Holiday Thoughts

Looking Forward to Christmas Preparations, We Talk Recipes

Girls, we have exactly 11 daily stories and three Friday food sections before Christmas. And that means we have to cover the subject of cookies, fruit cakes, plum puddings and sauces, edible gifts and Christmas menus in that time.

Cookies probably take up more time and space than any of these subjects, because they are so popular and therefore new and old recipes are in demand.

We have some old standbys which we like to talk about each year. When we don't, we get requests for them. First we usually include this delicate cookie that has possibilities for decorating and which is a good keeper, will pack nicely and is very pretty to serve. The recipe is similar to Spritz, but this is Norwegian. It calls for butter—and plenty of it.

BERLINER KRANZ

4 raw egg yolks
2 cups confectioners sugar
3 hard cooked egg yolks
7 cups flour

Vanilla
1 pound butter (or other shortening)

Whip raw yolks as well as possible with the sugar. Add mashed yolks that have been combined with some of the butter. Add remaining ingredients, mixing with the hands rather than with an electric beater as the latter dries out the dough. Roll out in long rolls about the size of a pencil, cut off, fold ends over, like a small wreath and let stand overnight if possible. Brush tops with egg white mixed with a little water, dip on coarse sugar or colored sugar. Bake at 350 degrees until a very delicate brown. They cook easily.

Lebkuchen is an old world recipe for a cut cookie. In Germany it was frosted in pink.

LEBKUCHEN

4 whole eggs
1 pound light brown sugar
2 cups flour

1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 ounces citron, cut fine
¼ pound almonds

Beat eggs well, add sugar gradually, beat again, mix remaining ingredients. Bake in flat greased pans and when done, frost with uncooked icing. Cut in diamond pieces and allow to cool. These will keep for some time.

A Spritz cookie is an old favorite in many families, but here's one that is a bit unusual because it takes whole wheat flour:

WHOLE WHEAT SPRITZ

½ pound butter
4 cups sugar
3 egg yolks

2½ cups whole wheat flour
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Soften butter, cream with sugar, beat in yolks and add flavoring and flour. Use cookie gun or roll in small balls, bake in an ingreased pan for 10 minutes at 400 degrees. Decorate with small pieces of candy or cherries.

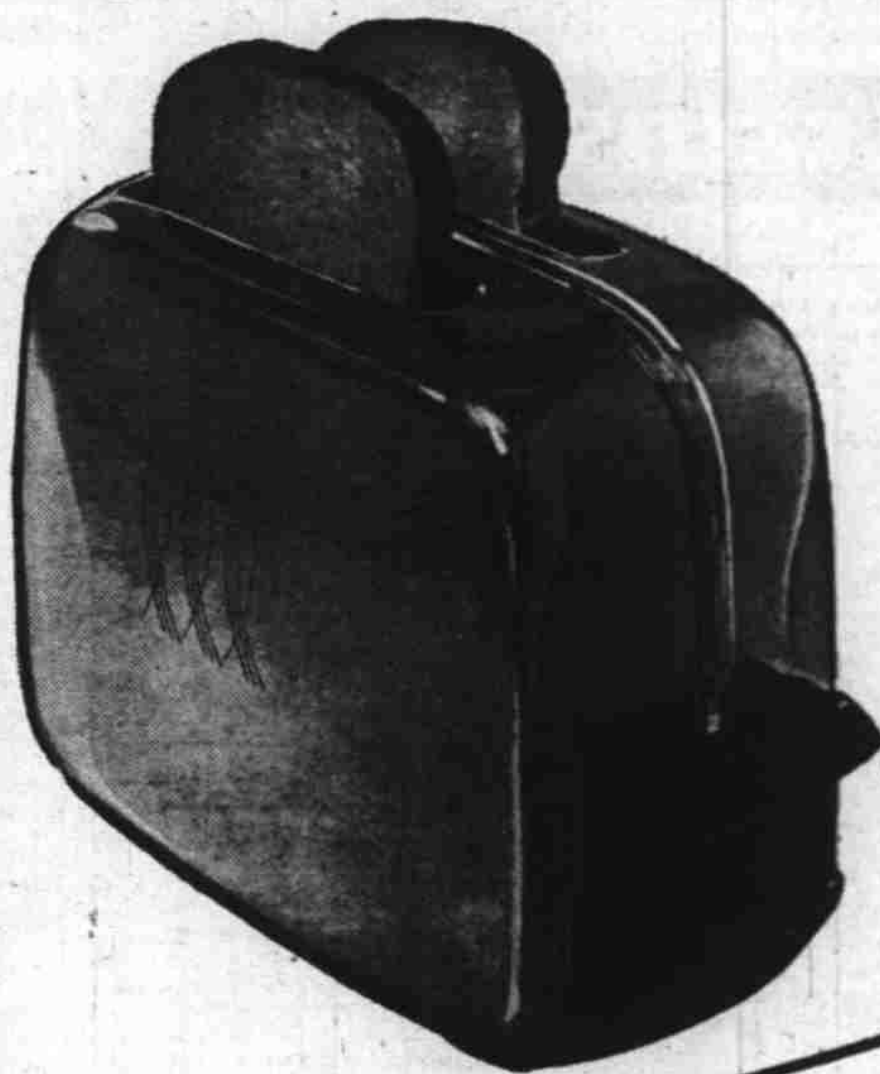
