

Sen. Bridges Asks Probe of Kaiser-Frazer

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Bridges (R-NH) urged Sunday a full-scale Senate investigation of what he called excessively costly Air Force contracts held by the Kaiser-Frazer Corp. for building cargo planes.

He said one contract calls for Kaiser-Frazer to build 150 of the C-119 cargo aircraft at a cost nearly \$150 million in excess of what the government would have had to pay if the contract had gone to the Fairchild Engine and Aircraft Co.

There was no immediate comment from Kaiser-Frazer.

Bridges said the Air Force conceded that the Fairchild concern, which developed the C-119, was building the plane for \$260,000 while the unit price of the craft under the Kaiser-Frazer contract was nearly \$1,200,000.

In a statement released through his office here, Bridges said he had turned over all his information about the contract to the Senate Armed Services Subcommittee on Preparedness and requested it to make a thorough investigation.

Bridges said Kaiser-Frazer also has a contract to build the new C-123 cargo plane and declared "to see if it entailed the same excessive costs."

He gave no details about it, but he said "I see no need of subsidizing any company while established plane builders have unused capacity."

Forest Fire Threat Eases

General rains and some snow flurries brought an end Sunday to forest fires in sections of the hard-hit South, East and Ohio Valley. For much of the timberland, it was the first important precipitation in more than two months.

Rain was reported in varying amounts in the hard-hit states of Kentucky, Virginia, Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee. Drizzles blanketed sections of West Virginia, North Carolina, Arizona, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas.

Georgia appeared to have the most serious remaining fire problem, with eight known blazes and the state's worst one still out of control after wiping out 20,000 acres in the northern sections.

Screen Actors Guild Votes TV Walkout

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The Screen Actors Guild voted unanimously at a mass meeting Sunday night to authorize a strike against makers of television film commercials.

The guild also installed Actor Walter Pidgeon as its new president, succeeding Ronald Reagan.

New York City members of the guild will meet next Sunday to take a strike authorization vote, empowering the SAG's executive board to call a walkout.

National Executive Secretary John Dales Jr. of the guild said that negotiations with TV film commercial producers have broken down.

The guild is making wage and working condition demands and is seeking restrictions on the re-use of filmed commercials unless actors appearing in them are paid more.

N. Y. Shopping By Helicopter?

NEW YORK (AP)—A midtown Manhattan department store is considering turning its extensive roof into a landing field for helicopters of shoppers from the suburbs.

William M. Holmes, president of James McCreery & Co., displayed on the store's fourth floor a model of a commuters' helicopter. Engineers say the store roof is big enough to accommodate them.

West Reich Hears Details Of Army Plan

BONN, Germany (AP)—West Germany's 500,000-man defense force will include 22,000 officers and a professional core of 80,000 men, Defense Commissioner Theodor Blank told the nation by radio Sunday night.

Blank said this force will have 40 generals but he renewed assurances there will be no German general staff.

"This will be a citizen's army in uniform," he said, stressing that the old Prussian-type militarism is a thing of the past. "The future European soldier of the German nation will be respected and treated as a man and as a citizen."

A former trade union official, Blank was the chief German negotiator in planning the proposed six-nation European Army. He is expected to be Germany's first postwar defense minister.

About 80,000 non-commissioned officers and long-term enlisted men will form the hard core of the Army and handle the training of draftees, Blank said. He gave this picture of plans for the new German Army:

The first soldiers in uniform will be volunteers who will form cadres to train the later wave of draftees. Most of these presumably will be non-coms.

These volunteers probably will begin training nine to twelve months after the ratification of the European Army plan.

Barracks and training areas must be built and arms assembled before these volunteers can be signed up.

75-Mile Test Course Driven

A 75-mile course testing driver reliability was covered Sunday morning by 29 entrants in the test of driver accuracy sponsored by the Salem Diners Club.

Winners in the run were Donald Kuhn, 1326 Plaza Ave., first; Earl Brooks, Independence, second; and Richard Lawrence, Salem, third.

All three winners were Diner members, but the competition of motoring skill in accurate, safe driving was open to anyone whose car was first checked for safety.

Prizes, besides trophies for the first three winners included merchandise donated by auto parts houses and automobile dealers.

An elaborate system of starting the entrants at one-minute intervals beginning at 9 a.m. on the Sears Roebuck and Company parking lot was synchronized with radio dispatches to four radio "hams" at different points along the course. The contestants were then checked en route to establish their reliability in following all speed and condition rules. Two previous runs by Diner members on the course established the fastest average speed at 43.4 miles per hour.

The winners were chosen on the basis of the drivers who came the closest to that speed. Each contestant was advised that 55 miles per hour was the absolute maximum speed.

Phil Murray, President of CIO, Succumbs

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The CIO convention in Los Angeles which starts November 17 will name a new successor to President Phil Murray who succumbed to heart attack here Sunday.

Besides picking a new president the CIO convention faces a major decision on its future in politics. The union under Murray supported the Democratic candidacy of Gov. Adlai Stevenson.

Unsuccessful, the union leaders were known to be divided between either dropping their Political Action Committee work entirely or vastly increasing it.

Murray's own stand was sealed by death. Only Saturday night he had declined to discuss politics except to say:

"We will lend wholesome support to any administration that has in mind constructive measures for the common people, but we will resist any effort by special groups to deprive the people of their constitutional rights."

He had indicated he would have more to say on politics at the Los Angeles convention.

Besides supporting the Democrats, Murray, who was a Roman Catholic, was long an outspoken foe of Communism in the labor movement.

The story of his immigration to this country was a familiar one to most of his million union members. His father was a miner and a local union official in Blantyre, Scotland. The discontented young Murray quit his job as a 30-cent-a-day mine helper, at the age of 16, and came to America in 1902.

