

Inter-Business Communication Plan Stressed

Better communications between all business people is the key to better business relations, a government mediation and conciliation service official told a large industry supervisors audience Tuesday night.

Charles T. Estes, who is special assistant to the director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, was the speaker. He said when people can learn to talk understandingly to others, when they can avoid speech difficulties, and when they can understand each other as language barriers, all human relations in business will be smoothed out.

Estes spoke to 108 members and guests of the Industrial Supervisors Club, the largest gathering in the organization's four-year history.

Attending the meeting from Salem were representatives from nearly all the city's canneries, both paper mills, two lumber concerns, three steel and iron firms; the meat packing industry, linen and flax mills, and representatives from nine automobile agencies. In addition there were labor officials and representatives of several of the downtown businesses.

The speaker's topic was "Human Relations in Industry." Estes has been a manufacturing company executive and a foreign representative for a business concern.

Special guests attending the meeting were Leroy Smith and George Walker from the Portland office of the mediation service; Dr. Paul Kleinsorge, professor of economics, and Ben Padrow, graduate student in speech, both from the University of Oregon; Earl Wells, chairman of the speech department and Karl Wenger, member of the speech department, both from Oregon State College; Dr. J. C. Caughlin, and Richard Haves, both from Portland State College.

Transfusion System Takes Only Plasma

PHILADELPHIA (U-P) — A new blood transfusion technique which may make possible as many as 50 a year from a person instead of the five or six now believed safe was described Tuesday at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

Essentially the technique involves taking only the plasma or liquid portion of the donor's blood, leaving him the red blood cells. Dr. Joseph Stokes Jr., physician-in-chief at the hospital, said the new method still is in the experimental stage, but when put into practice will be a way to increase the supply of gamma globulin. That's the fraction of blood that protects against polio and some other diseases.

Mass tests made last summer showed that gamma globulin protected against paralytic polio for at least five weeks and, in many cases, for a longer period.

The new technique involves a process long known to the medical world as plasmapheresis. A machine skims off the plasma from the blood as it is taken from the donor making it possible to give him back his own red blood cells. The freshly drawn blood is sent into a centrifuge that whirles the blood at tremendous speeds causing the separation in the same way that cream is separated from milk.

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Budget Includes Money for Third Super Carrier

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Secretary of Defense Lovett said Tuesday the new Defense Department budget would include money for the Navy to start construction of a third super carrier.

He made the statement in answering news conference questions about the prospects of beginning work on another 60,000 ton flat-top. The budget includes the department's spending requests for the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

Lovett declared that inclusion of the new carrier item does not require the formal approval of the joint chiefs of staff (in which the air force had been opposed to the program) but only the "advice" of the joint chiefs. He said he had that advice.

The Navy now has work underway on one giant carrier, the Forrestal, and the keel for a second, the Saratoga, is to be laid this month.

CIO Works to Erase Rift Over Presidency

ATLANTIC CITY (U-P) — The CIO worked Tuesday to repair a deep rift in its ranks over choosing a new CIO president — a scrap not yet over, but apparently won by 45-year-old Walter Reuther.

The dynamic, red-haired Reuther, president of the big CIO Auto Workers Union, was widely conceded as having whipped together enough votes to get the CIO presidency in any convention showdown.

Top officials were trying to get forces backing CIO Executive Vice President Allan S. Haywood, a 54-year-old veteran union leader who came up from the coal mines, to concede to Reuther.

But Haywood and his chief supporter, David J. McDonald, president of the CIO Steelworkers Union, were still pledging a finish fight that could spill over on the convention floor. Selection of officers is due Thursday.

Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, a convention speaker, advocated a tight economic boycott to prevent shipments via Latin America of supplies and raw materials to Communist China.

He commended President-elect Dwight Eisenhower for his choices for the labor and commerce posts in the new cabinet. "As one who has criticized most of the president-elect's cabinet appointments," Morse said, "I want to compliment him on the appointment of Martin Durkin as secretary of labor and Sinclair Weeks as secretary of commerce."

These two able men will direct those departments of our government which have most to do with the industrial phase of our economy. I admire both and have a great deal of confidence in their fairness and in their enlightened understanding.

