Cubs' Sauer Named Most Valuable

Phils' Roberts Close Second

NEW YORK (AP)—Sluggish Hank Sauer of the Chicago Cubs was voted most valuable player in the National League Thursday in a photo finish with Robin Roberts of the Philadelphia Phillies and Joe Black of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The long ball won for Hammerin' Hank whose total of 37 home runs and 121 runs batted in offset his .270 batting average. Despite a disastrous September slump, Sauer's slugging feats were judged more valuable to the Cubs than Roberts' job of winning 28 games for the Phils and Black's brilliant relief work for the pennant-winning Dodgers.

In fact, it was the first time since 1938 that the most valuable players in both leagues came from teams that did not win the pennant. Bobby Shantz of the Philadelphia A's was named the American's winner last week.

Tight Race
 It was a tight fit among the three leaders in the National in both first place votes from the 24-man committee of the Baseball Writers Association and the point total.

Sauer eked out a 15-point margin with 236 points, to Roberts' 211 and Black's 208. Points were distributed on the basis of 14 for first place, nine for second and so on down to one for tenth.

The committee of writers—three from each league city—split its first place votes among four men. Sauer and Black each had eight, Roberts seven and Duke Snider, Brooklyn's homer-hitting center-fielder, had one. Snider, however, finished way down the line in an eighth-place tie with teammate Pee Wee Reese.

Sauer was the first Cub to win since his boss, Manager Phil Cavarretta, was named after Chicago won the 1945 pennant. Big Hank's blasting was an important factor in the Cubs' rise from seventh in '31 to fifth place last season.
