to use of South Korean troops in the war. Thursday night at Seoul, Gen. Van Fleet declined all comment, even to questions whether he had recalled writing the letter and whether he had given Gen. Elsenhower permission to quote from it. At Seoul Friday, a spokesman said Van Fleet was unavailable for comment on the report he was being relieved.

Eugene Boy, 17, Hunted in Death Of Grandmother

SAN FRANCISCO (P)—Police Thursday night were alerted to watch for a 17-year-old Eugene, Ore., boy sought in connection with the slaying of his grandmother.

A homicide warrant for the boy, Billy Edwards, was sworn out by District Attorney Ed Luckey of Eugene, when it was learned that the boy had bought a plane ticket to San Francisco.

The boy's grandmother, Mrs. Maude Wood, 72, was found strangled in her home Tuesday, police reported.

Sailor Union To Halt Work To Flay WSB

SAN FRANCISCO (P)—The AFL Sailors Union of the Pacific announced Thursday stop-work meetings will be held in Pacific Coast ports Friday to protest the failure of the Wage Stabilization Board to approve strike-won wage increases.

Harry Johnson, SUP assistant secretary, announced the stop-work meetings and added: "If the WSB doesn't quit stalling, it may mean another strike." Johnson called the stop-work meetings for 10 a.m. (PST) Friday after, he said, union chief Harry Lundberg was told in Washington that the WSB had postponed action on SUP pay until next Wednesday.

Johnson said the meetings will last about 30 minutes "but whether our members go back to work after that will be decided at the meetings."

Tot Survives Fall, Rundown

HILLSBORO (P)—A three-year-old girl survived a highway accident Wednesday that would have killed most adults.

The girl, Paula Patton, Route 1, Banks, fell from the car her father was driving along the Sunset Highway near Manning. She was directly in the path of a car behind.

Ralph Frank Catchpole, Portland, said the girl tumbled right in front of his car, and he could not stop. He said he believed the right wheels of his car ran over her.

She was hospitalized here with face injuries, a broken arm and leg, but attendants said she would recover.

Big Store Center Due for Eugene

EUGENE Ore. (P)—Plans for a \$600,000 neighborhood shopping center have been disclosed here by two men, who requested a zone change needed before construction can be started.

Paul Campbell, Eugene, and George F. Crow, Portland, real estate men, requested the change from a multiple residence to a business zone. Two block-long buildings with a pedestrian overpass across a street would be built.

Catholic Lawyers Ordered Out Of Divorce Suits, Rhode Island

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (P)—A stern Roman Catholic edict to lawyers of that faith to get out of divorce practice was felt in domestic relations court Thursday.

Many cases of the long calendar before Judge Philip C. Joslin were passed or were continued to other dates.

Court attaches and lawyers said there was no doubt that this was a result of the edict approved by a diocesan synod recently and announced Oct. 19 by the Rev. Russell J. McVinney, bishop of Providence.

At a meeting of the Catholic Lawyers Guild Wednesday night, lawyers reported, diocesan canon law experts informed the attorneys that they are prohibited by the edict for acting in divorce proceedings involving Catholics and in addition may not seek divorces for non-Catholics who have been baptized in their own religions.

The church edict provides that Catholic attorneys may take part only in divorce proceedings previously sanctioned by the church.

The lawyers said they were told that the church will consider granting this permission only in the most serious violations of the marriage covenant, such as infidelity.

Lloyd Rejects Russian Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (P)—British Delegate Selwyn Lloyd turned down Andrei Y. Vishinsky's proposals Thursday for a new U. N. commission to settle the Korean War.

In a speech to the U. N. Political Committee, Lloyd denounced the demand repeated Wednesday by Vishinsky for prompt repatriation, upon a cease fire, of 121,000 prisoners held by the U. N. forces. The British delegate said in a stern voice that "it would be a crime against humanity to treat these men in such a way."

He appealed to everyone not to hold up a solution because of "some feeling of prestige or the necessity for face-saving." Lloyd is a co-sponsor of a resolution asking the Communists to accept a truce on U. N. terms.

Dixie Crosby Stays in Coma

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (P)—Dixie Lee Crosby's condition was unchanged Thursday. The 40-year-old wife of crooner Bing remained in a coma in critical condition at the Crosby home here.

In poor health for several years, she was stricken gravely last Sunday and her family has been at her bedside since. Nature of her illness has not been disclosed.

Ex-Prisoner Witness Says He Interpreted

NEW YORK (P)—A government witness admitted Thursday that he was a wartime interpreter for the Japanese as was former Sgt. John W. Provoo.

The witness, Sapt. Richard Sakakida, gave the same excuse as Provoo for serving the enemy after his 1942 capture on Corregidor—fear of death if he refused.

Provoo, 35, an American-born disciple of the Buddhist religion, is on trial for his life on treason charges.

He is accused of going over to the Japanese after his capture, broadcasting their propaganda and turning American fellow-prisoners over to them for torture and—in one case—execution.

Sakakida, a Nisei from Hawaii, testified Wednesday that Provoo greeted the conquering Japanese on Corregidor with a low, Oriental bow of welcome, carried their food, carried out their bidding and finally ended up as the only American with the run of the area.

Thursday, on cross-examination, the captain admitted that he, too, served as an interpreter for the Japanese—at the trial of five American officers charged with war crimes. The five were executed.

Edgar L. Jenkins, Long Beach, Calif., who survived the crash and swam ashore, identified the body as that of the pilot, Jack Shores, about 50, North Bend.

Mrs. Stevenson Renews Call For Change in Government

CHICAGO (P)—The former wife of Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson said Thursday night "the American voter must now seek a change of government or be himself changed into something new and strange."

Mrs. Ellen Borden Stevenson previously had announced her intention to vote Republican.

Mrs. Stevenson said she had received "hundreds of letters" from "worried Americans from all parts of the United States" to whom she felt she owed "an answer."

In a statement, she said: "The record is confused enough. It would be sinful for me to add to that confusion at this critical time."

"For 20 years I have been in close contact with Democrats and have voted for the Democratic Party."
