Royal Mounties Talk Heard at Four Corners

FOUR CORNERS—Highlighting activities at Lincoln School here this week was the program "Adventures with the Mounties," presented by Dr. and Mrs. Richard R. Morgan of Portland. They spent two months last summer in Canada taking pictures and studying the lore and lure of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

To obtain the status of a scarlet-coated Mountie, they reported, takes every thing required of a hardy pioneer, plus. Beginning as the Northwest Mounted Police, the R.C.M.P. has maintained its rigid standard of requirements for 80 years, making them one of the top-ranking police forces of the world.

To become a member of this select group a young man must be 18 years old and single. He is not allowed to marry for eight years after he begins his training.

At the expiration of the training he must be free from all indebtedness and have \$1200 or more in the bank before leading his bride to the altar—providing not more than one half of the 5,000 members of the R. C. M. P. are married men. If so, he must again wait for some one to retire or die before he can join the benedicts.

Train Dogs, Too
In addition to the rigid training program, the Morgans said, the Mounties train police dogs so expertly they can track down and find contraband liquor and bring in the full bottles; they will attack and hold a man at the word of command from a Mountie.

The dress uniform is the famed scarlet coat, highly polished boots and dark trousers with yellow stripe on the outside of the leg. But for the rugged tracking in zero weather they wear heavy durable clothing topped off with a knee-length fur coat and fur cap.

Morgan, the speaker, was formerly a professor of psychology at Lewis and Clark College in Portland. In three years the Morgans have given more than 250,000 school children in Oregon and Washington a graphic insight of the customs and cities of Mexico, Guatemala and Canada.

In 1953 the Morgans will explore the jungles of Yucatan, Mexico.
