LOS ANGELES W — Unbeaten outhern California drove through rain, mud and the University of Washington football team Satur-Washington football team Saturday for a 33-0 victory to set the stage for next week's Rose Bowldeciding battle in the Coast Conference with undefeated UCLA.

Held to a 7-0 lead for two quarters by a surprisingly stubborn foe from the Pacific Northwest, the Trojans broke loose for two touchdowns in the third period and two more in the final quarter to turn the contest into a rout.
