

Sick Mother Given Chance To Recover

LOS ANGELES (AP)—An inspiring, if sad, Christmas story was that of Mrs. Jean Garrett, who had her baby even though she had been told it might cost her life.

Tuesday it appeared the story may yet have a happy ending.

Mrs. Garrett, 27, wife of an aircraft worker and mother of three other children, is suffering from what has been diagnosed as Hodgkin's disease, a cancerous malady which attacks the lymph glands.

She was told that having the baby would shorten her life; if she survived at all. Nonetheless, she decided that the anticipated child was entitled to its chance for life.

The baby, a boy, was delivered by Caesarean section the day after Christmas.

Mrs. Garrett withstood the operation well, and the baby was healthy. Hospital attendants said that both are gaining strength, and that Tuesday Mrs. Garrett got up and walked from her bed to a chair.

If her present progress continues, they added, she can go home in a few days.

Her doctor said Tuesday that Mrs. Garrett has a chance to get well—that "in a couple of years she may be all right." Although Hodgkin's disease is generally fatal, the surgeon conceded that in Mrs. Garrett's case there may be some question concerning the diagnosis. Further tests are being made.

Few Injuries in Eniwetok Storm

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission announced Tuesday that only minor injuries were suffered by military and civilian personnel in a typhoon that hit Eniwetok Island in the Pacific on Dec. 29 (U.S. time).

New School Topped Year in Jefferson Area

JEFFERSON—No big news story broke the even tenor of the days in Jefferson during 1952. The most important event to most in this community being the building of the new \$300,000 high school and gymnasium.

The contract for the new school was let in January to Wall, Bartrom & Sanford Construction Co. of Eugene, and the first earth turned on Feb. 4. The new school was ready on Sept. 12.

School district patrons were somewhat startled when the estimated school budget of \$182,440 was presented. It was the highest in history, but also covered more schools—Talbot, Sidney, Conner, Devaney, part of Prospect district and the two Jefferson Schools.

The Jefferson Hardware store was sold by Oren Brand to Leland Wells, Dick Vose and Leonard Myers. Fletchers Market opened in the old creamery building.

Several unexpected deaths occurred. In August, Jack Larsen, Salem flier, died in a dusting plane crash on the Oren farm.

Pfc. Jerry Higgins died in August while in Army service in Alaska. A Marion sailor, Arnold Karlin, was killed in sea action off the east coast of Korea on Oct. 20.

Almon Winn died Nov. 11 from accidental gunshot wounds received while deer hunting in October. Walton Looney, Mrs. Pearl Burnett, Robert Terhune and Earl Cunningham all died from heart attacks. Roy Henderson was electrocuted while drilling a well on his farm April 15.

The March of Dimes total of \$319 broke previous Jefferson totals. Ivan Sutton was chairman.

Rowena Robbins was May Day queen and Fred Tjerke, king, in the biggest May day observance ever held here. "Jefferson, the Garden Spot of the World" was the parade theme.

Thirteen and a half blocks of Jefferson streets were repaved, and \$11,000 water bonds voted to build new mains and repair old ones. Ivan Sutton was named mayor.

Jefferson and Sidney polled the largest election vote in history following the national trend for Eisenhower.

Delene Gurgurich harvested a ripe watermelon Armistice day. Wilbur Funk completed his 159th pair of embroidered pillowcases by Christmas. Spring lambs began arriving here during the last part of November.

Truman Declares Peace Prospects Have Improved

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman declared his belief Wednesday that the prospect for world peace is better than it was 12 months ago.

The president told his news conference that his optimism embraced the cold war fronts all around the world—though he observed he was unable to peer behind the Iron Curtain.

He disclosed he will deliver a half-hour broadcast to the people on the state of the nation Jan. 15 (7:30 p.m., PST)—five days before he yields his high office to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. It will be an elaboration of his State of the Union message to Congress next week.

The reason for the farewell broadcast, he told questioners, is simply that he wants to make it. The president spoke of brightening peace prospects and correspondents inquired whether he had received any new plan to end the Korean War. The President said: No, no, none had come to him.

Firm Tone in Grain Market

CHICAGO (AP)—Grains ended the 1952 year by exhibiting a firm tone Wednesday, a demonstration which was not in keeping with the general pattern for the year.

Liquidation to establish losses for tax computation purposes apparently let up and the market, after some early hesitancy, climbed slowly higher throughout the session. In many instances final prices were at the day's high.

Wheat closed $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ higher, corn $\frac{1}{4}$ lower to $\frac{1}{2}$ higher, oats $\frac{1}{4}$ higher, rye $\frac{1}{4}$ lower, soybeans $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ higher and hard 10 cents lower to 3 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Stock Market Varies Slightly

NEW YORK (AP)—Stock prices stayed within a narrow range despite active trading Wednesday as the market finished 1952 at its highest average level in 22 years.

Few changes ranged to more than a point.

Traditional pre-holiday caution prevailed.

The security markets are closed New Year's Day and resume their regular schedule Friday.

Total transactions Wednesday, amounting to 2,950,000 shares, were swelled by cash sales for immediate delivery.

Utilities dipped ten cents, utilities were up ten cents and rails unchanged.

Reform School Has Class in Making Lock Picks

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—Police Chief Walter Mulligan takes a grim view of some of the trades taught at the Boys' Industrial School.

He criticized the school Wednesday after learning from a 12-year-old boy that he was taught how to make lock picks by an instructor.

"It is most frustrating to have my men apprehend these youths and have them escape a couple of days later," Chief Mulligan said. The 12-year-old boy with the lock picks was arrested in stolen car Dec. 26. He explained the lock picks were made of flattened nails with a filed and shaped end, "just in case we should ever lose our locker keys."

Write 'Refund' On Tax Letter To Speed Check

WASHINGTON (AP)—If you come to the happy conclusion in making out your income tax return for this year that Uncle Sam owes you money just write "Refund" on the envelope holding your return.

The Bureau of Internal Revenue picked up this idea Wednesday— from its Indianapolis office—for speeding tax refunds and decided to use it nationally.

Garry Campbell, director of internal revenue at Indianapolis, got the idea going. Campbell announced that taxpayers in his area who figure the government owes them money, can get quick attention for their returns by marking them "Refund."

Refund returns would then be examined first in his office, Campbell said.

Truman Gives Solons Report On Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman told Congress Tuesday he is keeping weapons out of Soviet hands by continuing aid to Britain, France and Italy—even though those countries have shipped 2 1/2 million dollars worth of forbidden goods behind the Iron Curtain.

He reported to the lawmakers under the 1951 Mutual Defense Assistance Act which says foreign aid from this country must be cut off from any nation which sends strategic materials to the Communist bloc unless the President decides American security requires it to continue.

Truman said that over the years Western Europe has developed a certain inter-dependence with the East for both supplies and market. He said if they cannot sell to the East and get food, timber, metals and other raw materials in return, they must get those items from the West with dollars they do not have. That would cut their defense effort, he said, put a bigger burden on America and cause them hardship leading to discontent.
