

3 Noted Lawyers Advise Lie to Fire U.N. Employees Active as U.S. Commies

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Three world-renowned lawyers advised U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lee Sunday that he can and should fire any U. N. staff employee who is an active member of the American Communist Party.

The legal panel also advised firing any employee who invokes the constitutional ground that he might incriminate himself for refusing to answer whether he was guilty of espionage or subversive activity against the U. S. at any time, or whether he was a member of the American Communist Party at the time he was questioned.

"In our opinion there is no immunity of privilege enjoyed by any member of the United Nations staff behind which he could shelter if brought to account on any charge of his taking part in subversive activities against the United States of America," the opinion read.

The legal language of the 50-page opinion—made public on the eve of another McCarran Senate subcommittee hearing in New York on Communism in the U. N.—appeared to leave some loopholes for one-time Communists.

But the lawyers told Lee unmistakably that it was up to him to inquire into any case where responsible charges raised suspicions.

Lie several weeks ago hotly told U. S. probes he would not act on what he termed "smeared." However, he has already fired some employees and suspended others because of evasive answers.

The jurist panel noted that the whole U. S.-U. N. employee Red-tinted relationship affected "only a small proportion of the staff" of 4,000.

Three Lawyers
The lawyers were: William de Witt Mitchell, New York, who was U. S. solicitor-general under President Coolidge, and U. S. attorney general under President Hoover;

Sir Edwin Herbert, senior partner of a London law firm, chairman and director of a number of British companies, and a war-time director of postal and telegraph censorship;

Paul Veldekens, president of the Belgian Supreme Court defense lawyers — highest legal post in Belgium—a specialist in civil law contracts, and professor of law at the Catholic University of Louvain.

Two Men Die In Tanker Blast

TOKYO (AP) — The U. S. Navy reported Monday two men were killed, one is missing and nine were injured Sunday in an explosion and searing fire on the tanker Ashtabula in Sasebo Harbor.

Three of the injured sailors were in critical condition.

The Navy said the 25,000-ton vessel caught fire after a gasoline tank blew up while the ship was loading oil in the Southern Japan port.

STATE ENTERPRISES SOLD
TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — The government has decided to sell a number of state enterprises—including a cement works, paper mill and fertilizer plant—to help finance its land reform program. Proceeds will be used to compensate landlords for holdings turned over to the farmers who till the land.

Nixon 'Doesn't Want' Morse Vote in Senate

DALLAS (AP) — Vice President-elect Richard Nixon said Sunday "We don't want and don't need" the vote of Sen. Wayne Morse, who bolted the Republican Party in the presidential campaign.

Nixon stopped here en route by air to represent GOP President-elect Dwight Eisenhower at Monday's inauguration of Rudolfo Ruiz Cortines as new president of Mexico.

A reporter asked Nixon what he thought about Morse, Oregon senator who was elected as a Republican but endorsed Democrat Adlai Stevenson in the presidential campaign.

In reply, Nixon lashed out at Morse for the latter's charge that Eisenhower Cabinet appointments thus far have been reactionary.

"It is not a Taft Cabinet; it's not a Dewey Cabinet; it's strictly an Eisenhower Cabinet," Nixon said. "The Cabinet appointments speak for themselves. The appointments were controlled by nobody. The Cabinet is fulfillment of our pledge to name people best fitted for the jobs."

Morse, Nixon said, doesn't know what he's talking about. "One day he says one thing, the next day something else. We don't want and don't need his vote."

Morse announced Saturday he would vote with Republicans in organizing the new Senate but will maintain his status as an independent by not participating in either Republican or Democratic caucuses.

Morse's decision bolsters GOP control over the Senate. Republicans previously had 48 seats, Democrats 47, with Morse listed as an independent.

Nixon was accompanied by his wife, Patricia.

Simple Funeral Rites Held for Sister Kenny

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — The little wooden Neil Street Methodist Church in Toowoomba was packed with mourners Monday morning for a simple funeral service for famed nurse Sister Elizabeth Kenny.

