#### Oodles of Gravy

### Diner Gives Meal by Meal Account Of How to Eat Chicken Single Handed

Ever try to eat a whole big fat stewing hen all by yourself? We are now prepared, after exhaustive research, to report a first hand, blow by blow tussle with such a fowl.

The hen is now a thing of the past—with all parts accounted for—even the bit of fat that now reposes quietly in a well-cleaned former dogfood can on top of the stove.

Our hen first appeared as a large potful of lovely stewed chicken with Chinese noodles last Sunday. We simmered her slowly with onion, a clove of garlic, a pinch of mixed herbs, a dash of soy sauce and just the correct amount of salt.

**ADDED NOODLES**

This left one drumstick, two thighs, one wing, two pieces of breast, the back, neck and oodles of giblet gravy.

Tuesday noon we had soup, made by thinning down some of the gravy, and allowing a few noodles to slip into the bowl.

Tuesday night, after considerable thought, we had chicken and gravy for dinner though some of its novelty had gone. Another leg and a wing were chalked up to our credit.

Now there were two thighs, two pieces of breast, two pieces of back, the neck and oodles of giblet gravy.

**TWO DOWN AND THREE TO GO**

A carton was hurriedly packed and frozen on Wednesday morning—filled with a thigh, a large piece of breast and oodles of giblet gravy.

The score is now a thigh, one piece of breast, the back, the neck and oodles of gravy.

Wednesday noon we dug again into the gravy, making luncheon soup.

That night we picked the meat from the back and remaining piece of breast and combined it with chopped celery, olives and dressing to join tomato slices on lettuce.

Only one thigh, the neck and oodles of gravy to go.

Nor storm nor snow—we must push on.

We had, in the meantime, popped bones into the pot and boiled them up for soup. Now we added the gravy and put it into the blessed freezer so come May or June we can have oodles of soup after all has been forgiven.

This noon we plan to do away with the last thigh, toss the neck to the dog and dress up to accept a friend's invitation to supper.

And if she has stewed chicken, and offers us seconds on gravy "cause there's oodles, no less," we shall stand up on the table and scream bloody murder.

## Buying for Your Home

### Now Stainless Steel Gets Glamor Treatment, Good-Looking Flatware

At one time stainless steel flatware was purely a kitchen product. A housewife would use it for measuring a d cooking chores, or perhaps, when she was in a hurry to serve the family breakfast, but certainly not to use on the dinner table.

A few years ago, manufacturers and importers began to glamorize stainless steel. At first a few patterns of the domestic flatware came on the market with a half-hearted attempt at style and economy. Imports arrived from Italy and the Scandinavian countries which were much higher in price and, of course, much better styled. The patina of the better steel flatware shone beautifully and the silhouettes, mostly in modern styles, were lovely. Recently both modern and traditional patterns of stainless steel in good styles have come from domestic houses.

If you are planning to make an

investment in stainless steel flatware, it is wise to know something about its values. Gordon Fraser, an importer of fine European stainless steel, says there are a number of formulas used. The better type has 18 parts chrome, eight parts nickel and the rest, high grade steel. Some European manufacturers use 12 parts chrome and 12 parts nickel for a warmer tone.

Economy stainless steel is stamped from a sheet of metal and, naturally, the resulting finish on edges and handles will show it on close inspection. Better qualities have more work put into the cutting, shaping and polishing, with refinement of details that should be apparent to a good shopper.

If you are buying stainless steel flatware for the same price as a good silver plate, you should have a product that needs only soap and water to keep its luster. It should be acid resistant, and of an alloy that will not allow the handles to become hot when you put the pieces in a hot dish. It should never have an odor and as its name implies—it should never stain.

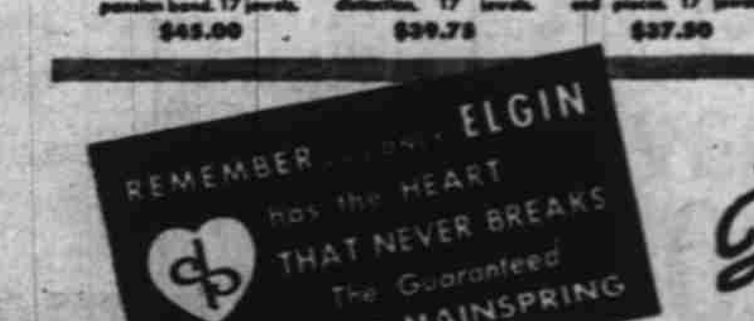
