

One item, strictly for the luxury collectors' trade, is a two heavily hand decorated in gold It has a blue background and the coat of arms with the flate and place—Westminster Abbey - of the coronation. Other supe are shown with crimson background costs of arms and fleur-de-lisand Tudor rose patterns in fold and in brown and fawn with laurel and oak leaf designs. All the commemorative pieces will be made in limited editions.

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
