Bonus Awards Feature Roberts Bros. Employees' Party



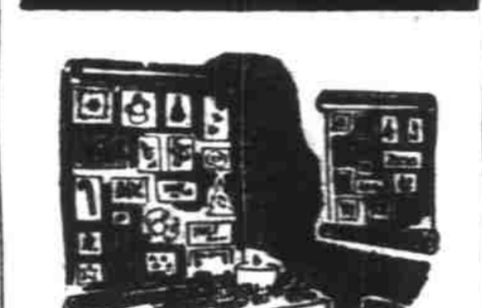

Decorate with cards

Christmas cards are much too handsome to be stacked on the table, and there won't be time to enjoy them unless they're set out to be seen. Plan now how to use them for room decoration... here is an idea for a big brightener for a wall. Buy a long sheet of metallic paper next trip down town, gold, silver, red, green, blue. Decide which color according to the color scheme of the room. Unroll the paper at home, but don't flatten it. Each end will curl naturally to make a scroll. The wrong side of the paper which the scroll ends show can be faced with the same paper or a contrasting shade. Use strong stick-on tape to attach the scroll to a painted wall. Cut a strip much longer than the width of the paper, attach each strip to the back of the scroll end and fold the ends of the tape back to stick to the wall. Use thumb tacks under the scrolls on a papered wall. Attach the cards to the scroll with colored pins or rubber cement which can be rolled off the backs later. Protected by John F. Dille Co.

and are unbreakable. The container makes a good glove, handkerchief or hose case between trips.

New Iran Oil Proposals to Show Changes

LONDON (AP) — British officials said Friday that Loy Henderson, United States ambassador in Tehran, will present Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh new joint proposals for settling the Anglo-Iranian oil question.

According to one official source, the proposals depart "to some degree" from the plan submitted by President Truman and Prime Minister Winston Churchill to Mossadegh on August 30.

The proposals include a "face-saver" for the Iranian premier. However, it is stressed, both Britain and the United States have agreed to stand pat on that part of the Truman-Churchill proposals which insists that question of compensation for the nationalization of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's interests in Iran should be submitted to international arbitration, preferably by the International Court of Justice at the Hague.

It was not disclosed when Henderson will present the new proposals to Mossadegh. The American diplomat has been in Washington for

conferences. He is expected to leave for the Iranian capital shortly after the new year.
