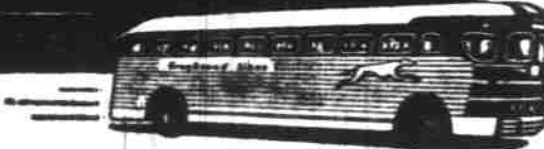
Robson, a general contractor, started as an apprentice himself

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Eisenhower Confers With McCloy, Dulles

NEW YORK (U) — President-elect Eisenhower, just back from his Korean "look and learn" trip, plunged Monday into talks on European unity against Communism.

Eisenhower conferred with John J. McCloy, former United States high commissioner in Germany, and John Foster Dulles, who will be his secretary of state.

The nature of the talks indicated the President-elect was weighing whatever plans he might have concerning Korea with the rest of the world picture.

McCloy, who lunched with Eisenhower and Dulles, said "We talked about the steps that might be taken in relation to European unity, a subject we have all been engaged in and interested in for a number of years."

Asked if West German rearmament was discussed, McCloy said "not particularly except in relation to other things."

The talks covered "a wide variety" of subjects, McCloy said. McCloy is slated to become chairman of the board of the Chase National Bank on Jan. 19, succeeding Winthrop Aldrich, whom Eisenhower has designated as ambassador to Great Britain.

"There was no amplification from Eisenhower's headquarters on his statement Monday, as his plane arrived from Korea, that the enemy would not be impressed by words "but only by deeds — executed under circumstances of our own choosing."

Nor was any date announced for his expected meeting with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, former Far Eastern commander who was fired by President Truman.

Prior to his luncheon meeting with McCloy and Dulles, Eisenhower conferred with Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota governor who has been designated as foreign aid chief in the new administration.

Stassen declined to discuss details of the meeting. He told news men it was premature to talk about amounts of aid or the policies of the Mutual Security Administration.

He said that among persons he had talked with in recent weeks concerning the task ahead was Averell Harriman, whom he will succeed in the MSA post.

Sinclair Weeks, Secretary of Commerce designate, called on Eisenhower, carrying a blue-bound volume entitled: "Concerning the Executive Branch of the Federal Government at the Policy Level."

Poland instructs Catholics not to go underground

WARSAW, Poland (U) — Polish newspapers published Sunday a letter instructing all Roman Catholics in Poland not to take part in "underground activities and economic diversions."

The newspapers said the instruction was contained in an official declaration from the Polish Episcopacy—the Council of all the Bishops, headed by the Archbishop of Warsaw who is the newly designated Cardinal Stefan Wyszyński — and signed by the Episcopate's secretary, the auxiliary bishop of Warsaw, Msgr. Zygmunt Choroński.

Pinboy Struck By Bowling Pin

Protest From Reds Expected In POW Case

PUSAN, Korea (U) — Angry new protests from the Communist truce delegation were expected Tuesday as an aftermath to a mass break-out attempt Sunday by 3,600 die-hard North Korean Communist prisoners on Pongam Island.

Eighty-two prisoners were killed and 120 more wounded as Allied guards quelled the uprising.

Two U. S. and two South Korean soldiers also were injured by rock-hurling Reds who ignored all orders to halt and charged the guards in waves, the UN Prisoner of War Command announced.

It was the bloodiest uprising yet, exceeding by one the number of Red prisoners killed in a Feb. 18 riot on Koje Island.

Pongam is a small, terraced, wind-swept island about 1 1/2 miles off the southern tip of Koje.

The United Nations command, in announcing the action Monday, said "orders, warning shots and riot guns had no effect on the organized mob."

"When three waves of fanatical Communists advanced on the guards, individual weapons were brought to bear when their power became necessary to prevent the entire mass from breaking out," the command said.

The announcement did not further classify the "individual weapons" used, but presumably this included automatic carbines and sub-machineguns.

It said that wind blowing across prison camp site at the time of the uprising "prevented the use of tear gas to quell the rioters."

After an investigation, Col. C. V. Cadwell, commanding the UN Prisoner of War Command, praised the island commander, Lt. Col. George P. Miller for "using sound judgment."

"Col. Miller did not use any more force than was necessary," Cadwell said. "He acted promptly. It could have been a very serious situation."

The mutiny occurred at 1 p.m. Sunday among one-third of the 9,000 Korean civilian internees held in UNC Camp No. 1C.

Polio Project Means Boost in Blood Quotas

Blood donor quotas over the nation must go up 20 per cent beginning in January to care for a new means of relief to polio-stricken areas, Red Cross officials here were informed Monday.

