

Two New Aides Announced on Ike's Staff

NEW YORK (AP)—Thomas E. Stephens, a New York lawyer, was named Friday as special counsel for President-elect Eisenhower. Dr. Gabriel H. Hagberg, New York, was announced as White House administrative assistant.

Stephens, 49, has been serving as Eisenhower's appointments secretary. He is Irish-born, a former New York corporation counsel and a former secretary of the New York State Republican Committee.

Dr. Hagberg will act as liaison man between the White House and government agencies, chiefly on foreign and domestic economic matters.

A native of Hawley, Minn., Dr. Hagberg is 38. He was research director of the Eisenhower campaign while on leave as an editor of the magazine "Business Week." He also has been an economics instructor at Harvard and Princeton universities and a division chief in the New York State Banking Department.

Eisenhower's press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said the general has week-end appointments with John Foster Dulles, who is to be his secretary of state, and others.

Hagerty said these should produce "important and newsworthy announcements."
"You can assume appointments will be made over the weekend," Hagerty added, although he didn't say whether the two cabinet posts (labor and commerce) will be filled.

Those listed for Sunday talks include Dr. Arthur Flemming, president of Ohio Wesleyan University.

Speculation arose that Fleming might be called to fill the office of secretary of labor.

Last February, he was named to preside over the Manpower Policy Committee, a top level agency created by Charles E. Wilson, former director of mobilization.

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Turkey Market Drop Studied By Producers

Like a good many of their fellow citizens, a group of Oregon turkey growers talked it over in Salem Friday and decided they'd had a little too much turkey.

It wasn't their Thanksgiving dinner these growers had in mind, though. It was a declining market for turkey.

A panel of growers and two West Coast poultry experts predicted a reduction in turkey production next year.

Oregon's reduction probably will amount to about 12 per cent, based on a survey of growers, it was stated by Noel Bennion, Oregon State College poultry specialist, at last night's meeting of the Oregon Turkey Improvement Association in Mayflower Hall.

In California lower prices have had the effect of cutting the number of breeders here by 15 to 20 per cent, the group was told by Rube Gonsalon, Los Angeles, executive secretary of the Pacific Dairy and Poultry Association.

The growers' panel agreed turkey production had overexpanded and prices had not been favorable to producers, whom it was estimated to produce, who must now cut their flocks to get on more favorable basis.

Exports referred to were for the month of November.

Areas served by Idaho Power, Utah Power and Light Company, Montana Power Company and California-Pacific Utilities have not been affected by power shortages, which were due to lack of rain in Washington, Oregon and Northern Idaho.

Idaho Power sends its surplus to Utah, which transmits power to Montana, which then feeds into the Washington-Oregon system via an interconnected transmission network.

An Idaho Power spokesman said the company contributed about one-third of the total amount.

"No customer of Idaho Power will need to curtail the use of electricity," he said, "and the same applies to the other intermountain companies."

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AF to Survey Operations in Alaska and NW

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force said Friday it will make a special survey of radio navigational aids and communications systems, en route to and within Alaska, because of the recent aircraft accidents and increased operations.

The Air Force said the survey team will be composed of members of the Air Force Office of Flight Safety, Norton Air Force Base, San Bernardino, Calif.; communication experts from headquarters, Airways and Air Communication Service, Andrews AFB, Washington, D. C.; and members of the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

In a special announcement, the Air Force said:

"The survey team will investigate the adequacy of air force airborne electronics navigation and communications equipment, in addition to all the ground equipment used in navigation."

"In addition it will investigate briefing and training programs for aircraft crews proceeding to and operating within Alaska who are new to the area."

"Flight safety investigators from the office of the inspector general, U.S.A.F., who were sent to investigate the recent accidents in Alaska have not completed their analysis as yet."

"However, it was known that bad weather was a contributing factor in all of the recent accidents, with the exception of the C-119 which crashed Nov. 17 at Billings, Mont."

Brig. Gen. Richard J. O'Keefe, director of flight safety research at Norton AFB, Wash., is to take charge of the C-54 accident investigation.

The Defense Department said the Military Air Transport Service has flown a total of three billion passenger miles since its organization in June, 1948, and that prior to these recent accidents, MATS had only one fatal accident on scheduled transport operations, which occurred in the Philippine Islands in December, 1950.

Also surviving are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Myers, Dallas, S. D.; four sisters and two brothers, including Loyal Myers of Albany.

Two Oregon Men Die in Traffic

A motorist and a pedestrian were killed in Thanksgiving holiday accidents.

Morris David Rodgers, 80, was killed Thursday when hit by a car as he crossed the highway three miles north of Yachats. The car driver, Erling Moe of Florence, was treated for a head cut suffered when he was thrown into the windshield as he tried to avoid the accident.

Moe told police Rodgers stepped into the car's path.

Frank Nelson, 29, Klamath Falls, was killed Wednesday night 35 miles north of Klamath Falls when he tried to flag a car after his own car stalled.

