Sweet Thoughts

Candymaking Pre-Holiday Job for Householder; Some are Experts

Candy making in some households is a definite "must" just before Christmas, though many women rely on the candy shop or grocery store to supply needed sweets.

First of all, potential confectioners should arm themselves with a candy thermometer if at all possible, a large tray or two (or even better, the marble top off the antique table in the living room) and some good deep kettles.

The thermometer makes candy making so much more simple—you watch the heat and when the syrup gets to the exact temperature there's no hair-raising moment while you try the syrup in cold water to test it, while it boils over on the stove.

Most popular homemade candy of all times is chocolate fudge, next is divinity and after that, taster fudge.

VIRGIE'S BUTTER FUDGE

2 cups sugar 1/2 cup water
3 squares bitter chocolate 1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup butter

Cook all but vanilla to a soft ball when tried in water (234 to 238). Just before it boils, wipe down sides of pan with brush dipped in water or with wet cloth on the end of a spoon. When done, cool as quickly as possible and when almost cold, beat with a wooden spoon or work on a marble slab until creamy and it will hold its shape when dropped from the end of a spoon. This may take some time, but whipping the mixture when cold makes a creamier product. Add a cup of nuts just before dropping onto waxed paper.

We are a two-syrup divinity-maker ourselves, believing that you can get nicer texture with this recipe:

TWO-SYRUP DIVINITY

Boil together 1 cup sugar and 1/4 cup water until it spins a thread, pour over stiffly beaten whites of three eggs. Boil together 3 cups sugar and 1 cup cornsyrup and 1/4 cup water until it spins a long thread. Pour over first mixture and beat until cold, then add 1 cup nutmeats and a teaspoon of vanilla. Drop from tip of spoon on oiled paper.

To make a super duper divinity, use salted almonds.

Walnut growers find that spiced candied nuts make good confections and make good use of the fall crop.

SPICED NUTS

1 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup water 1/4 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 cup nuts

Cook sugar, water and spices to 238 degrees or until it makes a soft ball when tried in cold water. Add nuts and heat over a very slow fire, stirring gently until the syrup begins to granulate. Then separate nuts on a piece of waxed paper and let cool. Candied peel is another popular sweet. Here's a method to remember:

CANDIED PEEL

Cover strips of grapefruit or orange peel with water and boil until soft enough to pierce with fingernail. Drain but do not squeeze out water. Measure, add an equal measure of sugar and cook slowly, stirring to coat the peel with the syrup which forms from the sugar and the water contained in peel. Let stand overnight. Next day, stir while heating until syrup will harden when peel is cooled. Spread out on waxed paper to harden.
