

'Jet Airstream' Speeds - Airliner Across Pacific

HONOLULU—A Pan American Airways Stratocruiser, sped along by "jet stream" winds over the Pacific, flew 3,950 miles non-stop from Tokyo to Honolulu Wednesday in 11 hours and 30 minutes.

Sidney M. Serebreny, Palo Alto, Calif., Panam's meteorologist, said regularly scheduled non-stop trips from Tokyo "will be routine" after about Dec. 1.

The "jet stream" flights reduce the flying time from Tokyo by six hours and 45 minutes. Normally planes stop at Wake.

Capt. L. D. Scott piloted the Boeing Stratocruiser at altitudes of from 18,000 to 27,000 feet. The plane was thrust along by tail winds averaging 60 miles an hour. Peak winds hit as high as 126 miles an hour.

Serebreny perfected the method of forecasting high altitude, "jet stream" winds that make the new service possible. He said the jet stream service will be possible only for half a year—from Nov. 15 to April 15.

Swearingen Urges Fewer Farm Controls

BAKER (AP) — Marshall Swearingen, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, called Wednesday for fewer government controls on farmers.

Controls, even in the form of subsidies, stand in the way of free enterprise he told the 21st annual convention of the bureau.

He said controls are expensive to operate and hard to get rid of. He urged action on these things, starting in local areas, and moving toward the top: Inflation, war expenditures, confiscatory taxes, the overburden of government and "the idea by many people that the government owes them a profit."

"Inflation may be sweet to the taste, but its counterpart, high taxes, is bitter to the belly," he said.

Swearingen also said the Farm Bureau is for economy and opposes "the give-away program of a government intent on making wards of its citizens."

Sabre Jet Sets Speed Record

THERMAL, Calif. (AP)—Capt. J. Slade Nash flew an F-84D Sabre jet plane over a three-kilometer course Wednesday for an unofficial average speed of 699.9 miles an hour and a new world's record. It eclipsed the world's record of 670.981 miles an hour set in an F-86A by Maj. Richard L. Johnson at Edwards Air Force Base Sept. 15, 1948.

Capt. Nash's mark, set in four roaring low-level passes over the edge of the Salton Sea, was made under rules of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale and the National Aeronautics Association, which must verify it before it becomes official.

At his top speed, Capt. Nash approached the speed of sound, about 775 miles an hour at that altitude and 75 degree temperature. The rules under which the plane must not exceed 1,640 feet in altitude.

LONDON (AP)—Negro blues singer Pearl Bailey and Louis Bellson Jr., white jump drummer, were married Wednesday in the jiviest wedding old London has ever seen.

A five-piece swing band beat out "The Hawk Talks," the 29-year-old bridegroom's own tune, and a crowd of 200 in the streets outside the Caxton Hall registry office joined in — some jitterbugging, some just swaying.

The brief civil ceremony was performed by Chief Registrar James D. Holiday in the same room where he tied the knot Aug. 14 for British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Prime Minister Churchill's niece, Clarissa Churchill.

Father Protest
Bellson was all smiles as he hugged his bride, 34. He told newsmen he was confident of winning over his father, a music store owner of Moline, Ill., who threatened to disown him if he went through with the marriage.

"I hope he will be reconciled to this," the bridegroom said. "I am very happy. Mother is all right and I'm sure father will eventually come around to our way of thinking, once he's met Pearl."

A drummer with Duke Ellington's band, he and the dusky American night club entertainer met only six weeks ago in Washington, D. C. She is now starring in a London night spot, the Colony Club.

Bellson was married in the same gabardine raincoat and red scarf that he wore in flying the Atlantic from New York Sunday.

Pearl was resplendent in a mink coat. She carried greenish yellow orchids that she almost lost worming her way through the crowd.

The vivacious Pearl — a bride four times before — chuckled: "I'm still a little bit nervous, but oh so happy."

The beaming couple hugged and kissed as the ceremony ended.

\$67,773 Spent In Opposing Bet Ban Measure

The Multnomah Kennel Club, Murray Kemp, president, spent \$67,773.93 in opposing a constitutional amendment outlawing pari-mutuel wagering in Oregon at the recent general election, according to an expense account filed in the State Elections Bureau Wednesday.

Kemp also spent \$626.81 of his personal funds in opposing the amendment.

The Oregon Railroad Association, through Harold J. Turner, secretary, spent \$50,383.69 in support of the Motor Carrier Highway Transportation Tax Act and in opposition to a constitutional amendment barring the weight-mile tax on trucks.

Safeway Stores, Inc., through Milton L. Selby, secretary, reported expenditures of \$22,448.21 in support of the Milk Production and Marketing Act Bill.

Morse, who bolted the Republican party during the recent election campaign, declared at a news conference he will rest his case in the hands of the Senate and under the Senate reorganization act of 1946.

Under that act, Morse added, the Senate will decide "where I sit, to which committees I shall be assigned and what prerogatives will be granted to me."

Morse was in Pittsburgh to address an Israel bond drive dinner.

Rescue of Arizona Hunters Mapped

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—An all-out effort to rescue an estimated 100 to 300 hunters still stranded in Arizona's snowbound Mogollon Rim country was being mapped Wednesday night.

Lt. John Jennings, public information officer from nearby Williams Air Force Base, said ground parties are being dispatched to the most critical area and they will direct operations of a fleet of aircraft Thursday.

Five planes, equipped to drop rations and portable radios, will participate in the operation. They will take off shortly after dawn.

"Our reports indicate the situation is still serious," Jennings said.

Foreign Wool Competition Said Ruinous

BUTTE, Mont. (AP)—The president of the National Wool Growers Association called Wednesday night for a program to protect the U. S. wool industry from "the ruinous competition of cheaply produced, low duty foreign wool."

W. H. Steiwer, Fossil, Ore., told the Montana Wool Growers Association convention that indications are the British Commonwealth is "planning a new drive for lower duties in an increased effort to get American dollars."

Steiwer proposed that wool men work for enactment of a parity tariff, passage of federal land legislation, removal of price controls, elimination of sheep diseases, and oppose the extension of trade agreements.
