Portland General Electric Co. officials reported a transformer blew out a fuse and shut off the power for a short time Thursday evening.

Mrs. Gile said that when the lights in her home went out she started down the stairs in the dark to check the dwelling's fuse box. She then fell down a flight of stairs in the dark and was taken by city first aid men to Salem General Hospital where she was reported suffering from a possible skull fracture. Her condition was listed as "fair" by hospital authorities Thursday night.

Willamette University will kick off its 31st annual Homecoming festivities at 5 a. m. today, when the freshman class is expected to rake all leaves on the campus.

The leaf-rake, a tradition on campus, will prepare the way for alumni registration to begin at 10 a. m. Saturday in Lausanne Hall. A torchlight parade will wind its way through downtown Salem tonight at 7:30 and end at Bush's Pasture in a rally and bonfire.

(Spec) Keene, longtime Willamette coach will see the afternoon football clash between Willamette Bearcats and the Linfield Wildcats at McCulloch Stadium. Following the game the freshmen will vie with sophomores in a pushball contest on the football field to see whether frosh continue wearing their "beanies" or not.

The Homecoming campus sign contest, a living organization competition each year, is on the theme "Bear Down on the Wildcats."

Signs will be judged Saturday with the winners announced Saturday evening at the Homecoming dance. Also to be announced at the dance will be the winner of the campus "Ugly Man" contest which involves student penny votes with proceeds donated to local charities.

1st Hydrogen Bomb's Blast May Be Past

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States may be keeping secret an explosion of the world's first full-scale hydrogen bomb.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced early last September that a series of nuclear weapons tests would be conducted at the Eniwetok Proving Grounds during the "autumn months."

Those months are nearing a close, with the probability that the tests have been completed or are approaching an end.

This year's mid-Pacific tests were generally expected to include an experiment in which a standard atomic bomb would be used to touch off quantities of hydrogen sufficient to produce a super-sized blast.

Such a blast, it was figured, would be many times more powerful than a nuclear fission bomb.

Salem Water Line Breaks

A break in the city water department's new 24-inch water line at 7th street and Wallace Road Thursday afternoon accounted for about a quarter of a million gallons of water lost, officials reported.

The break occurred during digging of a sewer ditch near an intersection of the pipe. This cut off service for about 30 minutes.

John Geren, Salem water manager, reported the stoppage affected such businesses as Blue Lake Cannery, River Bend Sand and Gravel Co., United Turkey Growers and Oregon Flax Textiles.

State Employee Annual Confab Begins Today

A proposal to substitute the Oregon Public Employees Retirement Act in favor of the federal social security program will be an important discussion issue at the 10th annual convention of the Oregon State Employees Association beginning today at Corvallis.

Criticism has been directed recently by employees at the state retirement law because of its "failure to keep pace with the high cost of living."

About 30 delegates from Salem, led by State President E. A. Bamford and Executive Secretary Forrest Stewart, will be among the 100 delegates to open the sessions at 1:30 p. m. today. The convention will continue to Sunday.

Other issues to be discussed will be a move to extend the 40-hour work week to include the 5,000 of Oregon's Civil Service employees who are still working 44 to 48 hours per week, OSEA officers said.

Salary adjustments for underpaid classifications of state employees also will be discussed. A more flexible method of providing necessary salary adjustments between state legislature sessions will be included.

Employees said they also would take up what they termed the "high job turnover problem in state offices." A 70 per cent turnover of employees has occurred so far this year, they said.

A highlight of the convention will be a talk by Theodore H. Jenner of Sacramento, Calif., Saturday morning. Jenner, well-known for his work in retirement programs, will discuss federal social security and other general retirement benefits.

The annual banquet will be Saturday night.