Morse also urged the CIO to negotiate a merger with the AFL.

Woodburn to Keep Officers

WOODBURN — The Woodburn City Council Tuesday night voted to retain all city officers. They are C. R. McGee, auditor; D. G. B. Smith, health officer; Blaine McCord, city attorney; Max Warring, street commissioner; Adrian Schooler, water superintendent, and Joe Sowa, fire chief.

The council approved the renewal of seven liquor licenses. They requested written applications for firemen dispatchers, during the six-month trial period after dial telephone system goes into effect Dec. 27. Applications are due to the fire chief or recorder by Dec. 13.

Infant Critically Burned at Baker

BAKER (U-P) — Barbara Miller, year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. O. Miller, was in critical condition in a hospital here Monday from burns suffered in a fire that destroyed the interior of the Miller home.

The father awakened to find flames spreading through the house early Sunday. He broke a window, suffering a severe arm gash in doing it, and helped his wife and four children to safety. By the time he rescued Barbara, flames had reached her crib.

Firemen said an overheated stove was to blame for the blaze.

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Praise Given to Ralph Dobbs, Portland Symphony Concert

Tuesday night's concert by the Portland Symphony orchestra will stand out in our mind as one of greatest enjoyment. Not only was the orchestra at its best, Ralph Dobbs, piano soloist, proved an excellent selection as guest artist. Each year brings a better Portland orchestra to Salem for James Sample constantly improves his playing organization and this year, as before, there has been a marked improvement in the group.

Comparatively few Salem folk realize the caliber of Ralph Dobbs' talent, but those who heard him playing the Liszt Concerto in E Flat with the orchestra last night now know something of his brilliance as a pianist.

We have heard him before, but never playing so well. The strength and the delicacy of his playing were given full sway in the piece chosen for the performance. Those not attending missed a great performance by a real artist.

Sample's selection of a program was excellent, anyone even lukewarm on symphony music would have thrilled to the music as played by the orchestra.

The colorful Mignone overture was followed by a lively wedding symphony by Goldmark, then a Stravinsky group, the stirring Liszt Concerto and finally a modern symphony No. 5 1/2 by Gillis, "Symphony for Fun." And it was just that, very modern and very likeable.

An encore was Berlioz' March to the Scaffold from the Fantastic Symphony.

Too many seats are unsold, for these symphony concerts are well worth while—as good music, and far easier to attend than if it were necessary to travel a distance to hear.

Medical Books On Sex Draw Solon's Wrath

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Rep. Ezekiel Gathings (D-Ark.) Tuesday accused a New York publishing firm of exploiting a picture of Rodin's statue, "The Kiss," as "misleading come-on advertising" for medical books dealing with sex.

The Rodin statue depicts a man and a woman, both nude, locked in an embrace.

Gathings, chairman of a special House committee investigating alleged obscene literature, leveled his criticism at Martin Scheer, an executive of the Eugenes Publishing Co., New York, which publishes books on sex written by physicians.

Staunchly defending his company's books as educational, Scheer said they deal with "maladjustment in marriage and the proper conduct in marriage."

Among the titles, he listed "Love the Science of Sex Attraction," "The Art of Love," "The Torch of Life," and "The History of Prostitution."

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Boy's Game of Russ Roulette Fatal to Girl

RENO, Nev. (U-P) — A vodka-drinking high school boy was booked Tuesday on a charge of slaying his 13-year-old red-haired sweetheart during a game of "Russian Roulette in reverse."

The shapely girl, Barbara Hopman, had run away from her Tracy, Calif., home with the youth, Pat Chavez Alvarar, 16, last week — leaving a note giving her toys and funny books to a younger brother. Barbara was five foot five, weighed 138, was pretty and had the appearance of a girl of 18.

Police Chief L. R. Greeson said Alvarar admitted he shot the girl Monday night in a cheap hotel room they shared as man and wife. A companion in the room, Carl Cecil Wofford, 16, also of Tracy, was quoted by Chief Greeson as saying this is what happened:

The youths left Barbara alone at the hotel while they went out for the vodka.

When they returned, Alvarar emptied his .32 revolver of all but one cartridge, spun the chamber and pointed it at Wofford.