He was naturalized in 1911, and a year later became a member of the international board of the United Mine Workers. When John Lewis became the UMW president in 1920, Murray was his vice president.

Under the new labor laws of the Roosevelt New Deal, in 1935 Murray and Lewis together shaped the Committee for Industrial Organization, later renamed the Congress of Industrial Organizations.

Murray was designated to organize the steel workers and became the steel union's first president.

In 1940, Murray succeeded Lewis as president of the powerful CIO. By 1942, the 22 years of close friendship of the two former pit boys was ruptured when Lewis pulled his union out of the CIO and backed the Republican Party. Murray stuck to President Roosevelt.

Both supported the Stevenson ticket in last Tuesday's election. Lewis even offered mine union funds to aid the steel workers in their strike earlier this year, but the two leaders never became close after the original break.

Yet Lewis Sunday in a joint telegram with other mine union leaders to Mrs. Murray, lauded his old companion as a man who "has made a contribution that will not be forgotten" by American labor.

Recalling the steel strikes, notably those of 1946, 1949 and 1952, Ben Moreel, the steel man, said of the soft-spoken, silver-haired Scot: "He was no table pounder; he did it all simply by persuasion."

And President Truman declared, "as labor in the last 20 years has increased its strength and its responsibility through rapidly expanding organization, Philip Murray has become respected generally as a Christian gentleman, as an able negotiator and as a man who could be trusted by his own people and by his employers."

2-Year Old Wins 4th Stakes Race

BALTIMORE (AP)—The coronation of Grecian Queen was held Saturday at Pimlico.

The 2-year-old filly was just about installed queen of her sex and age for the year by winning the first division of the Marguerite Stakes.

It was the fourth stakes triumph this year for the dark brown daughter of Heliopolis. The \$17,000 hiked her first year's racing profits to \$80,850.

Overcast Seals Off Fate of 19 On Lost C119

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP)—An overcast Sunday, sealed off the fate of a missing C-119 troop carrier plane which vanished with 19 aboard early Friday morning some where between Fairbanks and Anchorage.

The plane last was heard from at 10,000 feet over Summit, Alaska, midway between Fairbanks and Anchorage. At that time the pilot, Glen H. Wall of Hialeah, Fla., was expected to reach Nenana, south of here in 20 minutes. He didn't.

Twenty-six planes searched the mountainous Summit area Saturday but poor weather turned them back. Search officials were keeping the planes grounded but in readiness while a few weather planes circled the Summit area constantly.

All search planes were ready to aloft again when the weather breaks.

There were five crewmen and 14 soldiers aboard. The passengers were based at Fort Richardson, Seward Anchorage. The crewmen were based near Miami, Fla.

Services for President of Israel Tuesday

REHOVOT, Israel (AP)—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, first president of Israel and renowned chemist who died of a heart attack early Sunday morning, will be buried on his estate here Tuesday afternoon.

Announcement of the death of the 77-year-old "Father of Israel" after a prolonged illness, plunged this newly born desert nation into deepest mourning.

All places of entertainment were closed and memorial meetings were arranged from the hills of Galilee down to the Egyptian frontier and the Red Sea coast.

Premier David Ben-Gurion quickly called his Cabinet into session and eulogized the great statesman of Zionism who from boyhood dreamed and planned a new Jewish homeland. The cabinet decreed that all work will stop Tuesday, the day of the state funeral.

Within hours after the president's passing, Israeli soldiers, in full battle dress and carrying rifles, lined the roadway leading to the Weizmann mansion where workmen began constructing a canopied catafalque in front of the residence.

There the body will rest while grieving Israelis, the great and the humble, file past to pay their respects to the man who pioneered in the colonization and economic development of modern Palestine.

Oregon Gains Influence on Capitol Hill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Oregon's congressional delegation will assume a greater share of responsibility in the 83rd Congress than at any time in the last 20 years, congressional observers have reported.

To be sure, the Republicans controlled the 80th Congress back in 1946 but they didn't have a man in the White House. Now they do.

This will give the Oregon delegation new patronage benefits. For the first time in two decades, Oregon congressmen will have a say as to who is to be named to postmasterhips in their home districts.

None of the two Oregon senators of four congressmen will hold a committee chairmanship in the Congress, but the influence they have had as members of the minority will be enhanced by their majority party standing.

Sen. Guy Cordon, who was given practically a free hand even under the Democrats in passing on Appropriation Committee recommendations for the many Columbia River Basin projects, retains his No. 3 spot on that committee as well as Interior and Insular Affairs. Both are vital to the West.

What happens to Sen. Wayne Morse still remains a mystery. As a Republican, he would be in line to become second-ranking member of the Armed Services Committee while retaining his No. 4 position on Labor and Public Welfare. His bolt from the party, however, may bring on a move to — figuratively — stand him in the corner on committee assignments and require him to build new seniority as a proclaimed independent.

On the House side, Rep. Ellsworth takes on increased stature as third-ranking Republican on the powerful Rules Committee, the body that passes on all legislation before it goes to the House floor for consideration.

Rep. Angell ranks right behind Chairman Donoro of Michigan on the Public Works Committee.

Rep. Norblad, who has been tenth-ranking minority member of the House Armed Services Committee, will move up to the No. 7 spot because of the defeat or retirement of present members. Norblad also served during the 82nd Congress as the Republicans' western whip — responsible for keeping abreast of House floor action and rounding up his party colleagues for important votes.

Newly elected Rep. Sam Coon's committee assignments won't be decided until organization of the new House is determined. Rep. Stockman, his predecessor, was ranked eighth among Republicans on the Appropriations Committee.
