Soviet, Arabs Hit Peace Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U. S. P.)—The Soviet bloc lined up with the Arabs Thursday night and helped slap down an American-backed appeal for peace between the Arab countries and Zionist Israel.

The proposal was for direct Arab-Israeli peace talks to settle the truce-bound Palestine war.

The defeat in the U. N. General Assembly was regarded as a major omen for U. S. policy toward the seething strategic and oil-rich Middle East. It also showed the Soviet bloc taking a firmer pro-Arab stand where it could do the Western Allies much harm.

A switch in some Latin American votes also helped the Arabs.

The vote on the mildly worded resolution was 24 in favor, 21 against, with 15 abstentions. It was a defeat because a two-thirds majority is required.

Skywatch Officers Talk to Patterson

Two officers from the Portland filter center conferred with Gov. Paul Patterson in Salem Thursday in connection with the Skywatch Operation in Oregon.

They were Maj. Donald E. Jones and Maj. George Manussier.

The operation is part of the Air Force attack warning system in 27 western and bordering states. It has been on an around-the-clock basis since last summer.

Soviets Release Soldiers; Two 'Ask Asylum'

BERLIN (U. S. P.)—Soviet authorities Thursday night released a U. S. Army sergeant held two days in the Russian sector.

A few hours earlier a Soviet-licensed news agency claimed that two other American soldiers grabbed by Soviet sentries on the frontier Nov. 26 have asked for "political asylum" in the East Zone of Germany.

The box score was one Russian soldier held in the West Zone and said by U. S. authorities to have sought asylum, and three Americans in the Soviet Zone.

A U. S. spokesman in Vienna said that a Soviet soldier stationed in Austria had deserted to the West and refused to be repatriated.

The U. S. soldier released was M. Sgt. William T. Rice, Farmville, Va. He was seized by armed East German police Tuesday while in charge of a group of German workers posting signs marking the boundary between the U. S. and Soviet sectors in Berlin.

The two American soldiers who, the news agency ADN claimed, had sought asylum in the East were identified by ADN as Pvt. Eastmont Night and Raymond V. Michalowski.

The U. S. Army previously had announced that Michalowski, of Perth Amboy, N. J., and Pvt. Eastmont Night, Los Angeles, were arrested last month when they accidentally rode into the Soviet sector on an interurban train.

Since the news agency quoted Night as saying in a statement "I am Pvt. Eastmont Night," J. S. officials said it was clear that in view of the misspelling he did not know what he was signing.

The third American missing in the Soviet Zone is Lt. Horace J. Sincore of Homestead, Fla. He is believed to have crossed into the East Zone inadvertently Nov. 24.

The Russians have evaded any conclusive answer as to his whereabouts.

Elderly Salem Man Narrowly Misses Gas Asphyxiation

Charles Gard, 88, of 444 S. High St., was saved from possible asphyxiation Thursday after the gas to his stove was accidentally turned on in his apartment and rendered him unconscious.

His landlady discovered him in his apartment shortly after she smelled gas. She dragged him to fresh air, where he quickly revived. Salem first aidmen said he apparently suffered no ill effects from the gas.

Reduced Fire Insurance Rates In Effect for Heights District

SOUTH SALEM—Reduced fire insurance rates now in effect in this area will mean a saving of approximately \$5 on a \$100 insurance premium, an insurance company representative spokesman reported Thursday.

Many South Salem home-owners are said to pay \$100 or more for a three-year policy, the term for which most fire insurance is written.

Rates for business properties will vary, but the business rates in general are reduced more than residential rates.

All property located within 500 feet of a fire hydrant qualifies for new rates that are still lower. There are 18 hydrants in the district.

The new rates, established by the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau, pertain to the area served by the Liberty-Salem Heights volunteer fire department. The department has been answering fire alarms since it acquired its first truck in the spring of 1951.

Harold Rosebraugh, who was active in organizing the district in 1949, estimated there were 1,300 dwellings and 100 business firms in the district. The district is maintained by a four-mill tax levy.

The Liberty-Salem Heights district now has a general rating of class nine, while properties within 500 feet of a hydrant are rated class eight.