John Dismukes, ARC Pacific Area fund raising director, and Harold Davis, area field representative, both of San Francisco, made the announcement at the Marion County Chapter meeting last night.

Visiting Salem this week, the area officials said the extra blood will go into the "gamma globulin" project, which has been found to stave off paralysis for victims of infantile paralysis.

Much of the globulin will be for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to distribute in 121 communities estimated to be hardest hit annually by the virus.

Father, Son Released in Slayings Case

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — A father and son, held for questioning in the Chester bludgeon massacre of a grocer and three children, were released Monday as another lead in the baffling \$7,128 robbery-slayings fizzled out.

Wendell Hall, 49-year-old Fresno janitorial service operator, was freed Monday morning at Fresno after three hours of lie detector tests failed to link him with the Oct. 10 crime.

His son, Travis, 27, of Richmond, was released in San Francisco after police inspectors Michael Doherty and Edward O'Haire returned from questioning his father.

Both men were arrested early Saturday on a tip supplied by a San Francisco police informer.

The informer, who was not named, told officers he was asked by two men, one named Hall, to join a plot to rob grocer Gard Young at Chester, a mountain village 235 miles northeast of here.

Young, his three daughters and a neighbor child were found stuffed into the trunk of his car on a lonely logging road near Chester Oct. 11.

All had been savagely bludgeoned, but one child, Sondra Gay Young, 5 1/2, survived to tell officers that two men waylaid the Young car after the grocer had drawn \$7,128 out of a bank.

Army Jurisdiction Over Flood Control Program Favored

WASHINGTON (U) — A congressional investigating committee recommended Monday that a bitter and prolonged intergovernmental battle be ended by turning over to the Army's Corps of Engineers primary responsibility for the nation's flood control program.

The Department of Agriculture, which for years has had conflicting authority with the engineers on flood control, would be limited to an upstream program of land development.

Portland Milk Hearing Opens

PORTLAND (U) — A hearing opened here Monday on a proposal to enlarge the Portland milk market pool to include all of Clackamas, Multnomah, Washington and Columbia Counties.

Thomas L. Ohlsen, state milk administrator, said the present market pool had not been able to meet demand. He proposed the enlargement of the area.

Portland producers and distributors, including the big Dairy Cooperative Association, supported the proposal, but protests were heard from Clackamas and Columbia dairymen.

Ohlsen said his proposal would not affect sales areas of distributors. It would affect only pooling and quotas. He remarked that it might be wise to abolish all production zoning, and let dairymen find their own market. He added, though, that he was not making such a proposal at this time.

Legislature Seat in Doubt

PORTLAND (U) — The new state law fixing legislators' terms may start a dispute over the seat of the late Rep. Stanhope Pier.

Pier was re-elected in November, then died. The runner-up in votes, John Dickson, Republican, maintains that he now moves up to qualify for the seat in the Legislature.

The new law says that a legislator's term runs until the next Legislature meets.

Dickson said that if Multnomah County Commissioners appoint anyone to replace Pier, it will be only for the remainder of Pier's 1951 term. Dickson said that Pier failed to qualify for the 1953 Legislature.

The matter is expected to go to the House, if the county commissioners do not appoint Dickson. There also is a possibility of the case being carried to the courts.

CARSON CITY, Nev. (U) — Blond beauty Lana Turner flew into Nevada Monday for a quick divorce and then went back to work in Hollywood.

The 31-year-old movie actress charged millionaire Bob Topping with extreme mental cruelty in the brief moments she testified secretly before District Judge Clark J. Guild here.

She emphatically told reporters at Reno later that "I certainly have no plans for another marriage now."

Reports were current last summer when Lana established her Nevada residence at Lake Tahoe, that she and South American actor Fernando Lamas might wed when both settled their marital troubles.

But the actress said at that time: "That is a bridge we'll cross when we come to it."

U. S. Electoral College Elects Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (U) — The nation's Electoral College chose Dwight D. Eisenhower Monday as the 34th U. S. president — presumably by a 442 to 89 count.

This carries out the mandate of last Nov. 4, when the nation's voters chose the electors in casting record 33,927,549 vote for Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate, to 27,311,316 for Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic standard bearer.

But Eisenhower's selection as the next President still won't be official until Jan. 6 when Congress meets in joint session for the Electoral College vote to be counted by the president of the Senate.

Even though most electors were free to vote as they please, the outcome of the vote was taken for granted.

The electors cast their votes at the respective capitals of their states.
