

Russ Archbishop's Claim Wins Verdict Of Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court overturned Monday a section of a New York law under which the archbishop of the Moscow wing of the Russian Orthodox Church was ousted from his cathedral.

"Here there is a transfer by statute of control over churches," Justice Reed wrote in the 8 to 1 majority opinion. "This violates our rule of separation between a church and state."

Portland Council May Double Its Pay

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland City Council proposes to double its pay.

The plan will be discussed in a public hearing Tuesday. It calls for the mayor's salary to go up from the present \$6,000 a year to \$12,000, and councilmen's pay to increase from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Voters recently sanctioned an increase for the council.

Seoul Prepares For Arrival of Eisenhower

SEOUL (AP)—This war battered city of kings and conquerors began an excitement-packed vigil Tuesday for the arrival of President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Twice occupied by the Communists and twice liberated by the Allies within the recent memory of nearly all its 800,000 citizens, this ancient capital of Korea seemed to pin its hopes for the future on the impression it made on the new American chief executive.

Anticipation ran so high that authorities approved a mass demonstration on the capital grounds for Thanksgiving Day or the day following—whether Eisenhower is present or not.

Some 20,000 school children will parade Wednesday in a warm-up demonstration.

No one knew for certain just when he would arrive because a news blackout will be imposed on his trip.

Despite a drizzling rain, South Korean security troops and mounted police already lined both sides of the highway leading from Kimpo Airport to the capital.

Other guards ringed President Syngman Rhee's hillside home.

A tight police alert prevailed throughout the city to guard against any Communist-inspired demonstration or assassination attempt.

Gen. Mark Clark, top Allied commander, flew in from Tokyo Monday to check with Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Eighth Army commander, on final security arrangements for the president-designate's visit.

Stock Market Pounds Out 1952 Record

NEW YORK (AP)—In a strong advance led by the railroads, the stock market pounded out its second straight new 1952 high Monday.

The advance was accomplished in the bullish atmosphere of volume expanded past the two million share mark, the fourth time this has been accomplished in the past year.

At one time railroads were the sole leaders of the market, but before the close just about all segments joined in the general rise.

Wall Street commentators generally credit bullishness to a revival of confidence in the economic future of the country which definitely points upward for the near-term and intermediate-term.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained \$1 and stood at \$111.10, the second straight new 1952 high.

The average now stands at the highest peak since June 6, 1936. The industrial component of the average was up \$1.10 and the railroads were up \$1.60, both at new highs, while utilities gained 10 cents.