"Do you love me?" asked Alvarar of the other boy. The reply was "yes," but Alvarar pressed the trigger on an empty chamber.

Then he pointed the gun at Barbara, holding it close to her head, and asked the same question, "Do you love me?"

Greeson quoted Alvarar as saying he didn't remember what the girl answered, but that the gun went off, killing her instantly.

Usually in Russian Roulette each party tries out the gun on himself.

Barbara was president of her eighth grade class in Tracy, was one of the most conscientious and courteous girls in school, said her teachers.

Alvarar and Wofford both had minor juvenile crime records in Tracy.

Death Closes Auto Speeding Case for Pilot

FAIRFIELD, Calif. (U-P) — A Navy jet pilot, Ens. Marvin S. Cohn of Portland, Ore., was cited for automobile speeding here Nov. 4 while awaiting shipment to Korea.

Justice of the Peace Georgia Crowley received a letter from Cohn two weeks ago saying: "I will be unable to appear in court as my ship has sailed for Korean waters."

"However I would caution you to submit any financial claims rapidly, because jet flying, especially in the Korean theater, has turned out to be hazardous," he mentioned the possibility of the justice receiving "an addressee deceased" letter in return.

Judge Crowley sent a request that the fine be paid. It came back Tuesday stamped "addressee deceased." Across a corner of the letter was scribbled:

"Ens. Cohn was killed in his jet plane when it crashed aboard the U.S.S. Philippine Sea Nov. 18 while on training maneuvers."

Ike Plays Harmonica

NEW YORK (U-P) — President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower, an amateur painter and an amateur chef, is a musician, too. He plays the harmonica.

So there'll still be music at the White House after Harry S. Truman, the piano playing President, moves out next month. Some of it will come from Mamie, who plays the piano, too.

A new harmonica, an imported model with a range big enough for some of the works of Beethoven and Brahms, was sent to the general Tuesday by Henry Feinberg, Manhattan music dealer who has known for some time about the general's fondness for a "mouth harp."

New Purge Threatens in Czechoslovakia

VIENNA, Austria (U-P) — The shadow of a new purge hovered Tuesday night over Czechoslovakia, with announcements that a cabinet minister had been fired and a new ambassador had been named to Moscow.

The key to the next phase of the Czechoslovak purge may be mystery-man Karl Kriebusch, formerly an ambassador to Moscow, a behind-the-scenes mover in Prague Communist ranks for years.

The Prague Radio gave no clarification in the two announcements.

It reported that Dr. Antonin Gregor, minister of foreign trade, was relieved of his post and succeeded by Richard Dvorak, former deputy minister who testified at last week's purge trial of 14 former party chiefs.

The radio announced that President Klement Gottwald has named Jaromir Vosahlik as the new Czechoslovak ambassador to Moscow.

Gottwald emerged the victor in what apparently was a vicious struggle for power with Rudolf Slansky, sentenced to be hanged.

Paint Thinner Kills Convicts

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (U-P) — Four white convicts died in agony and seven others were left violently ill Tuesday after drinking paint thinner cocktails in a Sunday morning binge at Kilby Prison.

One of the survivors was on the doubtful list, but the other six were expected to recover, said State Prison Director J. M. McCullough.

One of those who died was desperado Troy Blackstock, 38, elder of two brothers who wielded a reign of terror across Southwest Alabama and Mississippi 11 years ago.

McCullough said the survivors told him a convict assigned to a painting detail smuggled the deadly drinks into a cell block and that Blackstock sold them. The paint thinner contained poisonous methyl alcohol.

South Koreans, Reds Battle Hand to Hand

SEOUL (U-P) — Chinese Reds clambered across the snow-covered slopes of Sniper Ridge Wednesday and battled hand to hand with South Korean defenders in near-zero weather.

Front reports said the Chinese made their strongest thrust in three weeks during the pre-dawn darkness but were forced to withdraw after 90 minutes of close-quarter fighting. Just before the assault, Chinese guns raked the crest of Pinpoint Hill, highest peak on Sniper.

Allied guns aided in shopping up the assault.

The Reds overran a small outpost position in their drive up the slope.