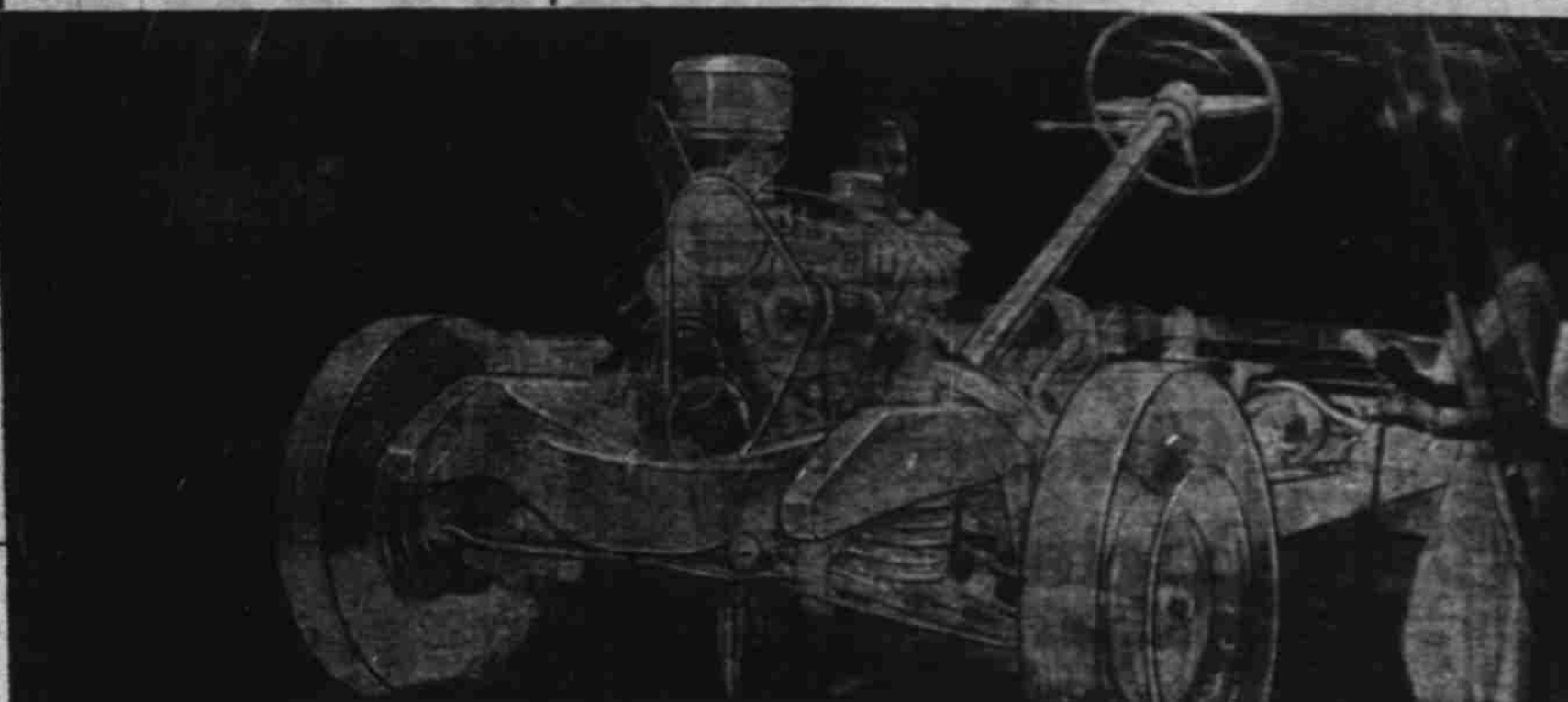

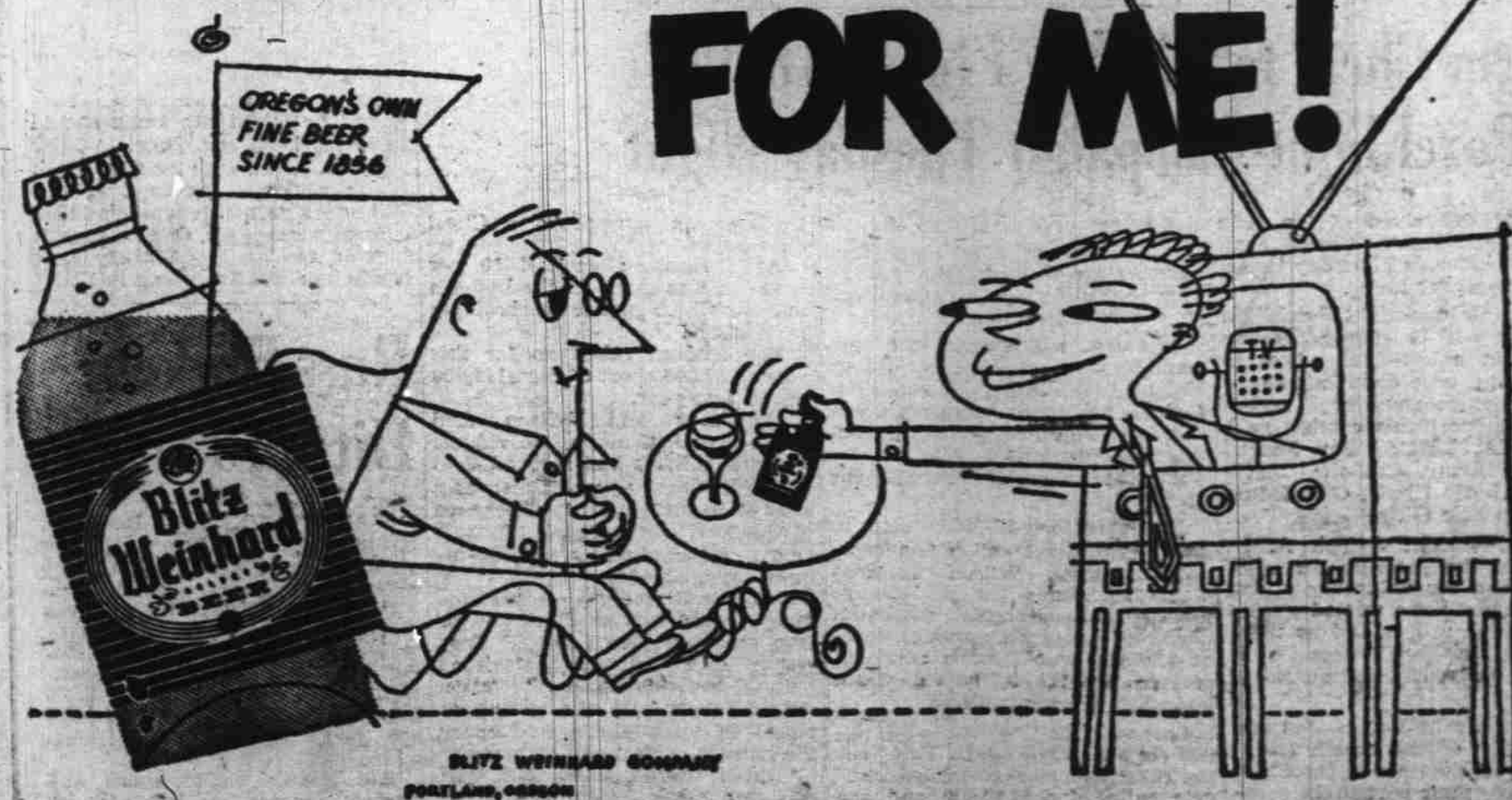