Hundreds of mourning townspeople who could not find room in the church stood outside in silent tribute to the 66-year-old specialist in the treatment of poliomyelitis. They could hear the faint sounds of Sister Kenny's favorite hymns "Abide With Me," and "Lead Kindly Light."

The services, which were broadcast on Australia's world short-wave service, were conducted by the church's rector, the Rev. J. Tainton.

The chief mourners were Sister Kenny's two sisters and her adopted daughter, Mrs. Mary McCracken. The American government and people were represented by the U. S. consul general in Queensland, Charles Carson.

Sister Kenny, who died Sunday afternoon, was buried near her mother's grave in a tiny cemetery of the small farming settlement of Nobby, about 12 miles from her Toowoomba home.

Primitive Relic Found in Canada

GILBERT PLAINS, Canada (AP) — The flint head of an ancient weapon has started federal archaeologists on a hunt for traces of primitive man near this town.

Recently a "Plainview" projectile point was found in a local collection. The find prompted Dr. R. S. MacNeish of Ottawa to launch a survey of the district and test excavations of the site where the point was found.

Plainview points — leaf-shaped arrow or spear heads with diagonal flaking on the flint — first were found in Texas. They have been associated with the bones of extinct, ice-age animals. The men who made the Plainview points were of the first known culture in North America.

MT. FUJI MAY ERUPT
TOKYO (AP) — Japan's cone-shaped Mt. Fuji volcano, dormant for almost eight and a half centuries, probably will erupt in four or five years, says a Japanese geologist.

Membership in Scout Units at Record High

Boy and adult membership in Salem Boy Scout units is at a record high, the Salem scout office reported Saturday.

And several hundred more boys are expected to be added to the rolls before the end of the year, for the entire Cascade Area Council is now in its annual membership drive.

James Kerns, assistant scout executive in charge of the Salem district, said that on Nov. 1, total boy membership in the district's 42 units stood at 1,321, approximately 100 above the same time last year.

"And these figures do not include totals for November," Kerns said. "The total, including December, will be even higher. We don't have all the figures yet, but adult membership in this district also is at a record peak. And the number of cub, scout and explorer units is two more than we've ever had."

Kerns attributed the increases mostly to more and better trained adult leaders, especially in the cub scout field, to Salem's boy population increase and to "a general increase of activity in the scouting program."

LONDON (AP) — Winston Churchill was 78 years old Sunday and he celebrated like any typical elderly English gentleman at a quiet family party with cakes and ale.

Beaming with health, the prime minister spent most of the day in his slippers and lounging robe at 10 Downing Street opening "happy returns" cards and reading cables of well wishes from the four corners of the globe.

For the "Old Man" — as he's affectionately called — it was a day of complete relaxation and a far cry from some other birthdays in his turbulent career.

Advertising Magnate Dies

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — George W. Kleiser, 78, co-founder of Foster and Kleiser, second largest outdoor advertising firm in the nation, died early Sunday at his San Mateo home.

Kleiser, who had been in ill health several years, resigned as board chairman Oct. 17 after the W. R. Grace shipping interests purchased 98 per cent of Foster and Kleiser common stock for 7½ million dollars.

Born in Cloverdale, Calif., he graduated from Temple University Dental School in 1907. In 1901, he and Walter F. Foster of Seattle founded the outdoor advertising firm there.

Within a short time, they expanded their business to cover the Pacific Northwest and then invaded California, moving headquarters here.

Kleiser is survived by his widow, Maude, and two sons, all of San Francisco.

Doctor Follows Mom's Footsteps

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (AP) — Dr. Frances Zoeckler is following in the footsteps of her mother, who was a medical missionary in Iran for 40 years.

The 33-year-old doctor, who was born in Iran, is now interning in obstetrics in a hospital here. Upon completion of her work she hopes to return to practice in Iran. The doctor, who won her medical degree from John Hopkins University, had been in charge of work for women and children at an Iranian hospital.

Dr. Zoeckler's mother, Dr. Mary A. Zoeckler, recently retired and makes her home here. The doctor's father, a Presbyterian minister, died in missionary service in Iran.
