

Lie Said Prepared to Stay on Job for Year In Event of Deadlock

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) - Diplomatic sources said Saturday Trygve Lie has stated he is willing to remain another year as U. N. secretary-general if the Russians and the West cannot agree on his successor.

There is no indication so far that a deadlock will develop finally on the question of Lie's successor. There are reports that a move is being developed to ask Lie to stay on but at the same time the U. N. halls are full of talk and speculation about various possibilities.

Racketeering Finger Points To Luchese

NEW YORK (AP) - The government Saturday indirectly linked racketeer Luchese to the death of "Three-Finger Brown" Luchese with racketeering in New York City's vast garment industry.

At the same time, in an order from U. S. Attorney Myles J. Lane, Federal investigative agencies were told to step up their probe of Luchese's activities for the possible benefit of a federal racket grand jury.

Taking note of testimony about the 52 year old Luchese Friday before the New York State Crime Commission, Lane recalled in a statement that last Sept. 4 he ordered his aides to "probe into the alleged rackets in the labor and trucking end of the garment industry."

Added instructions at the time, Lane said, were "to focus attention on the allegations which have been made respecting the activities of Luchese," an ex-convict turned wealthy garment manufacturer.

Lane's action Saturday followed on the heels of an announcement by Ben A. Mathews, chief counsel for the state commission, that transcripts of the commission's proceedings were being turned over to Lane and various district attorneys.

A federal narcotics agent, testifying before the commission Friday, described Luchese as the successor to Frank Costello in the nation's underworld hierarchy.

Costello now is in Atlanta Federal Penitentiary, serving an 18-month sentence for contempt of the U. S. Senate's Crime Investigating Committee.

Teenager Dies In Car Crash

PORTLAND (AP) - Patty Russell, 17, died in a hospital here Saturday night a few hours after a car in which she was a passenger crashed into a telephone pole.

Five other teenagers, two girls and three boys, were hospitalized with injuries. The Russell girl was pinned in the crumpled car for 20 minutes before firemen were able to free her with crowbars.

House Probers Rebuke Justice Department

WASHINGTON (AP) - House investigators said Saturday they are reluctant to think the Justice Department tampered with a St. Louis grand jury probe of the Internal Revenue Bureau in 1951, but they rapped officials for displaying "a definite lack of a sense of values."

Included in the scope of this criticism was Ellis N. Slack and the men who were his superiors in the department in 1951. Slack is now head of the appellate section in the department's Tax Division.

The group, headed by Rep. Cliff (D-Ky.) was set up to investigate operations of the Justice Department.

South Koreans Beat Off Reds

SEOUL (AP) - Dug-in South Korean infantrymen on Pinpoint Hill, crest of Sniper Ridge, threw back a sharp Red attack in fog and subfreezing cold at dawn Sunday.

The Chinese struck with a platoon, about 40 men, at 4:30 this morning. Within an hour they had doubled the size of their attack force.

But the Republic of Korea soldiers, who recaptured the crest Saturday for the 15th time in a month, beat the Reds off at 6:30. The Reds scuttled back into their caves on The Yoke, a maze of tunnels, caves and trenches at the northern end of Sniper Ridge.

New Venus Statue Found

NAPLES, Italy (AP) - A new Venus has been discovered in excavations near here. This one, too, is without arms.

It is a finely chiseled bust of the goddess, much larger than life size. It was found in ruins at Masseria del Gigante. Italian archaeologists describe it as one of the most important discoveries in many years.

Nixon Cut His Foot on Beach

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - Vice President-elect Richard Nixon stepped on a sharp object on the beach Saturday and cut his right foot.

He was taken to St. Francis Hospital where a doctor sewed up the cut with three or four stitches. The injury was not serious.

The Republican vice president-elect is vacationing here with his wife and two little girls.

SERVICE DISRUPTED PORTLAND (AP) - Failure of a fuse in the Sacramento office Saturday disabled long distance telephone circuits between Portland and the California city for 14 minutes.

Miss van Vooren was complaining sulkily because Producer Sol Lesser forced her to wear a bra for her first American picture. She formerly worked in Italian pictures, only one of which has passed the censors in this country.

Coffield Makes No Request for Lie Detector

ROSEBURG (AP) - District Attorney Robert M. Stults said Saturday that John William Coffield, accused of implication in the slaying of Georgia Lucille Lang, had not yet asked for a lie detector test.

Coffield, 25, of Vancouver, Wash., surrendered to police at Salem Thursday after he read in a newspaper that Chester D. Crabb of Arago, Ore., had been arrested on a murder charge. At that time Coffield said he would ask for a lie detector test.

Coffield told police that he had been with Crabb and C's 19-year-old Lang girl the night she disappeared. Police said he told them he drove Crabb and the girl to a lonely road near Oakland, Ore., the night of April 9 and left them there.

Crabb, police said, told them he remembered that he, Coffield and the girl had driven to the road and that only he and Coffield had driven back.

The girl's nude body was found in a ditch by a hunter last month. Coffield, held without bail, has not yet hired an attorney, Stults said.

Knowland to 'Fight' Taft if Post Contested

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. William Knowland of California made clear Saturday he would not hesitate to back Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio for Republican floor leader in the new Senate.

The leadership post is now held by Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire and Bridges has said only the threat of a "rough and tumble fight" for the job among fellow Republicans could induce him to try for it again.

Bridges took the post last year in the role of a neutral between rival Senate supporters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Taft for the GOP presidential nomination.

Truman Prepares List of Suggestions For Ike's Approval

HIGHTOWER WASHINGTON (AP) - Officials said Saturday President Truman's primary purpose in his historic meetings with President-elect Eisenhower next Tuesday will be to make certain that Eisenhower is informed on major world problems and how the present administration intends to deal with them.

Informants familiar with plans for the sessions said, at the same time, that they will cover several other points of great importance:

1. The Truman administration will urge Eisenhower to name his top cabinet members dealing with foreign and security problems - state, defense and treasury - within two weeks and direct them to begin working with their Truman administration predecessors here around Dec. 1 at the latest.

2. The administration is also prepared to tell the general and his advisors that a statement by him on the Korean situation, including the present policy of insisting on voluntary repatriation of prisoners of war in any armistice agreement would greatly strengthen the United States in dealing with other nations at the U. N. General Assembly.

3. Eisenhower will have an opportunity to express his views about the foreign policy problems and the present administration's intentions as these are presented to him. Highly placed officials said that Truman will take any Eisenhower views into consideration in making the decisions that have to be made between now and Jan. 20.

4. The meetings will afford an opportunity to express his opinions about the foreign policy problems and the present administration's intentions as these are presented to him. According to present plans, Truman and Eisenhower will hold two meetings. First and probably for a very brief time only, they will meet privately. Some authorities here believe that in this face-to-face session, the President will seek to emphasize to the President-elect that he is deeply anxious to do whatever he can to arrange for a smooth transfer of administration which will prevent the Soviets from taking advantage of any uncertainty in American

policies during the transition period. From the private session the plan is for the two men to go immediately to the cabinet room and join a second and larger session with their advisors. In this meeting are scheduled to be Secretary of State Acheson, Secretary of Defense Lovett, Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, and W. Averell Harriman, foreign aid director. On Eisenhower's side are expected to be Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, his representative to congressional departments of the government, and Joseph M. Dodge, his special representative to the Budget Bureau.
