Every Day Food

Apples, Cranberries Important Fruits in Daily Winter Menus

Stop to consider how important fruits are in our menus. We start out with grapefruit in the morning and end the day with an apple or a fresh pear. Fruit goes into salads, cocktails, accompaniments and makes puddings.

Nice thing about fruit—it's usually one of the less expensive foods. Apples, cranberries, pears and citrus fruits are chief among the fresh fruits of autumn, though grapes and bananas are much used.

Cranberries through the extensive publicity given them by the association of growers, have taken their place for everyday use instead of mere accompaniment to the Thanksgiving turkey. Enthusiasts for the flavor of cranberries will enjoy using them where other sour berries are indicated—in muffins, salads and desserts.

Use the cranberries in quick breads just as you would blueberries. Here's a recipe for a relish to use cranberries, it's useable on the dinner plate to accompany meat or can be used with chopped celery to make good winter salad.

CRANBERRY-PINEAPPLE LEMON RELISH

(Makes about 1 quart)

4 cups fresh cranberries 2 cups sugar
1/2 lemon, halved 1 cup undrained crushed pineapple
Force cranberries and lemon through food chopper. Stir in sugar and crushed pineapple. Chill thoroughly before serving.

To freeze: Fill pint or quart containers within 1/2 inch of top. Store in home-freezer.

Here's a different recipe using apples with sweet potatoes. We've often piled sweet potatoes in orange cups and browned them, but here's a recipe using apples with the sweet potatoes:

APPLE CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

6 medium-sized cooked sweet potatoes 1/4 cup brown sugar
4 red apples 1/2 cup butter

Cut sweet potatoes in quarters or thick slices, cut apples in eighths and core. Arrange sweet potatoes and apples in alternate layers in a casserole. Melt butter, stir in brown sugar and pour over sweet potatoes and apples. Cover casserole and bake in a slow oven (325°) for 1 hour. Serves 6.

Here's a recipe where bananas get into the act. They'll be used in cookies:

BANANA OATMEAL COOKIES

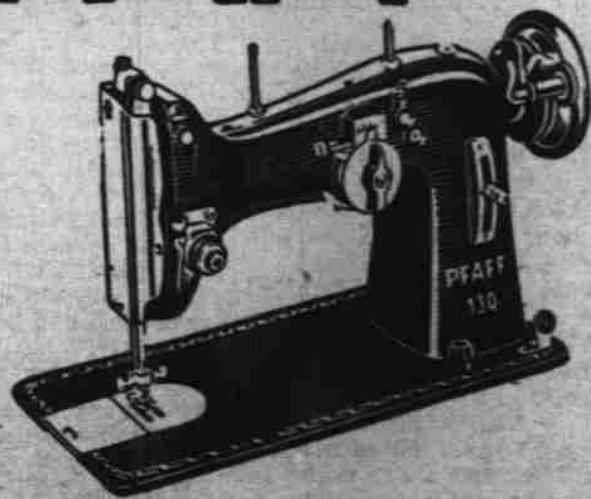
Makes 4 dozen cookies.

1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour 1/2 cup shortening, soft
1 teaspoon baking powder 2 eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup mashed bananas (2 or 3 ripe bananas)
1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 1/2 cups oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1 cup sugar

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, spices and sugar into bowl. Add shortening, eggs and about half the mashed bananas. Beat until creamy, about 2 minutes. Fold in remaining bananas and rolled oats. Drop from a teaspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven (375°) 12 to 15 minutes.

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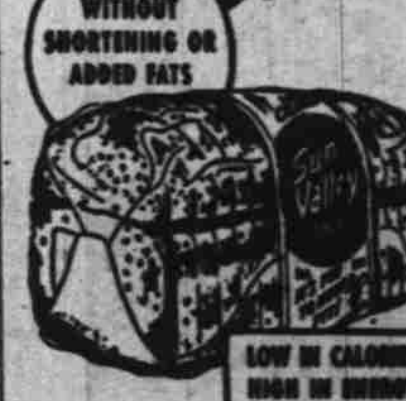
