Miss Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Miller, 1545 Baker St., was presented with a \$100 defense bond at the Marion Hotel luncheon meeting of the Salem Board of Realtors, contest sponsor.

Presented by Wesley Stewart, contest chairman. Miss Miller's essay will be entered in the national contest sponsored by the National Association of Real Estate Boards in Washington, D. C. The winner will receive a five-day trip to the national capital.

Special guests at the Friday meeting were the winner's parents and E. A. Carleton, principal of the high school.

There was no unanimity among the judges, who stressed that the entries were generally excellent and the winner exceedingly difficult to determine. Miss Miller was given 33 out of a possible 36 points. Her essay was entitled "The Life of Mr. U.S.A."

Board to Urge Drunk Drivers Be Hit Harder

Stiffer penalties for drunken drivers, along with "holding the line" on weights, widths and length of buses and trucks are among the recommendations that will be made to the 1953 Legislature by the Oregon Commission on Interstate Cooperation.

The commission, which met in Salem Friday, said courts should be granted discretionary power in involving first offenders on drunken driving charges instead of a compulsory 90-day suspension of the license as at present.

A legislative council, to be composed of an attorney and an auditor, will also be suggested. Sen. Eugene Marsh said duties of the council would include bill drafting for members of the Legislature, legislative committees and state agencies. It also would give legislative legal advice to legislators and committees.

The council would prepare a digest of all bills before the session and prepare an impartial analysis of each measure to be voted upon at the statewide elections.

The auditor proposal received the approval of State Finance Director Harry Dorman, who also told the commission he would submit a recommendation to the Legislature which, if approved, would save the state \$14,000 in the cost of printing the legislative calendar. His proposal calls for a weekly in-

stead of a daily publication of the calendar with only a list of new bills and other changes to be furnished on a daily basis.
