**Warm Welcome**

**Hot Beverages for Family Parties Include Fruity, Creamy Mixtures**

Warm beverages that the whole family may enjoy, come into their full popularity in mid-winter when cold weather and the desire for parties are prime factors in their promotion.

Chocolate is, of course, a longtime favorite, and in case you've forgotten the qualities of this as a wonderful cold-day warmer upper, just try it out on the family, served with a dab of whipped cream and a sprinkling of nutmeg on top.

Next to chocolate the old beverage, mulled cider is next:

**MULLED CIDER**

1 gallon cider 1/2 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons stick cinnamon 1/2 tablespoon whole cloves  
Heat together and pour liquid off spices as served. Less sugar may be used if to be served chilled.

Spiced tea is another warming beverage, good to serve the family or company. Here's one that was made popular a few years ago when served at the Salem Garden Club's annual Christmas greens show.

**HOT SPICED TEA**

Cut up 2 whole oranges and add 3 tablespoons black tea and 10 whole cloves. Add 1 1/2 to 2 cups sugar according to taste, and let stand about 2 hours. Pour over this mixture, 2 quarts boiling water and let stand awhile. Then strain. This tea may be stored in the refrigerator.

Spiced or mulled punch is also a good beverage to know about—and what's on hand determines the actual recipe. Here, however, we have a recipe that can be varied to use the kind of fruit you'd prefer to use:

**SPICED PUNCH**

1 quart red juice 1/2 teaspoon whole cloves  
2 quarts water (or less) 1 stick cinnamon (2 inches)  
1 1/2 cups sugar 2 lemons (1 juice, rind)  
Simmer sugar, water, lemon juice and thin slices rind for about 15 minutes. Add fruit juice and boil another 5 minutes and serve hot. Makes 24 punch glasses full.

Here's a hot eggnog that the whole family may enjoy. It makes enough for 8 glasses and comes from a dairy association booklet from Wilsons.

**HOT PINEAPPLE EGGNOG**

8 eggs, separated 2 cups cream  
1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons grated orange rind  
6 cups pineapple juice

Combine all the egg yolks and half the whites and 1/4 cup sugar. Beat thoroughly. Bring pineapple juice to the boiling point, add cream and reheat. Pour over egg mixture, stirring constantly. Beat remaining whites, add rest of sugar. Fold egg whites into hot mixture, sprinkle with orange rind as served.
