

Huge Pavilion Said Assured For Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—Definite plans can now be made for building a big athletic, convention and livestock pavilion in Portland, R. L. Clark told the Oregon Fairs Association Thursday.

Clark, vice president of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, said most of the stockholders have agreed to turn over to the city assets of the P-I and the downtown George White Service Center.

That will give the city property worth 2½ million dollars, he said. The city in turn can add enough without bending to build the center near the present P-I on the site formerly occupied by west Vanport. He added it could be financed by revenue certificates.

The P-I building has been leased to the Air Force as a warehouse. Cecil Edwards, State Racing Commission steward, told the association that attempts would be made in the next Legislature to put revenues from dog and horse racing into the general fund.

If that happened, he said, "very fair in the state will have to have a lobby at Salem. He told fair managers 'not to do anything to rock the boat, or cause a hassle at the Legislature, which is looking for an excuse to dump the racing money into the general fund.'"

Clark spoke in a discussion of proposals to classify fairs according to size to bring about more equitable distribution of racing money.

Body of 2nd Crash Victim Recovered

COOS BAY (AP)—The body of a second plane crash victim was recovered on the beach just north of the Curry County line Wednesday.

The body was that of Charles Harley Woodruff, West Palm Beach, Fla., who was killed when the plane in which he and two companions were flying crashed into the Pacific Ocean between Bandon and Port Orford.

The body of the pilot, Jack Shores, North Bend, was recovered earlier.

Edgar Jenkins of Long Beach, Calif., the other passenger, swam to safety.

Deportation Order Signed for UO Man

PORTLAND (AP)—Immigration Hearing Examiner Louis Hafferman Thursday signed an order for the deportation to China of Dr. Shu-ching Lee, 44, and his wife, Larua.

The Chinese, a University of Oregon assistant sociology professor, and his wife have overstayed their visitors permits.

An expected appeal and the fact that China is in Communist hands will delay enforcement of the order.

New Trash Cans Baffle Bears

VEST GLACIER, Mont. (AP)—Glacier National Park officials here are becoming concerned over the lack of manners bears are showing when eating from trash cans.

It seems the bears have not learned how to eat from modern, swing-top cans. M. E. Beatty, chief park naturalist, says the bears have not learned to push the swinging top in with one paw and reach in for the food with the other. Instead they go after their supper head-first, causing two disturbing problems: dirtier road-sides and visitors who report bears parading around with the top of a trash can as a collar.

Officials are looking for a new type can.

Guam Family's Trip to U.S. Aided by Basin Unit Donation

LEWISTON (AP)—Frank T. Quitugua expects to have his wife and five children fly from Guam to join him in Portland by Christmas thanks to the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Commission.

Quitugua, a native of Guam who was a war prisoner of the Japanese for two years, came to the United States nine months ago as a cook for the Tidewater-Shaver Barge Lines of Portland. He has been saving his money so his wife and children could join him.

He still lacked \$190 when he was assigned to cook for the CBIAI meeting Wednesday at Hells Canyon Lodge on the Snake River. But he has the money now.

Members of the committee and

visitors chipped in \$232 which Douglas McKay of Oregon presented to Quitugua Wednesday night.

"This is the first time in my life, in my 25 years, that I have met so many nice people," said Quitugua as he accepted the money.

He was still marvelling at his good fortune Thursday as he came down the river by boat to Lewiston from the lodge.

"The first thing I do when I get to Portland is to send the tickets to my wife and kids can fly from Guam," he said. "I have five kids. They can get educated better in this country. They are what it is worth living for—my kids."

More, Cheaper Turkey Ready

PORTLAND (AP)—Thanksgiving turkeys will be more plentiful and cheaper this year.

Trade sources reported Thursday that prices to growers for live birds and wholesale prices for dressed birds are 2 to 7 cents a pound below last year's prices.

Wholesale prices at present are 55 to 56 cents a pound on toms and 57 to 58 cents on hens. Last year wholesale prices were 57 to 58 cents on toms and 64 to 65 cents on hens. Last year's retail price was about 63 cents for toms and 69 cents for hens.

