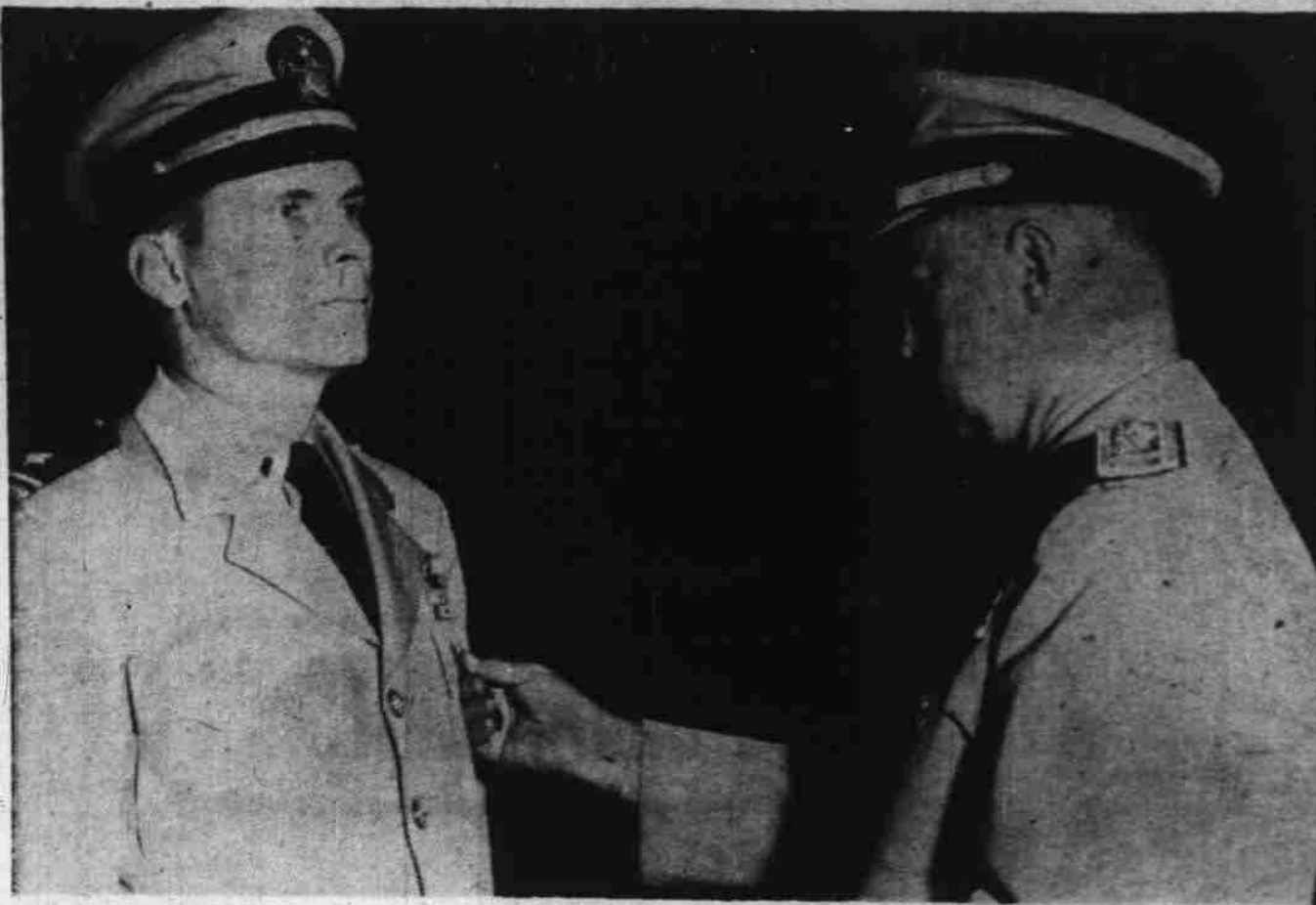

## Hubbard City Election Dated Dec. 1; Population Now 600

HUBBARD—Three councilmen will be elected for two-year terms at the city election of Hubbard in the City Hall on Monday, Dec. 1. The terms of Floyd Dominick, Charles Crittenden and Lawrence Scholl expire this year. Holdovers on the council are the Mayor, Dr. A. F. deLapina, and Councilmen Clarence Friend and Ora Morris. A new city treasurer will be elected to a one-year term to replace L. A. Miller, incumbent, who does not desire re-election. Edward Kelley is town clerk, another office elected annually by the council.

The city of Hubbard covers 80 square miles of ground and according to a city tally has 600 citizens. There are about six acres of ground on the Pudding river, bought as a dumping ground some 20 years ago, that belong to the city. There are six miles of city streets to be kept up, and a sewage system with a large septic tank near the old Woller farm. This is a sewer sewer only and each property owner is expected to have an individual septic tank to dispose of sewage. Officials report the city tank should need cleaning only once in 20 years, but due to some property owners who do not have sufficient septic tank disposal on their properties, it has been cleaned twice in four years at considerable expense to the city. Two city wells supply water for the residents with about 190 homes getting city water. Dominick is in charge of the water department, Morris of the health department, Crittenden the streets, Choll the street lights and Friend the fire department as fire chief. The city owns a firetruck and hall which also houses the rural fire truck, both manned by volunteer firemen.
