Police Question Juveniles After Home Burglary

Salem detectives reported Wednesday that several juveniles were being questioned in connection with looting and ransacking of the Mrs. Anna Loewen home, 1529 Trade St., Monday night.

Included in a long list of vandals to the residence was the upheaval and ransacking of practically every drawer in the four-room house. Also water was poured over dining room furniture, oil poured onto the hardwood floors, door chimes ripped from the wall, two dozen eggs broken, phonograph records smashed and food was taken from the refrigerator and thrown into the sink.

No estimate in loss due to vandalism was made. Actual cash losses - in money and jewelry amounted to \$35.

Answer to Suit Blames Driver

The truck-auto accident in which Mrs. Eunice Erickson suffered fatal injuries Sept. 15 was blamed on the driver of the death auto in an answer filed Wednesday to a suit now pending in Marion County Circuit Court.

The original complaint was brought against the Kenneth Poorman Heavy Hauling Co., by Alvin N. Nelson, administrator of Mrs. Erickson's estate. In it damages for the woman's death were sought from the company and from Albert A. Reed, truck driver.

Defendants alleged in their answer Wednesday that Mrs. Erickson contributed to her own death because she entered the auto with the knowledge that the driver, Vernon Reitzer, was "under the influence of intoxicating liquor" to the extent he could not control his vehicle.

The fatal crash occurred at night on the Pacific Highway just north of Salem.

\$2,400,000 Loan Granted in Hearst Estate for Taxes

Hearst died Aug. 15, 1951. Assets marshaled so far amount to \$56,509,476 with further listings to come.

West Salem Saving Center Opening Today

Grand opening for the West Salem Saving Center at a new location, 801 Edgewater St., is slated for today with special events.

The day's program will include numerous gifts and prizes, circus clown and monkey performances and organ music.

An Aug. 15 fire which largely destroyed the store's former building at 525 Edgewater St., a block away from the present site, forced the move several weeks ago. The other building has been rented and replaced by a parking lot accommodating 75 cars of Saving Center customers.

The grocery-drugs-variety shopping center has 7,000 square feet, the entire building at Edgewater and Van Streets, facing the latter. Leased from Paul Woodruff, the structure has been extensively remodeled and a new glass and tile front installed.

J. Ray Atkinson, owner, said the store's staff will comprise 15 persons, headed by Robert Kirk, manager, who came from the firm's Eugene store last summer and has been six years with the company. There are five Saving Center stores in Salem, Eugene and Portland.