Mailing Deadline For Yule Nears

Postmaster Albert Gragg issued a reminder Thursday that Saturday, Nov. 15, is the last day to mail packages destined for overseas, if delivery by Christmas is to be assured.

Gragg also said that to be of assistance to early-morning visitors at the Postoffice the general delivery window hereafter will be open at 7:30 a.m. instead of 8 a.m.

Ike Chairman Due at Meet, May Get Job

NEW YORK (AP)—Walter Williams, a leader in Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's presidential campaign, said Thursday he would fly to Augusta, Ga., Friday for a conference with the president-elect.

Williams, of Seattle, Wash., chairman of the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee, frequently has been mentioned as in line for appointment to a top post in Eisenhower's administration.

In response to queries, Williams said the general had suggested he come to Georgia, where Eisenhower is vacationing, to discuss disbanding the Eisenhower committee.

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Plan for NW's Rivers Told At Lewiston

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—Competing barge lines, railroads and the Inland Empire Waterways Association all have had a hand in delaying development of Snake River navigation to Lewiston, a spokesman for the Inland Navigation Company complained Thursday.

Capt. A. Leppaluto, the firm's general manager, addressed a meeting of the waterways group. He said his company has been trying for 20 years to get permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission to operate two-way barge service between Portland and Lewiston, but its applications have always been opposed by one or the other, directly or indirectly.

About 125 delegates also heard a report on development of Northwest Rivers from Brig. Gen. C. H. Chorpensing of Washington, D. C., assistant chief of engineers for civil works of the Army Corps of Engineers.

He said the army's plans include "positive control of floods of the greatest magnitude known on the lower Columbia, the Willamette, Kootenai and Snake rivers and maximum protection economically justifiable on other tributaries."

"A fully developed channel for inland navigation on the Columbia and Snake rivers from Lime Point, Idaho, 30 miles above Lewiston, to Portland."

"An increase in presently available power generating facilities to meet anticipated early requirements of the region."

"Irrigation of approximately 450,000 acres of new land and provision of supplemental water supply to 530,000 acres."

"Material assistance in meeting stream pollution and drainage problems of the basin and substantial contribution to the recreational opportunities of the region."

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposed merger of United Paramount Theaters and the American Broadcasting Co. was approved Thursday by a Federal Communications Commission FCC examiner despite opposition from some staff experts within the commission.

Orphans Find New Haven

VEICE (AP)—Hundreds of Venetian orphans have found homes and a future, thanks to a foundation honoring a rich Italian youth who died in an air crash in Cannes. He was Giorgio Cini. He died while taking off in a private plane from the Cannes La Motta Airport in August, 1949. Count Vittorio Cini, Giorgio's father, has dedicated his energies and part of his wealth to a foundation named after his son. It cares for orphans of sailors and fishermen and gives them an education and mechanical training. The foundation site is on St. Georges Island.

Now, after two years of reconstruction buildings there, 250 orphans live and study in spacious classrooms, have their own soccer field, an open-air swimming pool and a new theater.

Count Cini also keeps 100 Venetian street urchins on the island, with new dormitories and mess rooms for them.

Sea Monster To Be Built

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—A University of California paleontologist is preparing to reconstruct the bones of a prehistoric "sea serpent."

Dr. Samuel P. Welles says the reconstruction will supply a picture of the grotesque reptile that became extinct about 60 million years ago. He says the reptile is about 25 feet long with a 12-foot-long neck.

The "sea serpent" was discovered in 1946 in Colombia, South America. Dr. Welles recently returned from South America where he investigated some missing links in the serpent's skeletal remains.

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War Memorial Again Popular

TOKYO (AP)—Yasukuni shrine, the Shinto memorial of Japan's war dead, has regained much of its prewar eminence as a Japanese mecca.

An estimated million persons worshiped at the shrine here during the recent five-day Autumn Festival. Many came from remote corners of the islands to pay their respects.

Emperor Hirohito and Empress Nagako were among the visitors. They came for the first time since the end of World War II. During the Allied occupation most Japanese stayed away from the shrine because of its militaristic character.

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
