Army Engineers' Portland office, that it has been decided to complete all of the proposed flood control work next summer. This project in-cludes not only the Cox location near Sanderson's bridge, but the Blakeley and Crenshaw locations. Blakeley and Crenshaw locations. A request for all money needed

to complete this combined work will be included in the engineers' budget to Congress, and it is pro-posed that contracts for the work be let early in May of 1953. Property owners along the San

tiam river, who had not previously given permits or easements, have now given their permission to go ahead. Survey permits for these locations were recently secured.

Present schedules call for com-pletion of the engineers' plans by the end of this year, so that early in January the control district can call a general meeting of land-owners to go over the plans with

the engineers. According to representatives of the Willamette River Basin Com-mission and the Corps of En-gineers, the South Santiam river is considered one of the worst flood threats in the Willamette Valley. 