Temperatures on the mountainous Central Front plunged to one degree above zero just before dawn.

The scarred earth was frozen solid. Six inches of new snow covered the battle front.

In the air war, 15 Okinawa-based B-29s Tuesday night bombed an airfield at Pyongyang, a military school and rail yard near the Red Korean capital and Communist front line positions.

B-26 light bombers attacked the Samdang rail bridge, troops south of Wonsan, and rolling stock all across the peninsula. Pilots claimed 110 vehicles destroyed.

Two Sabre jet interceptors duelled two Red MIG jets over North Korea Tuesday and shot down one of them.

Silverton Raps Cascade 50-36

CASCADE HIGH SCHOOL (Special) — Silverton's Silver Foxes built up an early lead Tuesday night and went on to a 50-36 victory over Cascade's Cougars as both teams made their first plunge in the 1942-53 hoop wars.

Silverton moved to a 26-15 margin at the half and was in front throughout the final half. Leon McCammon paced the Foxes with 13 points and Don Sproul was tops for the Cougars with 13.

The Cascade Jayvees topped the Silverton seconds 46-42 in the preliminary game.

Cold December On U.S. Forecast

WASHINGTON (U-P) — A colder than normal December is in sight for most of the country.

The Weather Bureau said Tuesday its 30-day outlook "calls for temperatures to average below seasonal normals over most of the nation except for near or slightly above normal in Florida and in the northern tier of states from the Dakotas eastward through New England."

Decision on Testimony of Snyder Stalled

WASHINGTON (U-P) — House investigators Tuesday put off—possibly until next year—any decision on calling Sec. etary of the Treasury Snyder to explain his interest in a 20 million dollar tax case.

With less than a month remaining of the Democratic 82nd Congress, there were indications that the incoming Republicans may take over the Snyder inquiry as well as a long-delayed investigation of the alcohol tax unit in the Internal Revenue Bureau.

Rep. King (D-Calif.), chairman of the House Ways and Means Subcommittee which has been investigating the Bureau, said there was no prospect of calling Snyder "if the evident intention of the members present is carried out."

Later, however, he said the possibility of having Snyder before the present committee was "not out of the question" but that it would be decided later.

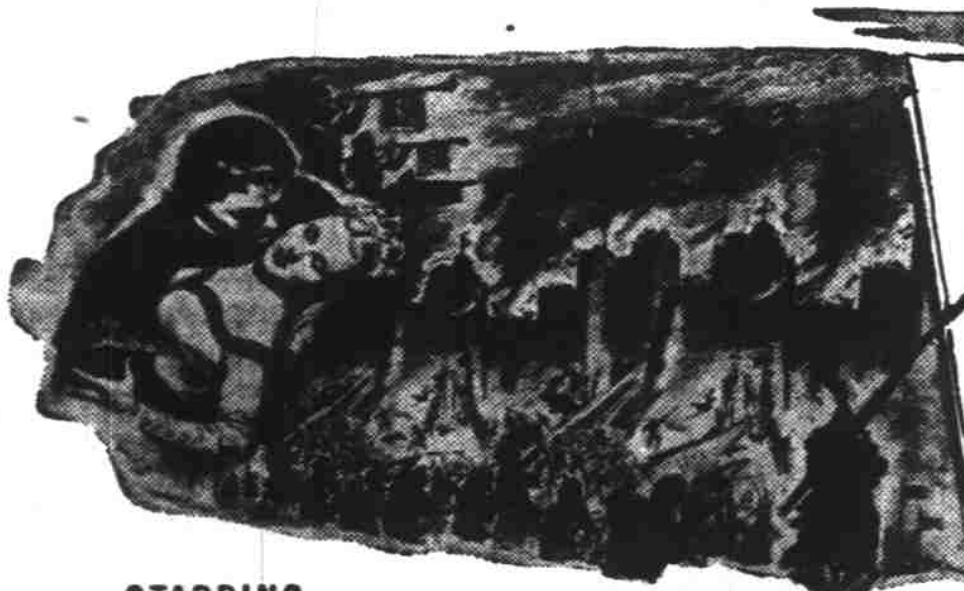
