

GOP Captures 4 Democrat Governorships

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republicans captured at least four governorships from the Democrats in Tuesday's voting, while holding onto all of their own.

Of the 30 governor's seats up in this year's elections, the Republicans elected or reelected their men to 19. Democrats succeeded Democrats in nine other states. The vote counts were not yet conclusive in Michigan or Montana.

Counting holdovers, and Republican Burton M. Cross who was elected governor of Maine Sept. 8, the GOP could rely on a minimum of 29 statehouse footholds. And in Montana Republican J. Hugo Aronson persistently held on to a thin lead over Gov. John W. Bonner, a Democrat.

Going with the election, the Republicans held a 25-23 margin over the Democrats in governorships. Considering the power and patronage at the disposal of governors, this may have been a factor in the general Republican triumph.

Illinois voters reelected Gov. Adlai Stevenson's candidate to succeed him in the Springfield capitol. Democrat Lt. Gov. Sherwood P. Dixon bowed to William G. Stratton, a Republican, by more than 200,000 votes.

In Ohio, however, Democrat Gov. Frank J. Lausche took the measure of Republican Charles F. Taft, brother of Ohio's senior senator. It was a fourth term for Lausche, an independent sort of Democrat who pays little attention to the state party organization.

Massachusetts' Gov. Paul A. Devers, keynote speaker at the Democratic National Convention, was knocked off by Republican Congressman Christian A. Herter, who was rated a long-shot by pre-election dolesters.

Another House member who won a governorship was J. Caleb Boggs, Delaware Republican. He defeated Gov. Elbert N. Carvel, Democrat. But in Washington State, Democratic Rep. Hugh B. Mitchell was turned back in his attempt to oust Gov. Arthur B. Langlie, Republican.

Boy Hurt in Fall From Playground Slide

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GOP Can Hold Senate Control Minus Morse

A record avalanche of votes gave Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower the presidential election Tuesday and the GOP control of Congress.

The degree of Republican control of the senate was obscured by the tantalizing question posed by Oregon's insurgent, Morris Morse, a Republican, booted that party during the campaign in protest against Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's political alliance with Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio. He was "resigning" from the GOP, Morse announced, and threw his support to Gov. Adlai Stevenson for the presidency.

There was no exact precedent for the situation thus created by the fence-jumping Oregon senator. As a Republican "independent"—as he now describes himself—Morse could throw the Senate into a 48-48 tie by voting with the Democrats.

Tie-Breaking Vote
In a situation of this sort, the tie-breaking vote is cast by the Senate's presiding officer—who after next Jan. 20 will be the Republican vice president, Richard Nixon.

With Rep. Charles Potter's victory over Sen. Blair Moody in Michigan, the Republicans elected 23 of their candidates, with 26 holdover senators if Morse is counted with the Republicans. The Democrats elected 13 of their Senate candidates, with 85 holdovers.

In the House, despite historical precedent and the size of the Eisenhower landslide, the Republicans were on safer ground but still with uncomfortably thin reserves.

The Democrats in most instances—figuring from the record of the past Congress—could count on the vote of Frasier Reams of Ohio, the one independent who won reelection.

In some instances, Democrats ousted Republicans from their House seats.

Rep. Cole Upset
Democrat Barrett O'Hara defeated Rep. Richard B. Vall in the Second Illinois District; Democrat Howard S. Miller upset Rep. Albert M. Cole in Republican Kansas First District; Mrs. John B. Sullivan knocked out Rep. Claude Bakewell in the Missouri Third District; Democrat Lester Holtzman defeated Rep. Robert Tripp Ross in the New York Sixth District; and James A. Byrne, Democrat, won over Republican Morton Wilkin in Pennsylvania's Third District.

Among the Senate incumbents, Democratic leader Ernest McFarland of Arizona was a casualty to the Republican sweep in Arizona. He was defeated by Republican Barry Goldwater, Phoenix department store executive.

Eight incumbent senators were beaten in Tuesday's voting, four Republicans and four Democrats.

GOP Victims were Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts, Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign manager before the Chicago National Convention; James P. Kem of Missouri; Harry Cain of Washington; and Zales Ecton of Montana.

Democratic losers were Ernest McFarland of Arizona, the majority leader; the veteran Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming; William Benton of Connecticut; and Thomas Underwood of Kentucky.

Hop Marketing Referendum Set

PORTLAND (AP)—A referendum on discontinuing the Pacific Coast federal hop marketing agreement has been set tentatively for Nov. 11-26.

That was the announcement Wednesday of W. J. Broadhead, area field representative for the fruit and vegetable branch of the Agriculture Department.

A majority of hop growers signed petitions asking for the referendum. The agreement, which sets quotas for the amount of hops each grower can sell, covers Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho.

South Koreans Told to Stop Ground Attack

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Bloody fighting for Triangle Hill and Sniper Ridge died early Thursday morning after Allied leaders ordered South Koreans to halt their ground attacks and let the artillery take over.

South Korean infantrymen were stalled early Wednesday in their seventh frontal smash against Chinese Reds firmly dug in on the crest of Triangle Hill.

Since then, a U. S. Eighth Army briefing officer said, Triangle has been relatively quiet.

And since 3 p. m. Wednesday, Chinese have thrown only one assault at South Koreans on the crest of nearby Sniper Ridge. It was a light attack by about 150 Reds and was thrown back after three hours of fighting.

Dispatches said the orders to break off ground attacks against Triangle Hill came during a visit of Eighth Army Commander James A. Van Fleet to the blazing Korean central front.

Neither the Chinese nor the South Koreans won or occupied new ground in Wednesday's savage fighting.

Rep. Sabbath of Illinois Dies

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Adolph Sabbath (D-Ill.), dean of the House of Representatives, died early Thursday.

Sabbath, 86, had just been elected to his 24th consecutive term in Congress.

He died at 1:30 a. m. EST in the naval hospital in nearby Bethesda, Md., of complications which developed after a major operation in June. He entered the hospital Wednesday when his condition suddenly became worse.

He was chairman of the Rules Committee of the House, the powerful group which decides which legislation will come up for floor action.

Whittaker Chambers Ill After Heart Attack
BALTIMORE (AP)—Whittaker Chambers, the man who put the finger on Alger Hiss, lay seriously ill of a heart attack in St. Agnes Hospital here Wednesday.

The 52-year-old Chambers, admitted one-time courier for a Communist spy ring, suffered the attack Monday on his farm near Westminster, Md., and was brought to the hospital Tuesday.

Twins Named Ike, Mamie

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—Ike and Mamie arrived in Ogden Tuesday night — Ike Courtney and Mamie Tippetts, that is.

They were born to sisters on election night.

Mrs. Ivan Courtney of Roy and Mrs. Thad Tippetts of Ogden went to the hospital Tuesday and the new babies arrived just about the time Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower won the election.

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
