2 Car Wrecks Bring \$14,566 In Lawsuits

Three lawsuits seeking judgments totalling \$14,566 for injuries and arising out of two accidents in the Salem area were filed Thursday in Marion County Circuit Court.

In one suit Richard McClain seeks damages totalling \$4,170 for injuries he claimed he received in an auto crash Nov. 24, 1950, at Ferry and South Commercial Streets.

Named defendants are Charley F. Standley identified in the complaint as owner of the other car, and Harold Dean Standley, who the complaint charges was driving.

McClain's father, A. A. McClain, also filed suit against the Standleys seeking to recover \$346 he said he paid out in medical expenses for his son's injuries.

In a third suit Evelyn K. Evans seeks \$10,000 judgment for accident damages from John L. Savage and the Union Circulation Co. In the complaint the plaintiff alleges she was injured when the car in which she was a passenger and a car driven by Savage collided Jan. 20, 1952, at the intersection of Madrona Ave. and the Pacific Highway south of Salem.

Savage was employed by the circulation company and was on duty at the time of the accident, according to the complaint.

2 Benton County Timber Areas Sold

Two Dawson, Ore., lumber firms, the I. P. Miller and the Hull companies, entered bids at the appraised price for two tracts of Benton County timber, the Salem office of Bureau of Land Management announced Thursday.

The tracts totaled 275,000 board feet and are located in wind-thrown and beetle-infested areas. A third tract with 475,000 board feet attracted no bids but may be held open for possible later bids, said Acting District Forester G. F. Horne.

of 52.8 acres. Marion county is second with 5,813 farms averaging 77.7 acres. Wheeler County has only 189 farms, but the average size is 4-265 acres. Malheur county has 4,480 farms, with 2,338 reporting irrigation. These irrigated lands totaled 194,246 acres.
