

New Victory Era Visioned for WU Football

Singing the praises of a football team before it's finished with its schedule isn't the safest thing to do for fear that said team will pull a flip-flop and drop its remaining outings.

But in the case of the Ted Ogden and Jerry Frei coached Willamette Bearcats, who have two more games to play before buttoning things up for the season, clockers have the confident feeling that a new win era is in the offing. Perhaps it will grow to the proportion of that which was produced here in the late 1930s and

early 1940s by Spec Keene, the man who had the 1932 WU Homecoming dedicated to him only last weekend.

Willamette has only a weak Whitman team to get by this week at Walla Walla to complete what can be termed the regular season. The November 27 game with Hawaii in Honolulu is a kings-ex-er, even though it will be a good bet that the Bearcats knock off the Rainbows also.

Looking back over the games played to date and noting the scores thereof, one gets the idea, quickly, that the Cats with a scant few breaks could have been perched among the unbeaten-

untied elite today. They were tied by College of Puget Sound, but were en route to the winning touchdown when the game ended. They had powerful College of Idaho on the ropes, until the final seconds brought on a 7-6 Coyote win. A couple of misplaced place-kicks cost the WU's a 27-24 loss to strong Pacific U.

All other outings were wins, and including some mighty impressive ones. Shellacking Lewis & Clark 29-0 and Linfield 35-14 after shaking the bugs that cost the tie and the two narrow setbacks is additional proof the Bearcats have themselves a real football team in the very first year for the Ogden-Frei combination.

Much of the Bearcat success this season was provided by underclassmen who will be back again next year, the year after and even the one after that, which amounts to a comforting item for all WU football patriots.

The Bearcat faithful are already convinced that the Ogden-Frei duo will bring Willamette football back to the top-drawer level it once enjoyed. And if the first season for the two young coaches is an indication, it's a good bet they'll disappoint their rooting section.

Franchise Turned Back to NFL

Dallas Deficit Causes Pro Grid Club to Fold

DALLAS (U) — The Dallas franchise in professional football folded Wednesday in the wake of losses that ran to almost a quarter of a million dollars with the season a little more than half finished.

President Giles Miller of the Texans, a club that came to Dallas last winter as the first major league professional football franchise in the state, announced it was being turned back to the National Football League.

It thus will become a "road club" operated by the league and apparently will play no more games in Dallas.

He explained the club did not have sufficient funds to meet its obligations, adding, "for that matter, unless additional funds were made available immediately this club could not play its next game."

Miller showed newsmen a telegram he said he was sending to League Commissioner Bert Hall turning the club back to the league.

Two Cougar Stars Suspended From Squad for Poor Attitude

PULLMAN, Wash. (U) — Jim Head and Dick Bower, star fullbacks on the Washington State College football team, have been suspended from the squad for the rest of the season, it was reported Wednesday.

The WSC athletic news office said Coach Al Kirchner told the pair to turn in their uniforms as a disciplinary action. Kirchner wasn't available immediately for comment.

The student newspaper, the Daily Evergreen, reported the suspension briefly in a general story about the Cougars' chances against California at Berkeley this Saturday.

Some players, who wouldn't permit use of their names, said the suspension came after practice Tuesday night.

They said it involved the pair's attitude toward warm-up drills in practice.

Head, a junior from Spokane, has been the "bread and butter" back for WSC this year and one of the leading ground gainers. Bower, a senior from Great Falls, Mont., has also been a top offensive threat, working behind Head.

The athletic news office said Kirchner was inclined to minimize the suspension.

Terry Campbell, a strict T-formation passing quarterback, so far this year, may also play left half against the Bears when the Cougars want to throw from the single wing. Kirchner said it was reported by some members of the squad that the suspension by Kirchner followed a vote of senior lettermen.

NEW YORK (U) — Dan Shannon of Notre Dame is this week's line-man of the week.

Shannon, a 190-pound sophomore, gained the laurels in the Associated Press weekly poll because of his teeth-jarring tackle of Oklahoma's Larry Grigg.

This tackle occurred in the fourth quarter of last Saturday's game at South Bend and has been termed the key to Notre Dame's upset 27-21 triumph over the Sooners.

The play was seen only by the 57,000 grid fans present but by the millions more who watched on television.

Notre Dame had just tied the score at 21-21 and kicked off to Oklahoma.

Grigg caught the ball and was running full steam ahead when Shannon tackled him on the 23.

The tackle was so hard Grigg fumbled the ball, Notre Dame recovered and scored the winning touchdown within a few minutes.

Coach Jess Hill made it clear he is not ignoring Washington's running game, which figured in the Huskies' victory over California last week.