Power Line Jobs Due for Parley

PORTLAND (AP)—Bonneville officials will meet with contractors here Dec. 12 to supply details on \$10,200,000 in Pacific Northwest construction contracts scheduled for award next year.

Cost was estimated at \$5,200,000 on 17 proposed transmission line contracts. They cover principally 465 miles of line linking McNary, Detroit, Lookout Point and Big Cliff projects in Oregon.

Star Clusters in 'Collision' Some Millions of Years Ago

WASHINGTON (AP)—A titanic "collision" of two giant star clusters is believed to have taken place trillions of miles away from the earth, astronomers said Friday.

But there's no need to duck for cover, males. Even if the big celestial crash has taken place—as photographs taken with the 200-inch telescope at California's Mt. Palomar reportedly indicate—it must have happened many millions of years ago.

Even if it still is in progress, it would have no effect on the earth. The only possible effect—and a beautiful one at that—would be on residents of any inhabited planets, if there are such, whirling around some distant "sun" in the supposedly colliding star systems.

Any such citizens would see their night sky brilliantly lighted by a beautiful bluish light, flashed into being by somewhat the same principle of fluorescence which gives us neon signs in the windows of our favorite street corner hash-house.

Holiday Road Toll at 105

Thanksgiving Day holiday accidents killed 129 persons, 105 in traffic and 23 in miscellaneous mishaps.

The period covered by the unofficial survey extended from 8 p.m. Wednesday until midnight Thursday. Cold weather and bad driving conditions kept many motorists off the roads, resulting in a low traffic toll.

The record high Thanksgiving Day traffic toll was 123 in 1948.

Queen Elena Of Italy Dies

MONTPELLIER, France (AP)—Italy's ex-Queen Elena, 79, who was the daughter, wife and mother of monarchs, died Friday with a blessing on her lips for the nation which exiled her in 1946.

The tall, statuesque expatriate, born a princess of Montenegro, died of an embolism—a clot in the bloodstream—at St. Comes Hospital in Montpellier, where she underwent a secret surgery-shrouded operation for cancer two weeks ago.

Lucid to the last, she blessed her sister, the princess of Battemberg, and her lady in waiting, Countess Iacarina, pronounced a further blessing on her children and ended by invoking divine intercession for the people of Italy.

Elena was the widow of Vittorio Emanuele III. She helped him rule Italy almost half a century and left with him upon his abdication in 1946 for Egypt, where he died Dec. 28, 1947.

Her son, ex-King Umberto, ruled Italy in the few weeks between Vittorio Emanuele's abdication and the establishment of a republic.

Empire Begins Trade Confab

LONDON (AP)—Leaders of the British Commonwealth reached a general agreement Friday to begin tearing down the wall of restrictions they have built to protect their trade.

The hope is that, in tossing out these restrictions, they will promote the international commerce needed to put the British economy on a sounder footing.

But the first business session of the nine-nation economic conference broke up for the week end without any decision on just where to start.

Jury Recommends Soap And New Cook for Jail

PORTLAND (AP)—"A barrel of soap and a new cook" was "highly recommended" for the city jail here by the Multnomah County grand jury.

The jury said in a report after the inspection made as part of its studies that the jail "could be cleaned up considerably, especially the kitchen."

Miss Phillips In State Work Here Since '29

The new secretary of the interior's personal secretary, Miss Alone (Peg) Phillips, will be climbing some 20 years in public service when she goes to Washington in January.

A graduate of University of Oregon and well-known throughout the state's journalistic circuit, Miss Phillips came to Salem in 1929 to be secretary to the late Hal E. Hox, then secretary of state. During the year he was ill, she served as chief deputy secretary of state, and then resumed her position as personal secretary when P. J. Stadman succeeded Hox.

She continued after the late Earl Soell was elected in 1934, working with him for the eight years he held the office. She moved to the chief executive's office when Soell became governor in 1942. Upon his death in an airplane crash in 1947, she became the secretary to Gov. John Hall. McKay retained her in that position after he was elected governor in 1948.

Miss Phillips, 47, served for the Oregon City Enterprise before coming to Salem. Since then she has edited six editions of the Oregon Blue Book. She is an associate member of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association, and prominent in other women's activities including Zonta International and Theta Sigma Phi, national journalism honorary. She is also a member of Alpha Phi sorority.

Luchese Shows Up for Papers

NEW YORK (AP)—In the midst of a big FBI search, Thomas (Three Fingers Brown) Luchese (Friday quietly accepted a denaturalization summons—first step in a deportation move against him.

The purported successor to underworld racketeer Frank Costello walked into his lawyer's office to end a 10-day search.

Apparently, a wealthy garment manufacturer, he came to this country as a child from Sicily and was naturalized in 1943.

The federal government asked his denaturalization on grounds that he concealed a criminal record when he took out naturalization papers. He is a ex-convict with several arrests against him. His only conviction, however, was in the 1920s for auto theft.

Luchese has 60 days to answer the government's complaint.
