### Children Like Plenty of Cookies, Make Crisp, Flavorful, in Quantity

Dear old sugar cookies can be mighty handy helpers along about Cl ristmas time, when so many cookies go down little throats that the more expensive varieties become a major financial problem. Sugar cookies and gingermen will probably please young tastes even better than smaller, more delicate butter varieties on

After all, it isn't frail beauty that counts when appetites are keen, it's quantity. 'Most every cookbook sports recipes for sugar cookies, you may try:

SUGAR COOKIES

1 cup sugar

egg (or 2 yolks) 1 tablespoon liquid

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 11/2 cups flour 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon baking powder

Cream shortening, add beaten egg, sugar ,liquid and vanilla, beating together. Mix in dry ingredients sifted together and drop by spoonsful onto buttered cookie sheet. If for rolled out cookies, use more flour, just enough to handle but not enough to toughen dough. Roll out to 1/4 inch thick,

cut, sprinkle with sugar and bake at 375 degrees for about 8 min-Use orange juice for the liquid and add some grated orange

rind for Orange Cookies. Add 1/2 cup cut up dates or chopped nuts to the drop batter for fancier cookies.

Add 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg for Spice Cookies. Gingersnaps of course are among the most popular of all Kid Kookies. Here's one standard recipe recommended for making in large quantities before the holidays, so limitless numbers may be munched on by half-starved children who would otherwise be eating more delicate ones with far less relish:

GINGERSNAPS

1 cup plus 2 tablespoons flour 1/8 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup molasses 1 teaspoon ginger

½ teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons shortening Heat molasses to the boiling point and pour over shortening. Heat molasses to the boiling point and pour over shortening. Sift dry ingredients together and add. Roll out, cut. Bake until dry and crisp-8 to 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes about 50. Christmas cookies may be decorated with colored sugar before being baked, or with frosting afterwards.
