St. Mark's to Construct New Church Soon

St. Mark's Lutheran Church will build a new church at its present location, 343 N. Church St., "at the earliest possible date," the congregation decided Sunday night.

The annual meeting authorized the church council to begin now on preliminary plans looking toward construction of a Christian education building and a new church.

Whether to seek a new location, out of the business district, has been studied for several years. Much of the present structure was erected in 1927 by the Presbyterians and taken over by the Lutherans when St. Mark's was organized here in 1927. Considerable improvements have been made in recent years.

The annual assembly was conducted by the pastor, the Rev. John L. Cauble, who conducted a memorial service for members who died during the past year.

Reports from all organizations of the church showed substantial growth. The pastor reported the congregation increased 17 percent during 1952, and all benevolence quotas were overpaid by from 10 to 20 percent.

Elected to the council for three-year terms were Wilbur Martin, Dr. B. L. Trelstad, Paul Rienschke and Gordon Hofstetter. A. H. Randall was elected lay delegate to the Pacific synodical convention and Ray Poff as alternate.

2 Men Caught In Burglary Waive Hearing

Two men nabbed in the act of burglarizing a store near Salem Sunday night waived preliminary hearings Monday in Marion County District Court and were held for the grand jury.

Carlos Edward Schlipp, 29, and Ward H. Finch, 25, both of Portland and both former State Penitentiary inmates, were caught in Orcutt's Market, 4200 N. River Rd. They had entered through a ceiling ventilator but were seen from across the street by Mrs. James G. Hurd, 4195 N. River Rd.

Hurd and Samuel E. Orcutt, proprietor of the store, kept the men in the store until sheriff's deputies arrived to make the arrest.

Schlipp and Finch had with them chisels and a power drill and other safe-cracking tools and told deputies where they had hidden others, which were found.

Schlipp was released only Jan. 4 from the prison, where he has served two sentences for passing bad checks. Finch, who has had two terms for burglaries, was released last Aug. 20.

Cattlemen Don't Want Controls, Report States

No doubt as to the cattlemen's stand on price controls was left in the minds of any attending the 56th annual convention of the American National Cattlemen's Association meeting during the week just ending, according to Nelson R. Crow, editor of the Western Livestock Journal, in a report issued Monday. Cattlemen just don't want controls.

Crow added that Jay Taylor, Texas, vice president of the association, summed up the thought in his statement: "We don't believe we'll get any advantage from the Eisenhower administration. But we don't want any advantages. What we want is a good leaving alone!"

"Our big hope for a stabilized market is that we can get rid of the Office of Price Stabilization in a hurry," President Sam Hyatt, Wyoming, declared, adding that "We want to be entirely rid of bureaucratic price controls. There is talk of 'standby controls.' We'll fight that idea. If we do have a sudden emergency, we can take care of that at the time. Standby machinery probably wouldn't work under emergency conditions anyway."

Hyatt commended President-elect Eisenhower upon his cabinet appointments, giving special praise to Ezra Benson, new secretary of agriculture from Utah, and to Governor McKay of Oregon, new secretary of the Interior. Hyatt said he was particularly well pleased with McKay's appointment, as he felt no one knew much more about the work of this department than McKay, "who comes into the work with a free mind and some of the unbiased thought bred on the Pacific Coast."

Crow also reported that despite declines which have carried cow prices below pre-Korean war levels there was a spirit of optimism

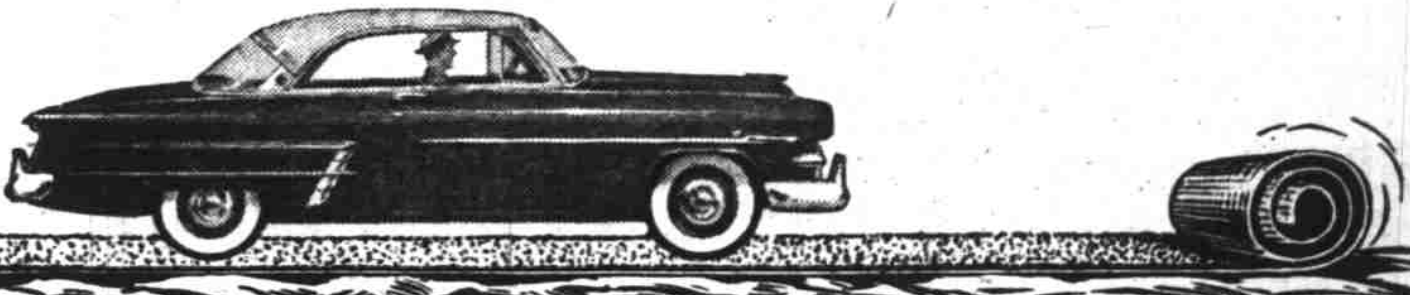

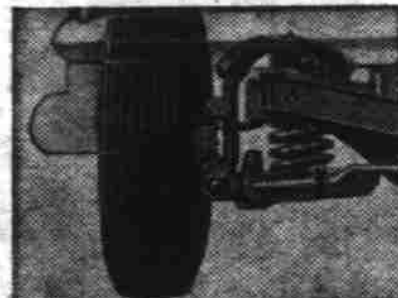

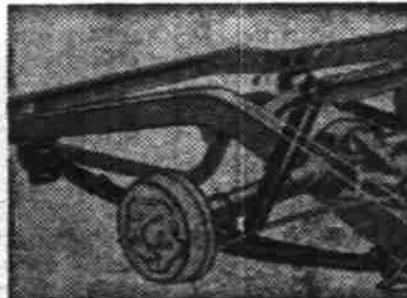
