### Buying for Your Home English China Companies to Export Coronation Items, a Limited Supply

News events of history are often reflected in the fashions and home furnishings of the times. The coronation of Queen Elizabeth II of England on June 2, 1953, has inspired several of the fine English china companies to put out a limited supply of coronation designs for home consumption and American export.

These pieces will undoubtedly interest collectors of English china. One company has a new "royal blue" collection with raised white designs already on display in its New York showroom. Portraits of the queen and the Duke of Edinburgh, by Arnold Machin, have been reproduced in small medallions, candy boxes, tea sets, cigarette boxes and ash trays. This company is also putting out a mug decorated with a stylized coat of arms, designed by Richard Guyatt of the Royal College of Art.

There is a story that designed used for the coronation of Edward VII have been taken from files of old firms since the "E. R." is the same for Edward's and Elizabeth's initials. One item, strictly for the luxury collectors' trade, is a two-handled cup of fine bone china heavily hand decorated in gold. It has a blue background and the coat of arms with the date and place—Westminster Abbey—of the coronation. Other cups are shown with crimson background costs of arms and fleur-de-lis and Tudor rose patterns in gold and in brown and fawn with laurel and oak leaf designs.
