Portland Firm Loses Suit in Supreme Court

Two suits were lost in the State Supreme Court Wednesday by the Slate Construction Company, a Portland Highway construction firm.

In one case, Pacific General Contractors collected \$38,844 from the Slate Company, due on a highway sub-contract.

In the other case, a chattel mortgage was foreclosed against the company by F. T. Glasser and others. Due at the time of the foreclosure was \$20,000 out of \$67,000 borrowed by the Slate Company.

Justice Hall S. Lusk wrote both opinions, which upheld Circuit Judge Victor Olliver of Linn County. Dismissed in Supreme Court was a suit to reform a written contract for sale of 40 acres of timber in Tillamook County and to correct an error by designating the "north 40," instead of the "south 40." The case reversed the lower court. Floyd and Wesley Powell were respondents and Robert and Frances Sheets, appellants.

School District Asks County to Help With Road

The Salem Public School District asked Marion County Court Wednesday for assistance in constructing a road from the S 12th Street cutoff west to a connection with Madrona Ave. and then on to meet the Pacific Highway.

Connell C. Ward, clerk-manager for the school district, said this would provide easy access to the new proposed Morningside School to be built on the S 12th St. site. The district hopes to have the school completed by next fall.

The school district agreed to deed a 60-foot strip along the northern boundary of the school site. It was pointed out that in order to complete the right-of-way for the new road it will be necessary to secure a strip of land between Peck Ave. and the western boundary of the school property.

Seed Crops Pay \$3 Million Yearly To Valley Farmers

Marion County farmers take in better than three million dollars a year from a long list of seed crops, Hollis Ottaway, county extension agent, said Wednesday as he reported that large number of Marion County seed growers plan to attend the Oregon Seed Growers League meeting at Portland, Dec. 8-10 at Multnomah Hotel.

Marion County rates third in the state among seed growing counties, Ottaway added, and more farmers from Marion County attend the league meeting than from any other county in the state. Included in the money-producing seeds are three different fescues, highland bentgrass, two ryegrasses, Austrian winter peas, hairy vetch, two kinds of trefoil, and a long list of lesser grasses and legumes. In some sections of

Marion County almost every farmer grows seed of some kind. Practically every shipping point in the county has one or more large modern seed cleaning plant. Ottaway adds that all seed growers are welcome at the meeting whether members of the seed league or not.