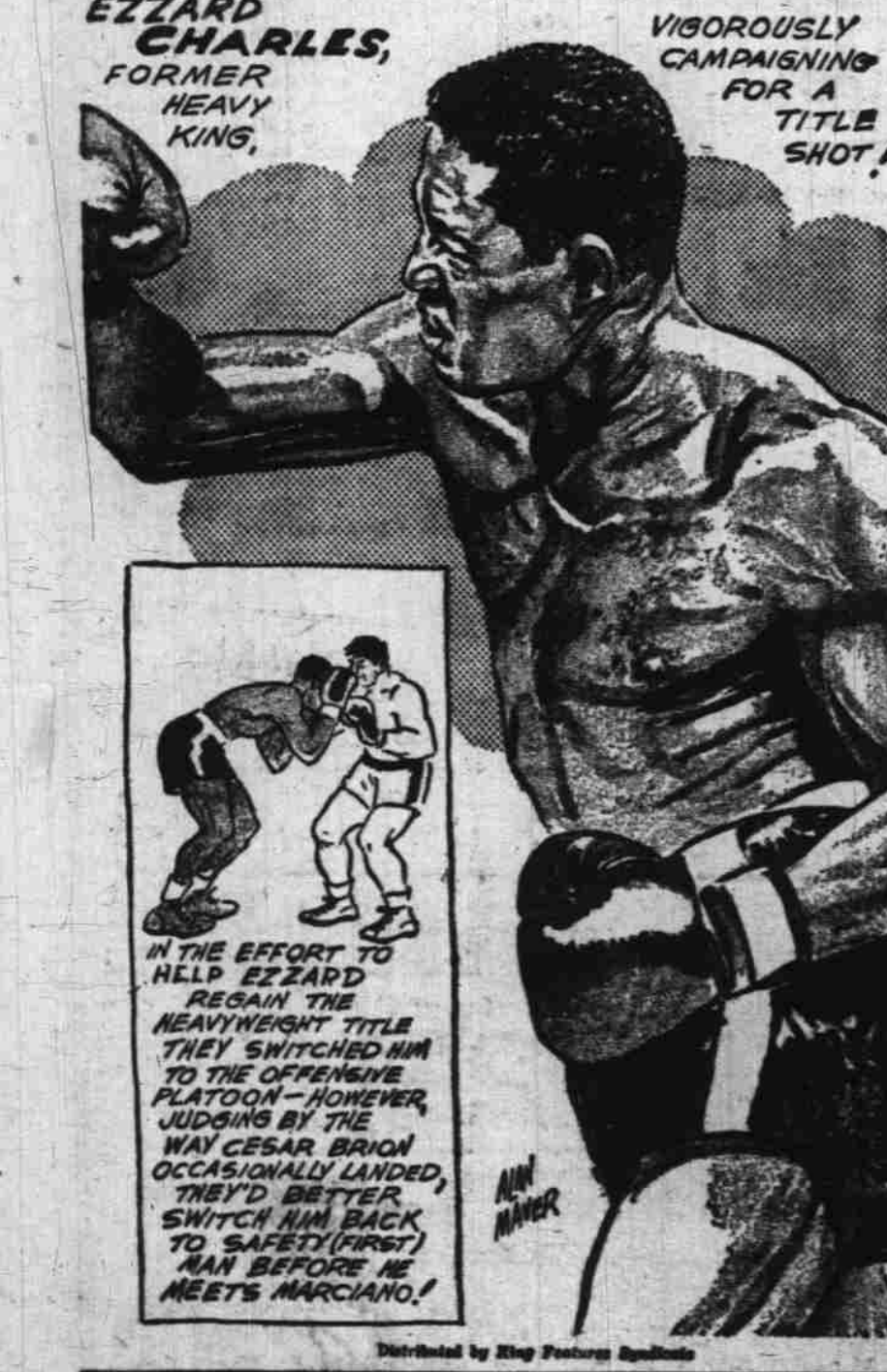
But in Don Heinrich the Trojans will face the sharpest passer in college football.

Leahy Gloomy Over Irish Chances Against Michigan Staters

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (U) — Football Coach Frank Leahy of Notre Dame has always said he'd like his Fighting Irish to play the best in the land.

But he probably never thought the best in the land would be standing in line to take a crack at the Irish. That has come to pass this season.

After battling to upset victories over three of the ten top teams in the current AP poll—Texas, Purdue and Oklahoma—the Fighting Irish Saturday came to grips with the nation's No. 1 team, Michigan State's awesome Spartans.

Whether they are licking their wounds in joy or sorrow after the visitation to the East Lansing arena of the Spartans, Leahy's can't call for an Irish pull.

No, there is also, the

finale, Nov. 29 in Notre Dame Stadium, against Southern California, currently unbeaten, untied and boldly planted in the AP poll's fifth spot.

All this rigorous exercising is one reason ardent Irish supporters think Notre Dame might follow its amazing haymaker against Oklahoma with an even greater upset against Michigan State.

It's the company you keep, they say, and not whether you have averaged 34 points like Michigan State has done against Michigan, Oregon State, Texas A and M, Syracuse, Penn State, Purdue and Indiana.

In that list only Purdue, beaten by the Spartans 14-7 and by the "C" 14, is included among the teams in the AP ranking. The Spartans are tenth.

True, Syracuse is rated 13th and Michigan 20th, but Oklahoma, ranked fourth before last Saturday still is eighth and Texas A Notre Dame victim in Longhorn country, holds ninth. Pittsburgh, Notre Dame's sole conqueror, is rated 14th.

Leahy, looking ahead to the Spartans, is not so much concerned with an Irish letdown in spirit as he is with a technical problem. He points out the same rushing defensive tactics that forced Oklahoma's great split T attack into hurried, fumbling operation, won't work against the single-wing Spartans.

"An eager lineman can be mouse trapped to death by Michigan State," Leahy said. "And that's exactly what happened to us last year when they beat us 35-0

(worst defeat for a Leahy-coached Irish team).

"We come to the Michigan State game this season, the same as last year—with fine results from fast-charging, aggressive linemen against the varied T used by opponents.

"The same tactics that won for us against Oklahoma would make us duck soup for Michigan State. We have to watch every step."
